SCHOOL TO BE STARTED HERE SEPTEMBER 7

The Memphis Public Schools will open for the Fall and Winter term on Monday, September 7, according to information given out this week.

The Memphis Schools enjoyed a very pleasant, profitable and satisfactory term last year enrolling 1,142 pupils as against 981 the year before. We expect to enroll 1,500 before the present school year passes.

Memphis High School has extended her affiliated list to 26 1/2 units and on account of the varied course of study and high standard of work done, has been placed on the affiliated list of all Southern and Eastern Universities and Colleges.

Memphis, Panhandle, Amarillo, Quana and Plainview are the only schools in this section of the state enjoying this honor.

The boundary lines between the ward buildings are subject to change from time to time as the shift in population, or the equipment of the various schools may necessitate.

Since the West Ward building was overcrowded last year, it will be necessary to bring the dividing line a little farther West this time. Until further announcements, the territory assigned for each building will be as follows:

All high school pupils in the city will report to the High School Building.

All children in the first to fourth grades, inclusive, living east of Fifth Street will attend the East Ward School.

All children in the fifth and sixth grades who live east of Fifth Street will attend the West Ward School.

All children in the first to sixth grades, inclusive, living west of Fifth Street will attend the West Ward School.

Children living outside the corporate limits of the city of Memphis and attending the Memphis Schools may be assigned to the school nearest them.

All children who are legal residents of the city of Memphis and who are between the ages of seven and twenty-one may receive free instruction in the public schools.

Pupils admitted under school age shall pay tuition at the rate of \$2.50 per month.

Children of non-resident parents may be admitted to the schools on payment of tuition to the principal in advance each month.

The rate of tuition for such pupils shall be \$2.50 per month in the first to sixth grades and \$5.00 per month in the High School.

The word "month" is used in the sense of scholastic month or month of twenty school days.

Pupils who are transferred to the Memphis Independent District shall be given credit for their state money.

After such term of free instruction has expired, said child shall pay for any further time at the regular rate of tuition for the grade in which he is.

A conference of all Memphis teachers is called for Saturday morning, September 5, at 9 o'clock in the High School Building.

Boy Scouts To Run City And County

Last Friday night in the general election held by the Scouts of Memphis, the following were elected: County Judge, James Hammond; County Attorney, James A. Anthony; County Clerk, Eldon Thompson; Sheriff, Billy Johnson; Tax Collector, Vance Johnson; Treasurer, J. G. Gardner; County Superintendent, T. J. Dunbar; Tax Assessor, Donald Shepherd; Justice of the Peace, David Hudgins; Constable, Everett Ross; Mayor, Adrain Odum; City Attorney, Russell Baldwin; Chief of Police, Sterling Greenwood.

These boys are to have charge of all these offices during Saturday and will be assisted by the actual holders of the said offices. This is done for the purpose of giving the boys actual training in citizenship and in governmental affairs.

Some interesting cases may be tried in some of the courts. Officers will appoint as many other Scouts as deputies as they may need, and all traffic and other laws will be enforced. The anti-muffler law will likely be put into effect that day also.

The citizenship is asked to assist the boys in carrying on the governmental machinery of Memphis and of the county on that day.

Boosters From Abilene Invade Memphis Tues.

The special train carrying the Abilene Fair Boosters arrived in Memphis Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock, according to schedule time.

They were met at the depot by the Memphis Chamber of Commerce Band together with a large delegation of Memphis citizens to welcome them to our city.

The Abilene delegation began falling off the train and formed a line of march with the Abilene Cowboy Band leading. A completed circuit of the public square was made in the line of march and brought up on the East side of the court house, where several Abilene speakers were introduced.

Each speaker was very profuse in his compliments of Memphis, stating that they had been greeted with a more cordial welcome than at any other place on their entire trip.

Each speaker took occasion to compliment Memphis on the civic endeavors along all lines. Stating that Memphis was the cleanest, prettiest town they had seen on their entire trip.

There were about one hundred and twenty-five in the excursion. The Simmons University Cowboy Band was with them, making music for the occasion.

A quartette from the band sang a parody on "Howdy Do, Doodle do," that was very appropriate and greatly enjoyed by the large crowd.

During the thirty minute stay in Memphis the Abilene boosters scattered over the city distributing advertisements for the West Texas Fair which will be held at Abilene September 21-26, 1925.

