#### Water Company Must Remove Its New House

The local water company will have to remove its "notwhat-it-seems" house on the north outskirts of Memphis. So said Mayor J. A. Whaley last night when the City Council was presented with a petition signed by H. H. Roberts, Rrances Anthony and E. P.

Thompson, asking its removal. The petition asked the removal of "the small structure they have recently placed in the intersection of the public road along the north line of city limits, with 16th Street."

It alleged the "structure is in a public dedicated street and public thoroughfare of the city of Memphis and is therefore an illegal enroachment which cannot be authorized by the City Council or any of its officers; the structure is unsightly to the citizens of the vicinity and is an unjust imposition upon the property owners in that vicinity."

The disputed structure is "regulator house."


