#### ALLEGED THEFT AND FORGER.

##### A Hunter of Near Brice Loses Bale of Cotton Through Forgery.

Tuesday morning we were surprised by a gentleman by the name of M. A. Hunter living in the Brice neighborhood calling our office and asking us if we knew anything about a man by the name of J. W. Clements. Some time ago, a man by the name of J. W. Clements went into the Brice neighborhood to make a demonstration with a bolling machine which he said he patented. This said Clements was accompanied by a man by the name of Watrus, who represented himself as working for the Hall County Herald, and who proposed to be taking items for a writeup. Mr. Hunter, had some cotton here in Memphis at the time of the demonstration and desired to have the same transferred to another place in the city. In order to keep from making a long trip to Memphis, Mr. Hunter asked J. W. Clements if he would have the transfer made for him, which Clements consented to do. Upon arriving here in Memphis, it was alleged that Clements forged an order signing the name of M. A. Hunter, authorizing Clements to have the bale ginned and turned over to him. This was done and it is supposed that Clements did the cotton and skipped the country as nothing has been heard of him since about that time. Mr. Hunter was in Memphis yesterday looking for Watrus as a witness against Clements, but he did as well look for a needle in a haystack as to look for Watrus, who is known to have swindled several people here in Memphis before he left for parts unknown, and as far as we can hear of him swindled everybody who had dealings with him. We understand this man Clements skipped for some part of Tennessee. We trust Mr. Hunter will be able to get the price of the bale of cotton and also have the offending parties brought to justice.

#### Death of Morgia Ella Pulley.

On Monday of last week an operation was performed on Miss Morgia, for appendicitis. It was thought that she was getting along as well as could be expected until Saturday afternoon at 12:30 her gentle spirit passed away caused by peritonitis following the operation for appendicitis. No one can explain why a young girl, such as was Morgia, should be called away from this life at such a tender age as sixteen years, eight months and twenty-nine days. She had not a thought that was not a gentle one. She was sorely needed here. She was the light of the eyes to her relatives and friends, but the light has gone out. To them she was as sunshine is to the world, and this eclipse bring both darkness and chill.

Her funeral was held Saturday afternoon, April 1st, at the Methodist church at five o'clock. Funeral services held by Rev. B. W. Dodson of the Methodist church.

Interment took place at fairview cemetery where her remains were tenderly laid to rest by loving hands.

#### CENSUS REPORT FOR MEMPHIS

##### The Report as Shown by the Statistical Report From Washington.

The Democrat office received a press proof from Washington Monday morning giving the census report of the state of Texas by counties, cities and precincts. Following is the report as given in this report:

Hall County 8,279; Precinct one including Memphis City 2,946; Memphis City 1936; Precinct two 2556; Precinct three, 1596; Precinct four, 597; Precinct five, 584.

At the time the census was taken there were quite a number of people out of the city which were not counted and the amount as shown in this report is more than three hundred short of what our enumerator says he turned in.

We object to the authenticity of this report and we are willing to go our part towards having another count made of Memphis city. We think it is due to the citizenship of the city that another true and correct count be made. There has been a cog slipped somewhere. Who will join us in a new count?

#### CITY ELECTION OF TUESDAY.

##### Much Interest Manifested in Race for Mayor and Aldermen in Wards Two and Three.

The city election of Tuesday was the warmest city election ever held in Memphis. For several days the interest in the mayor's race and for aldermen in wards two and three has been growing warmer and warmer. Following is the count by wards as received by each candidate:

For Mayor, ward 1; Greenwood 19, Grundy 15; Alderman, Cobb 32.

#### Ward Two

For Mayor, Greenwood 62, Grundy 63; Aldermen, Thompson 50, Gamble 48, Baldwin 75, Harriaon 52.

#### Ward Three.

For Mayor, Greenwood 40, Grundy 84; Alderman, Walker 56, Read 64.

#### Ward Four.

For Mayor, Greenwood 9, Grundy 14, Alderman, Montgomery 24.

In ward two there was one alderman to be elected and one to be appointed, but as the election order called for two aldermen to be elected there were four candidates in the race. Mr. Baldwin will be the elective alderman and Mr. Harrison will more than probably be the appointive candidate as he was second man in the race.

In the mayor's race Mr. Grundy won over his opponent, Mr. Greenwood, by a majority of 46.

The newly elected officers are all well qualified gentlemen and conservative business men and the city's affairs will be handled along the same high business plane which these gentlemen conduct their own business affairs. With such a set of live energetic men as these just elected at the helm, Memphis will make great strides during the next two years.

## EXPLANATION AGAIN DEMANDED BY HARRIS

San Marcos Pastors Denounce  
Governor in Strong Terms for  
Removing Normal Head.

San Marcos, Texas, March 31.—Hinting that he may have farther statements to make, T. G. Harris, who was dismissed from the principalship of the State Normal School here, issued another open letter today. This letter asks again that the governor make public the reasons for Mr. Harris' dismissal.

"Possibly I may be permitted

to add," the letter says, in closing, "not as a threat, but as a prediction, that in case I can by no sort of appeal get you to explain the case to the public I may ultimately conclude that it is my duty, as a last report, to make all the facts known to the people. Then I shall not hesitate to enter upon the discharge of that duty."

