> DAIRY COWS SHOULD BE FED PROPERLY

Good dairy cows, while milking, should not be overly fat. They can well be fed enough to put on some flesh during the dry period and should be fed so as to keep in rood condition while in milk The general principles for correct feed-ing are (1) feed a balaced ration, (2) feed according to production -all the good roughage that the BAND TO BE ORGANIZED cow will consume and generally 1 pound of concentrates for each 3 to 3½ pounds of milk produced. If a balanced ration is fed and the

cow gets too fat, the amount of feed should be reduced somewhat If she is producing heavily and getting too poor in flesh, she is either not receiving enough feed or the ration is not properly bal-
