

DEFENSE WORK LEADERS SPEAK

Various Phases of Civilian Aid Necessary in Time of Emergency Are Discussed

A small, but very enthusiastic, crowd turned out Tuesday night in the first city-wide defense meeting, heard several addresses by leaders of civilian defense groups, and then signed up for volunteer help of all kinds in cases of emergency.

The group present was disappointingly small, and one man attending said it appeared that it would take "more than a bombing of the city itself to awaken the town to the present emergency." Mayor J. C. Wells, coordinator

of defense units in the city, presided during the meeting, and opened the session with the declaration that the city must "be prepared," no matter how remote the possibility of an air raid might be at the present time.





TAKE CARE OF YOUR TIRES

THOSE TIRES you have on your automobile or truck at the present time may be the same tires you will have a year or more from now, so you had better take good care of them.

The sale of new tires is to be prohibited in the future, except on tractors, physicians' cars, and a few other types of vehicles, and the government is urging all motorists to use care in driving from now OFF

Retreaded tires will continue to be sold, unless the present ruling is changed. A car owner may also have his old tires retreaded.

Here are a few observances which the Office of Production Management is, asking of car owners: Use tires as long as possible by having them retreaded. The cost is about half that of a new tire. and retread wear is about 80 per cent of that of a

new tire. Inflate tires weekly. Never let the pressure fall more than three pounds below recommended mini-

Reduce speed. Tires run at 40 miles per hour last twice as long as at 60 miles per hour.

Avoid short stops and jack-rabbit starts. They burn rubber Avoid hitting curbs, holes, rocks, bumps. That

increases wear and encourages blowouts. Cheek wheel alignments twice a year. A tire al

half-inch out of line drags sideways 87 feet per mile and causes uneven wear. Repair cuts, leaks, breaks promptly. Delay in-

creases damage. Use blowout patches only temporarily. Use vulcanizing. Swap wheels around every 5,000 miles. Tires last

Use only tires that fit your rims. Have your ga-

rage man advise you. Cooperate to save rubber. Waste is sabotage. Do not speed around curves. Use your car only when essential. Use public transportation where possible.