In a communication addressed to the "Christian and Liberty Loving People of Texas," the pastors of the San Marcos churches make a strong protest against the removal of Mr. Harris and demand that the governor

make a full explanation of his action. The statement says among other things.

"Why was he removed? He is a statewide prohibitionist. He voted against Governor Colquitt in the July primaries. He criticized him years ago through the columns of the Texas School Journal, of which he was then the editor.

"Every voter knows that his removal was in the hands of the governor, since the governor appoints his own secretary of state. According to reliable information Prof. Harris was removed primarily because as a free citizen he dared to differ from the policy of the present governor (then a state senator) as a public official, and to say so in the columns of a paper.

"As to the manner of his removal, Prof. Harris was removed without any notice, without a hearing and without any investigation.

"Against such an attempt to abridge the freedom of men; against such an exhibition of petty personal spite; against plunging our state school system into personal politics, we do most solemnly protest. Such policy is an attempt to make political puppets of our teachers, and to keep our schools in the turmoil of political contention."

2-Year-Old Baby Kidnaped; \$12,000 Paid For Return.

Las Vegas, N. M., March 31.—Two masked men forced entrance into the home of A. T. Rogers, a lawyer, at 11 o'clock Wednesday night and compelled Mrs. Rogers to surrender her 2-year-old baby. The kidnapers left a note for Mr. Rogers, demanding \$12,000 in cash if the parents wanted their baby back alive, and directed that the money be paid at midnight last night.

The money was paid and the child recovered. One of the kid-

napers was partially identified as Dennis Hart, a notorious postoffice and bank robber, who recently broke jail at Albuquerque.

Entering the mother's bedroom the two masked men pointed revolvers at Mrs. Rogers and demanded the baby. She offered them her jewels, silverware and other valuables but they told her they had been waiting for months for an opportunity to steal the little fellow. She complied.

Almost insane through the fear that harm would come to her child, the mother gave no alarm until yesterday when she secured the money from local bankers and at the appointed hour her brother-in-law drove alone to a remote point in the mountains eleven miles from Las Vegas, where the kidnapers received the money. He was then directed to drive fifteen miles in the opposite direction where in a ravine by the roadside he found the little one wrapped in blankets and asleep. He returned the child unharmed to its mother and not until then were officers informed of the kidnaping. This gave the abductors several hours start.

### Cutting Expenses.

On account of dull business on the Fort Worth and Denver all the way from Texline to Fort Worth, the Denver road is now cutting train crews, sections hands and shop men off for three months. At Childress the shop was laid off for a week and some of them for three months. Business seems to be very dull all along the line from Fort Worth to Texline. This will be a long lay off for some of the men.

to be established at Gonzales  
by an Indiana firm.

THE Good Roads movement  
struck Hardin County and a  
issue of \$35,000 has just  
been voted and the work of  
building roads will begin at  
once.

CLARKESVILLE is preparing to  
issue bonds to the amount of  
\$20,000 for the improvement of  
public highways in Red River  
county.

REMEMBER the bridge bond  
election on Saturday, April 22.  
The bridge and lets have  
the best roads and bridge of any  
county in the state.

BEND COUNTY has just issued  
\$500,000 in bonds for road  
improvement and the work of  
constructing good roads in that  
county is to begin immediately.

CALDWELL COUNTY has voted  
to issue of \$50,000 for build-  
ing macadam roads. This pro-  
ject has already voted \$50,000  
road building and 24 miles of  
macadam roads have been built  
recently.

COLORADO has issued road  
bonds to the amount of \$30,000  
which have been approved by  
the Attorney General, and the  
building and improvement of  
roads in Mitchell County will be  
started at once.

TEXAS is one of the world's  
best centers for the produc-  
tion of oil and natural gas, and  
is being shipped to all parts  
of the world from the Texas  
fields. New fields are being  
developed almost daily.

THE Road Commissioners of  
our County held a meeting  
recently and decided to establish  
a permanent road gang, equipped  
with road building machinery  
under competent super-  
vision. A campaign for good  
roads will be carried on in that  
county.

THE Texas commercial Secre-  
taries' Association has issued a  
relation map of Texas show-  
ing the Federal Census of 1910  
counties. This map is use-  
ful for the general information  
it contains in convenient  
form and will be especially  
valuable in redistricting the  
state into Congressional, State  
Legislative and State Repre-  
sentative Districts which will be  
part of the work of the next  
session of the Legislature.

CAPTAIN LUDLAM of Cape  
May, N. J. is establishing a large  
ice plant on Steadman  
land, two miles from the  
shoreland of the Aransas Pass  
and will engage in deep  
sea fishing. A number of large  
ice boats have already ar-  
rived and others are on the way  
from the Atlantic coast. The  
ice will be packed in cars at the  
Aransas Pass wharf and will be  
shipped to Northern markets.  
The plant will have a packing  
and shipping capacity of 175,000

**Capturing a Lion.**

had never been touched. The  
next step was to secure some  
object, tempting enough to at-  
tract Mr. Lion to the place. A  
live lamb was bought and hung  
by a strong cord from the limb  
of a tree that reached over the  
covered pit. All these prepara-  
tions were made late in the  
evening.

