### ROAD TO BE OPENED

Operation of the two government canning kitchens in Hall county will begin sometime next week, if equipment continues to arrive and there is no delay in installation work...

Work in preparing the buildings to house the plants has been going on since Monday of this week and additional equipment has been arriving almost daily.

To Run Nine Weeks  
One of the plants will be located in Memphis and one at Turkey. The combined cash outlay for operating labor alone has been set at more than 4,000 for the nine weeks period of operation...

Equipment Arriving  
Pressure cookers, table-type canners and sealers will be used in the two kitchens. Most of the equipment arriving for use in the Hall county plants is being sent from plants that have been discontinued in other sections of the state.

Laborers for the operation of the plants will be selected from the county relief rolls. Supervisors for the two plants will be selected from non-relief labor...

Labor to Rotate  
Approximately eight or 10 persons will be employed daily at each of the plants in the county, and laborers will be rotated on the relief work plan in operation in the state.

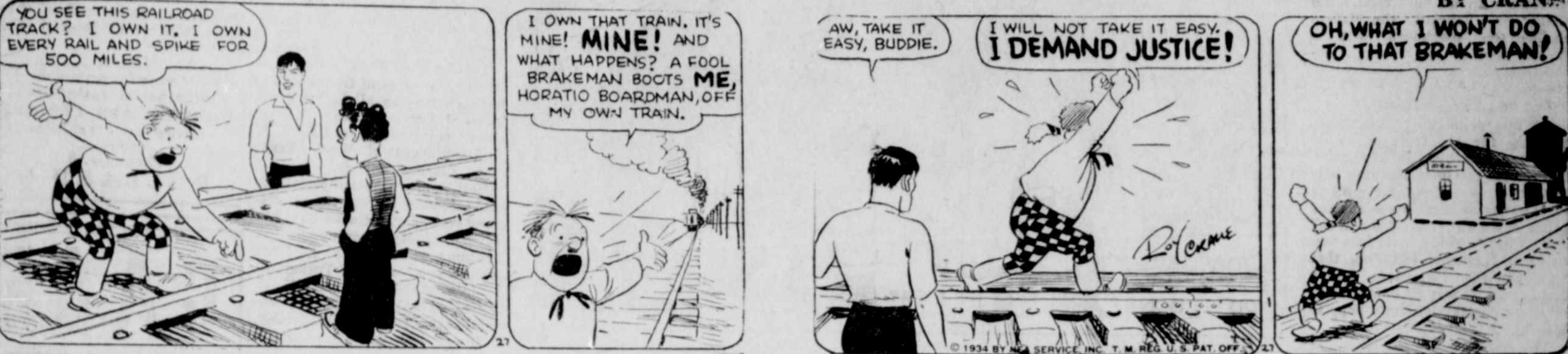

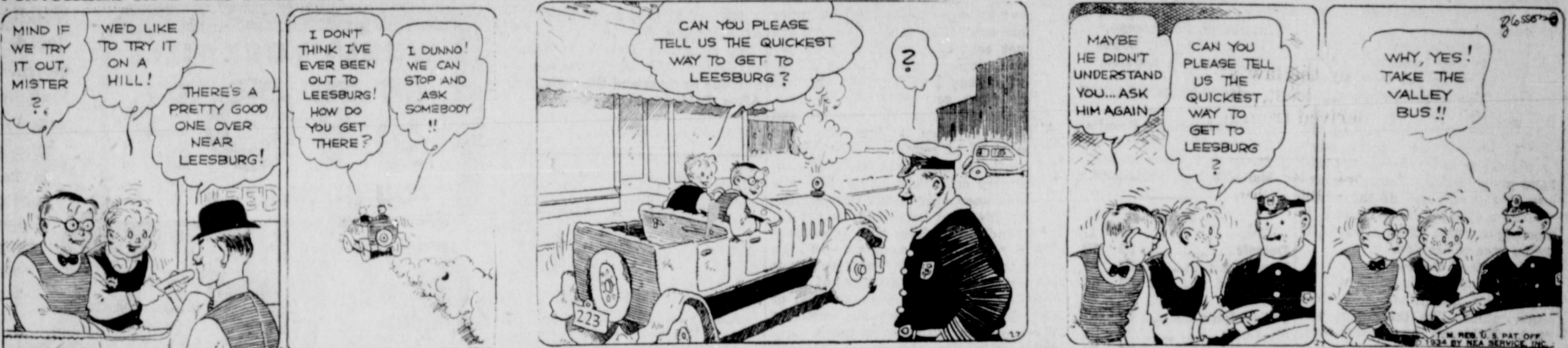

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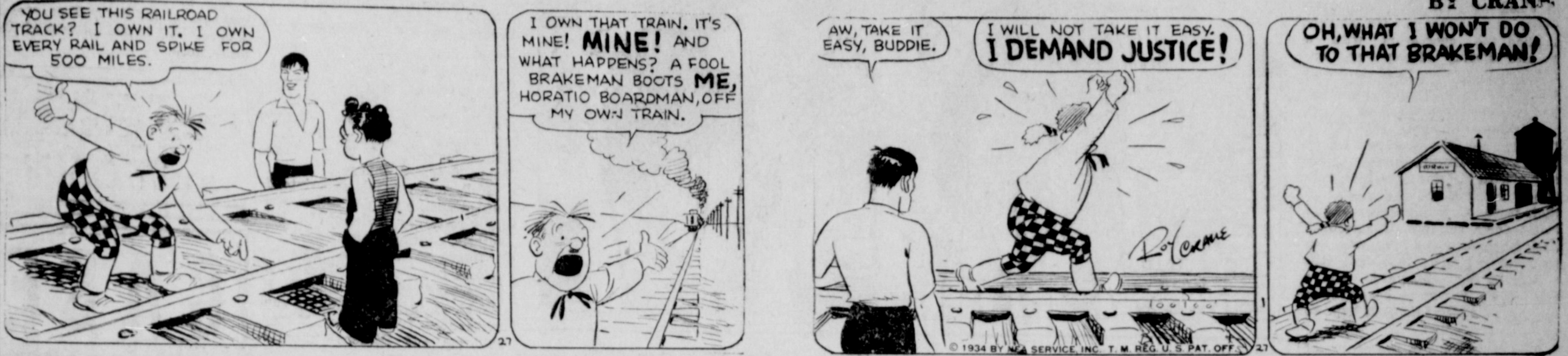

# Cyclone Holds Night Workout; Ready for Children

## 200 FANS SEE CLUB FLASH POWER

### Great Display Ends Preparations for Invasion

With floodlights beaming, the Memphis Cyclone passed, ran and kicked all over Fair Park field last night—their first night workout of the season—while approximately 200 fans looked on.

As they prepared for their first real test of the season, their invasion tomorrow night of Childress to clash with an old rival, the Class A Bobcats, the players thrilled the spectators with a greater display of pep and enthusiasm than they have shown all season.

#### Send Out Warning

At one point they sent out a warning for the Cats to be on their guard. During dummy scrimmage, with the lines charging only lightly but the backs doing all in their power to break up passes and bring down runners, Quarterback Jack Norman shot a long, true toss to Ross Springer, left end, that was good for 50 yards and a touchdown. It was as beautiful as any pass a spectator could hope to see.

The clubs were in the center of the field, fairly close to the east sideline. Springer flashed down and across the field. Norman's fling was perfect. It sailed over the defensive half, whom Springer had passed up, and the wingman took the ball on a dead run, about 25 yards down the field, and raced across the west sideline for the remaining 25 yards.

#### Complete Many Tosses

This was one of numerous tosses completed to several receivers, and a number were knocked down—but it was an example of perfect aerial work.

The players also flashed through blocking drills while tacklers rushed down under punts. They displayed real viciousness and fair accuracy in this department. They sped through signal drills and sprinted after passes, all with a spirit that gladdened the hearts of the gridiron lovers and make the squad look entirely different from the one that loafed around Tuesday afternoon.

