



### BUSINESS BETTER?

ARE THINGS IN THIS HAPHAZARD WORLD of ours "looking up," or are they becoming worse?

Your answer to this question may be as good as anybody's. In a way it is hard to tell just how things are coming along, and especially in an election year -when one side (the one holding the reigns) tells you how well things are, and the other side pointing out all the bad things about the present power-holders.

Ever since the Democratic party went into power in 1933, the country has been awaiting a solution to the depression problem—and a portion of that solution has been accomplished.

Most any business man will tell you his business is better than it was during the dark ages of 1932 and 1933, although in this particular locality, the government cotton payments spiced the financial pie no small amount.

The national debt, of course, is larger, much larger than before the Democrats took over, but of this debt, a large amount of security can be mentionedsecurity such as loans to needy farmers, dams which prove useful both in creating electric power and in aiding irrigation, and numerous other projects on which money certainly has not been wasted.

The International Uniform Sun-day School Lesson for May 12 Text: Habakkuk 1:12-2:4

THERE is disagreement as to just who Habakkuk was, but there is no disagreement that he left us a powerful message. Habakkuk was a prophet, practically an unknown prophet. Some have said that he was a singer in the Temple choir, as inferred in the last verse of the prophecy (3:19). In any event the world would do well to study his three chapters of

We are reminded that even prophets had their moments of depression. At times their words came like trumpet calls from a mountain top, as in our last lesson concerning the prophet voicing God's great invitation. But at other times they were as souls in the darkness of the night, full of lamentation and crying for the dawn. Habakkuk appears in this




