Photography in Color Is Science **Just Developing**

AUSTIN, Jan. 11. — Always keenly interested in making pictures, whether of flowers, clouds or less etheral subjects, Dr. J. M. Kuehne, professor of physics at the University of Texas, has turned his attention to one of the latest developments in his field, color photography.

"Color photography is a science which enables one to obtain a real impression of persons and things," he said. "Another attractive feature is the relatively small amount of work which has been done along these lines. The field is open for improvement and advancement."

The process of taking colored pictures does not differ greatly from the ordinary process of making snapshots, Dr. Kuehne explained. The only requirements are a good kodak, high speed lens, and a special type of film.

Dr. Keuhne has had unusual success in using German ultra- ter and sister, Miss Alpha Youree. speed films which enable the photographer to snap pictures of moving persons or animals. The colors are imparted to the picture by a finely woven color screen ton Harrison. which is compressed in each glass. The colors are reproduced from the primary tints of red, green, and blue. From these, any desired color may be obtained.

Prof. Mason Ladd of the University of Iowa discussed needed changes in the law of evidence before the 32nd annual meeting of the Association of American Law Schools, in Chicago recently.

There are ways, says Prof. Ladd, by which we can make the conviction of guilty persons easier with-out increasing the hazards which an innocent man must face when he goes to trial. One of them is by tightening up the laws governing an alibi defense.

Let us provide, suggests Prof. Ladd, that where an accused person plans to plead an alibi he be required to give notice to the state's attorney in advance of the trial.

As things stand now, a man being tried in San Francisco can assert that he was in New York when the crime was committed, and it is practically impossible for the prosecution to meet his claim when it is sprung suddenly in the middle of the trial.


If advance notice were required, the state could make the necessary investigation ahead of time and marshal evidence to refute the claim, if the claim were false. Some states already have such a law; Prof Ladd suggests that the law should be made universal.

Then, he continues, the state should be allowed to comment when a prisoner takes advantage of his constitutional rights and refuses to testify. In 42 of our states the criminal may refuse to testify and the prosecutor may not remark upon it in any way.

may no innocent man's rights would be jeapordized if the state were permitted to draw inferences from such silence.

None of these changes would increase the hazards of an impocent man. As Prof. Ladd suggests, they would simply provide a fair trial for the state as well as for the defense.

Now this sounds quite logical, and would be, were it not for the fact that out of its "take" the track must pay purses, salaries, upkeep of the track, taxes on the property, and other expenses. And it is the strangest thing, but horses have a habit of translating money into hay, oats and straw, and owners, trainers, jockies and handlers also seem to be able to ged rid of their wages in a hurry.

In most states a track cannot take more than 6 to 8 per cent of the money bet. This is regulated by law, and represents the track's fee for acting as a broker -bets being figured as a com-

But did you ever stop to think that most other commodities you buy, such as clothes, refrigerators, cars, food, houses, etc., carry profit, or handling fees which run as high as 200 or 300 per cent?

Now we hold no particular brief for gambling, but if persons must gamble, it seems just as well that they do it at race tracks.