If last night's first drill under the arcs is any indication of the manner in which the Cyclone will play football tomorrow night, the large host of fans who follow the club to Childress, as well as the 1,000 Childress fans, the number estimated to see the game, will have many thrills in store regardless of the outcome of the game, which, although the Cyclone is meeting a touted Class A outfit, is by no means decided.

#### Head Delegation

The Memphis delegation will be headed by the Black and Gold band, which, like the team, will go to Childress in a school bus, and the high school pep squad, which will make the trip in individual automobiles.

Word from Childress states that the Bobcats have drilled hard and long on blocking and tackling, departments in which they showed weakness against Poly at Fort Worth last week, and on pass defense, indicating that they are expecting plenty of trouble in this department tomorrow night.

#### Cats To 'Dress Up'

The Cats will be "decked out" in new, flashy uniforms tomorrow night. They will wear blue trousers with red stripes up the sides and blue jerseys with red trimmings and white numerals.

Coach Joe Gibson has shifted his line-up considerably this week in an attempt to find the strongest possible combination to use against Memphis, and so far has given no indication of his starters.

The game will be called at 8 o'clock. The Cyclone will take only a light drill this afternoon.

ed out yesterday. All ginners in the county are urged by Mr. Jackson to report all interim certificates to the agent's office immediately so that the permanent cards may be issued as quickly as possible.

Only the 90 per cent allotment certificates are being issued at the present. Ten per cent reserve allotments on the 1933-34 crops have not been approved and certificates on these exemptions will be issued at a later date, it was pointed out yesterday by Mr. Jackson.

sumption per residential customer has more than doubled, yet we are not collecting as much in dollars and cents per customer as we did when they used less than one half as much service. While we have materially improved service, and have supplied a large increased amount of service, government statistics show that the utility industry collects from the domestic customer only about one percent of his total household budget expenditure, while the investment by utility companies in facilities to render such service is many times that required of other household items, such as food or clothing, for which the customer pays over 20 times as much.

"Utilities companies, through private capital and private initia-

tive, supply more electric service in the United States than is supplied from any other source in all the rest of the world; and yet it is surprising to learn that this nation pay \$100,000,000 more for the single item of tobacco alone than it does for the total of all household electric service supplied in the United States.

"The West Texas Utilities company believes that in changing from the room count rate schedule, which it proposes to do in all of its 160 communities within the next few months, it can improve its customer relations and sell an increased amount of service. It is with this in mind that we submit the new residential rate schedule. We propose to make this rate change effective with billing rendered from meter readings covering September consumption.
