

City Successful In Combating Mosquitoes

The group voted to patch all insecticides was secured to spray the city area Friday to further guard against the mosstreets that are in need of repair, with cold mix asphalt, as soon as possible. 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Plains Cotton Production Estimates Upped to 1,608,000 Bales

The second estimate of cotton production on the Plains for this season, jointly compiled by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange and Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., adds up to 1,608, 000 bales, up 109,000 bales over the 1,498,750 bales esti-

mated on August 1, The significant factor in the increase, of course, has been the abnormally heavy rainfall throughout the Plains area during the month of August, Using the Lubbock station as an example, total precipitation for the month this year was 8,85 inches. This is the highest on record and 7,17 inches above

But observers are hedging the September 1 crop prediction against abnormal weather in September. Continued above normal moisture and below normal temperatures would un-doubtedly multiply the adverse effect already seen on area crops, both in quantity and quality,

Mills buying cotton wish to receive it in its natural state, without additives. Any additive that is put on cotton before it arrives at the mill will certainly cause complications in the manufacturing of that cotton into
