Honor Badges of Industrial Congress.

At the annual convention of the Texas Industrial Congress in Dallas, on December 13, besides awarding 160 cash prizes aggregating \$10,000 in gold to these Texas farmers who have made the best showing of net profits in the year's competitive crop production, there will be given to the winners the honor badges of the Congress.

The most highly prized decoration of the British military and naval services is the Victoria Cross, a small bronze Maltese cross made from metal taken from the guns captured in the Crimean War. The cross bears the inscription, "For valor." Two are given every year to the soldiers or sailors, if any have been recommended, who have shown the most self-denying bravery in battle,—usually in rescuing the wounded under fire. Everybody in the army and navy is eligible, from the humblest mule-driver or deck-hand to the commanding officer. The cross is worth intrinsically probably as much as thirty cents, but it has been the means of enriching the annals of the British service with deeds of heroism through the call it makes for self-forgetfulness for the general good.

The badges of the Congress are also emblems of honorable achievement; and while no risk of life has been involved, they stand for pluck, persistence and painstaking carried to the highest degree in better farming, the greatest constructive work in the world. It is an honor in the State to be the greatest producer of farm products at the lowest cost, to have carried farm living a step further toward success and better conditions. The badges are awarded in this spirit, and should be so received and worn by those who have won them, and so viewed by the people of the sections from which the winners come.

The badges are enamelled medallions suspended from the clasps by blue, red, white and yellow ribbons. The blue ribbon with a medallion in Roman gold indicates the winner of the first prize in each class; the red ribbon with the medallion in rose gold, the winner of the second prize; the white ribbon with the silver medallion, the winner of the third prize; and the yellow ribbon with the medallion having a bronze finish the winners of all other prizes.

While intrinsic value has nothing to do with what the badge stands for,—as shown by the Victoria Cross,—the badges of the Congress are handsome enough in design and finish to be worn with pride for their beauty alone as well as for the high honor which they represent.

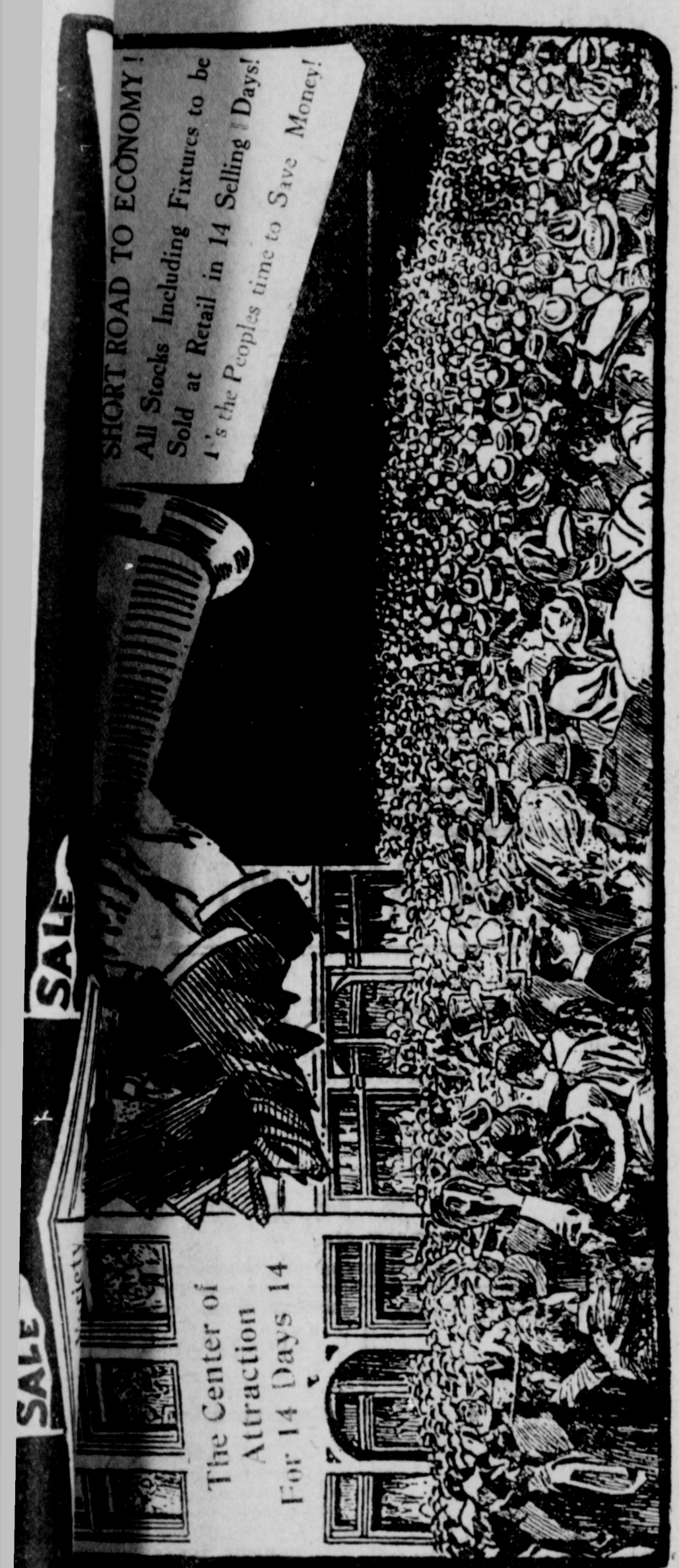
