It's a bird! Plane! Cash?

In West Palm Beach, Fla., recently, about a dozen people scooped up money thrown into the street by two men who had just robbed a bank, police said. Witnesses said those grabbing fistfuls of bills, some of them stained red from a hidden explosive dye-pack, included people driving BMWs and a Rolls Royce — and a mother who left her baby in a stroller on the sidewalk to run into the street. The armed men robbed the bank of an undisclosed amount, then fled in a truck, which they abandoned several blocks away, police said.

Three-year-old Tiger?

Jake Paine, 3, swung his Snoopy driver and watched his golf ball soar 40 yards, roll 25 feet and drop into the hole last weekend at Lake Forest (Calif.) Golf and Practice Course.

"Daddy, I got a hole-in-one!" the little boy told his father, Bill, after the ball dropped in.

Jake's shot may be a record. The Guinness Sports Record Book published in 1997 said the youngest person to get a hole-in-one was 5.

Kin not dependable

Shane Lee Lamb, 19, called his father from the Crawford County Detention Center in Van Buren, Ark., told him there was cash hidden in a tennis racket cover in his room and asked his father to use the money to post 10 percent of his \$10,000 bond.

Lamb's father found the money, about \$800, and called authorities instead. Police said Lamb and another man took \$1,500 to \$2,000 in a burglary at a Mountainburg, Ark., home.

Season tickets for football to go on sale

Fans who held reserved-seat tickets for last football season may pick up their options for this season from Aug. 13 through Aug. 31.

Tickets will be available at the district administration office, 514 W. Avenue G. Only those whose names appear on the seating chart may claim the tickets. This may be accomplished in person, by mail with the ticket holder's personal check, or by a third party presenting the ticket holder's personal check.

Beginning Sept. 3, any remaining season tickets will be sold on a first-come, first-served basis. These must be purchased at the administration office during regular business hours.

There are four categories of season tickets available. Reserved-seat season tickets for varsity games are \$17.50. Student season tickets, which admit the holder to ALL games, are available for \$15. Adult general admission (which are for junior high, freshman and junior varsity games) are \$7.50 each.

If there are reserved-seat tickets available after the season starts, they will be sold at \$4 per game on the day of the game, also at the administration office.

Fans who purchase the \$17.50 reserved-seat option for varsity games also may buy the \$7.50 pass for the other games.

Train smacks tractor-trailer parked on tracks

A southbound tractor-trailer rig was hit by an eastbound train Tuesday afternoon just north of "The Crossroads" in Muleshoe.

Witnesses said the semi was parked on the railroad tracks while waiting for a traffic signal to change, and was pinned in by vehicles in front of and behind it.

The truck driver was not injured, but 24-year-old Joe Reyes of Muleshoe was treated and released at Muleshoe Area Medical Center after being hit by debris.

Reyes' van was struck by pieces of the farm equipment being hauled by the truck.

The truck's cargo suffered heavy damage, and the train pushed the truck's trailer all the way across the northbound lanes of U.S. 84, closing all four lanes of the highway.

Muleshoe police did not return a call asking for the name of the truck driver involved.

The truck had Chihuahua license plates and also had "Pedro Wiebe Friessen" written on the side.

ACT to be given at Lazbuddie

Combest predicted Senate OK of farm bill

U.S. Rep. Larry Combest said Friday morning in a teleconference with area media representative that he believes the Senate will approve a farm bill with funding in the range of \$5.5 billion, rather than the \$7.5 billion being pushed by

some Senate Democrats.

Late in the day, the Senate did just that rather than face a possible Bush veto.

Combest pointed out that President Bush had said he would veto a bill calling for the higher figure.

Combest, chairman of the House Agriculture Com-

mittee, is a major force behind the \$5.5 billion farm bill, which was reported out of his committee last week.

He said senators understood that the choice was not between \$5.5 billion and \$7.5 billion — "it's a choice between \$5.5 billion and nothing."

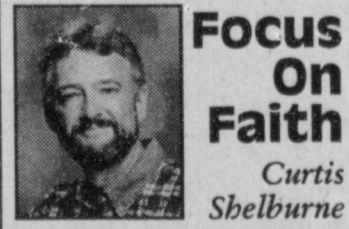

I tried to be gracious in my "No, thank you." I appreciated their kindness and trust, and nobody likes to be pitied or treated with condescension, even people whose nerves probably tend to be a bit frazzled anyway and who are trying to make the best out of life in a large metropolitan area.

But I think a few questions might help them get a feel for why a guy from Muleshoe might be tempted to view them with some degree of, well, pity.

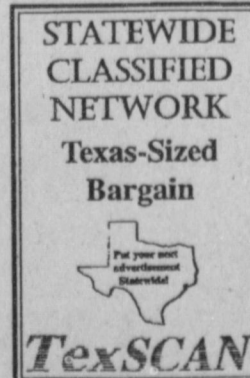

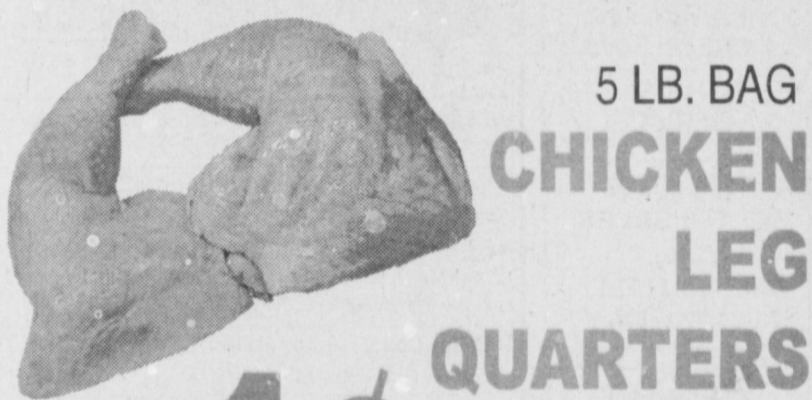
