CHANGE NAME TO ARKANSAW

Committee Decided on Indian Name as Official for State Formerly Called Arkansas.

The Arkansaws were a tribe of Indians who roamed the region which now bears their name. When the French missionaries of the time of Marquette came along, they attempted to reproduce phonetically in French the Indian sounds. So they selected Arkansas" as the best concoction, for the French ending "as" is pronounced as a nasal "agh." As for Kansas, Cortez pronounced it Kansaw. In a military report sent at the time, the name was spelled Konsa, for that was the nearest the English could come to reproducing, phoneti-

In the early days of Arkansas the pronunciation of the name of the state was a variable thing. From 1844 to 1848 Arkansas was represented in the senate by Chester Ashley, who was a New Englander, and Ambrose Simms, who halled from Tennessee, Mr. Ashley didn't depart from "Arkansas," and Mr. Simms stuck to "Arkansaw." The vice president at the time was George M. Dallas of Pennsylvania, who, it must be admitted, showed much tact; for when he spoke of the state to Ashley be said "Arkansas," and when he mentioned it to Simms he said "Arkan-Finally a committee was appointed to settle the matter definitely and Arkansaw won.

Represented by \$3,668 members, the American Red Cross penetrates to nearly every part of the world. The nsular and foreign roll call statistics for the past year are a most conclu sive manifestation of the Red Cross spirif carried into the most remote lands. In Europe there are 4.088 members; in Turkey, and active in the Constantinople Chapter, 3.545. China has an enrollment of 2,252; Africa, 186; India, 224, and Australia, 29. Even Vladivostok, in frigid Siberia, has a live chapter with 100 members. The Philippine Islands can mobilize 58,747 under the Red Cross banner and Hawaii 7,863. The total funds raised through foreign and insular membership enrollment and sent to national headquarters in Washington mounted to \$60,216.54, while an additional \$33,350 was forwarded for the endowment fund of the American Red Cross. The high seas roll call in 1922 was an inspiring success. The Navy signed on 4,331 for the Red Cross and the merchant ships 4,141. RED CROSS HELPS WAR'S SUFFERERS

Aids 200,000 Veterans and Their Families-27.000 Disabled Still in Hospitals.

SPENDS \$5,866,255 IN YEAR

Individual Attention Assured to All Physically Ailing or in Distress.

Washington. - War service five years after the armistice, which on November 11 the American Red Cross marks with the opening of the annual membership canvass, shows that during the past year assistance was extended by the Red Cross to some 200, 000 ex-service men or their fami lies. To 130 hospitals throughout the country approximately 75,000 ex-servfee men were admitted for treatment, and to 63,296 of these men definite and specialized service was extended, the Red Cross annual report discloses. In all hospitals under government operation a total of nearly 27,000 disabled veterans were reported by the Sur geon General of the Army.

These facts of the aftermath of physical and metal disability five years after the World War, and the burden resting upon the relatives and dependents of the ex-service men, show conclusively the great need of the Red Cross to act as a supplementary arm of the government in service to these many thousands of men who wore the uniform of the United States. It should be emphasized that govern ment assistance is necessarily standardized along specified lines affecting them as a whole. The Red Cross service is to the individual man and the solution of his problems. This the Red Cross designates "home service" for its aims to give the loving care and interest of the home to these men undergoing physical reconstitution far from their actual home influences.

Year's Expenditures \$5,866,255 In the year ended last June 30 the Red Cross reports \$3,920,000 suent by its Chapters in extending individual attention to the ex-service men and \$1,946.255 spent by National Headquarters of the Red Cross, a total of \$5,866,257 In behalf of the men called to duty in the World War the Red Cross since July 1, 1917, has spentnearly \$164,000,000. Today there are 2,608 Chapters in as many localities carrying on this work, aiding the individual veteran, assisting his family furnishing creature comforts and

funds to tide over troublesome periods The strong connecting link between the Red Cross and the United States Veterans' Bureau takes the complications out of difficult cases of claims. Solves Serious Problem The financial problem of the ex-service man when traveling to and from hospitals is a serious one, and in meeting this constant demand the Red Cross expended \$138,334.17 during the mances. In Veterans' Bureau hospitals the record of a single month illustrates the large service rendered by the Red Cross. For example, 15,504 new cases required attention, and a total of 26,-007 cases were acted upon; 49,36% letters and 1.863 telegraph messages written, and more than 1,500 entertainments given in recreation houses

for the benefit of the patients. Authorities declare that the present is a critical time in the lives of many of the disabled ex-service men who during the five years since the armistice have developed misgivings

Work Among the "Regulars' Service to the enlisted men of the Army, Navy and Marine Corps is a

charter obligation of the Red Cross, which in the last year recorded over 200,000 cases of amistance extended and 834,420 visits to the sick and disabled. Inquiries by the Red Cross at the request of Government author! ties into the home conditions of soldiers, sailors and marines aggregated 17.714, and there were nearly 6,000 instances where the Red Cross located men for their families.

All these activities constituting a single responsibility of the American Red Cross demonstrated during the year that its "war service" in behalf of the veteran and the man enlisted the nation's defensive arms must forward unfalteringly and with cut stint of funds. Another famous one-legged man was Josiah Wedgwood, the great potter, who was so fastidious that he employed a man, also one-legged, to do nothing but make and polish wooden legs for his use.

In the long roll of lord mayors of Lopdon there is at least one who had a wooden leg.