They were all jolly, good-natured and a gentlemanly crowd, and they left a good feeling for Abilene in the minds and thoughts of the Memphis people that will last a long time.

Will Work Road Into Collingsworth

For some time the lower road from Memphis to Wellington has been in very poor state of repair. In recent weeks the Collingsworth County Commissioners have been doing some good work on this road and have put up a good road bed to within two miles of the Swearingen school house.

At this time the road funds played out and they were unable to continue with the work until after the first of the year.

This would be too late for the heavy fall crops in sight and the people living in that territory, being desirous of marketing their products in Memphis, which is a natural market for that territory, have been making strong effort to get the road completed into Memphis.

As a result of this work, the Collingsworth Commissioners have offered to let the citizens have the tools and machinery for building the roads if the finances could be raised to pay for the labor and fuel.

J. W. Dennis and others have been busy the past few days soliciting funds for this purpose. About \$600 has been raised and many others are yet to be seen on this subscription and it is estimated that something like \$1,500 will be raised and that this will be a very low estimate for the building of the eight miles necessary from the county line.

Work will begin next Monday at the Hall and Collingsworth county lines and go East as far as the donations will allow.

This will place Memphis in access of splendid territory which bids fair to market several hundred bales of cotton, not to say anything about the many tons of feed stuff that will come this way by the fact of the building of the good road.

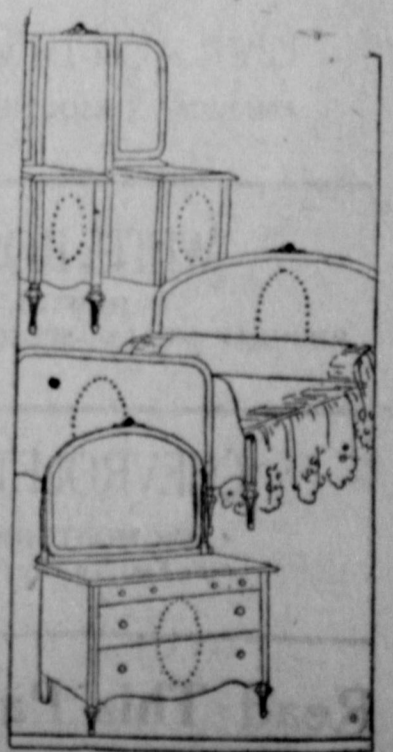

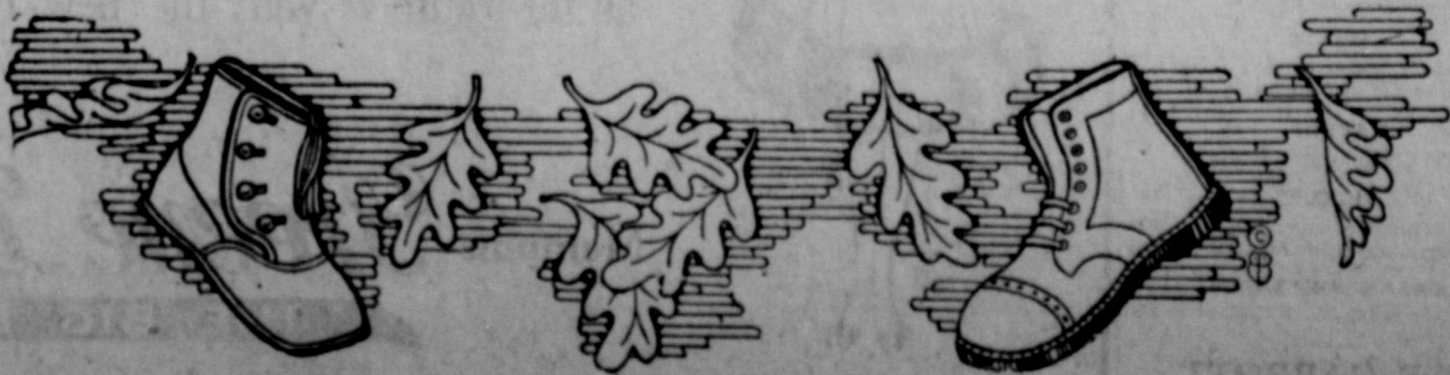