That night the Monarch of the  
forest, while stalking for prey,  
heard the lamb bleating and  
made a spring for it; catching it,  
of course the string broke, and  
the lion and lamb both went  
crashing down into the pit.  
At daybreak the natives  
brought a large net which they  
threw down over the Lion in the  
pit. In his rage at being caught,  
and his efforts to claw his way  
free from the net covering him,  
he only got more tangled up in it,  
till at last he was so thoroughly  
enmeshed that the natives had  
little trouble in placing him in a  
strong crate and he was a cap-  
tive.

### ATTACKED BY TWO COWS

**Paris Lady Has Narrow Escape From Death in a Lot**  
Paris, Texas, March 31.—Mrs.  
J. T. Scott of Ross Avenue, was  
attacked by two cows and seriously  
injured at 6:30 o'clock this  
morning, when she went to the  
lot to milk. One of the cows  
had a calf two weeks old. It had  
become wedged in between the  
gate and post and was unable to  
extricate itself.

When Mrs. Scott entered the  
lot its mother, already maddened  
by the calf's distress, made a  
savage rush at her. The other  
cow joined in the attack. After  
knocking their victim down the  
animals attempted to trample  
her and would have succeeded  
had not Mr. Scott and neighbors  
attracted by her cries and the  
bellowing of the cows, rushed to  
her rescue and beat the cows off  
with sticks.

Mrs. Scott's left ear was in-  
jured and she sustained a num-  
ber of bruises about the body.  
She was carried into the house  
prostrated from the shock, but  
has recovered.

### PRO ELECTION ORDER IS SIGNED

**Proclamation Calls for Self-Enactment, Contrary to Constitution.**  
Austin, March 31.—Governor  
Colquitt today signed the election  
proclamation for the election up-  
on the prohibition constitutional  
amendment July 22. The procla-  
mation sets forth in full the pro-  
visions of the resolution. It  
was today noted that the resolu-

tion providing for the election  
calls for self-enactment of the  
constitutional amendment in the  
event that it is adopted, while  
the constitution expressly de-  
clares that the governor shall de-  
clare the result of the election.

Who but a woman, when man turned coward, and his trust grew faint, could stand until the last by the dying Saviour, and then go to trim the lamp of her devotion at the door of the sepulchre.

Kind words bring memories that echo through the years long after the lips that uttered them have crumbled to dust. Children carry the memory of words of appreciation with them thru childhood and often recall them in the shadows of life. They

**Victory for Rebels.**

EL PASO, March 31.—Advices from Magdalena, Sonora, by mail, declare that Monday's battle reported from Agua Prieta as a victory for the federals was really a victory for the rebels.

Instead of being ambushed themselves, the rebels ambushed the federals at San Rafael and the federals were driven to a mill at Santa Rosa, where the rebels surrounded them, says the correspondent. Then reinforcements came out from Hermosillo and the battle was raging on Wednesday when the letter was written.

Mail advices yesterday from Hermosillo say of the fighting:

"The battle that is being fought at San Rafael is the most important engagement of the revolution in this state. There are 700 revolutionists and some 1,000 federals. It is a stand up fight.

"Last night the governor here issued a bulletin claiming that in battle seventy-eight rebels had been killed and that the government had lost sixteen killed and twenty-two wounded.

"This morning fifty-six badly wounded federals arrived here from the front. After three days of fighting the government has issued no new bulletin or claimed the victory. The city is waiting. All know the news is bad for the government.

"There is a rumor that 200 Yaquis, who were well armed by the government, have gone over in a body to the revolutionists.

"It is hard to realize that in this age 1,700 men with modern rifles are killing each other with no doctors and no trained help of any kind; as they fall they lie or crawl away."

While reports received here indicated heavy fighting at Pres, Sonora, reports of both Mexican factions declare the report that 1,000 men had been killed on each side is without foundation. Reports of the insurrecto junta here, in close touch with the war zone, declare the insurrecto force, which might have been engaged, numbers but 1,100 and that not more than 2,000 men were engaged on both sides.

The statement from Tucson that the town of San Rafael had been destroyed by fire is discredited of the town consists almost entirely of adobe houses with mud roof, which are fire-proof. It is believed the loss has been heavy, however.

**Boy of Four has Suicidal Mania**  
New York, March 30.—The Kings County hospital in Brooklyn has an unusual patient in youthful Ellisworth McDonald, who, although only 4 years old, is afflicted of pronounced type. The child is apparently normal in other respects.

Almost since birth, the parents say, the boy has been obsessed with a constantly recurring tendency for self-destruction. In trying to kill himself, the child has driven sharp knives into his body, attempted to throw himself into bonfires, swallow poison, pounded his head on the stone pavement and even starved himself for days.

The lad has thrived despite his many suicidal pranks

but his mother a salmost a nervous wreck because of the alarming experiences she has undergone.

The child's favorite time to attempt suicide is when his mother reproves him for a trivial offense. Without hesitation, the child on such occasions has seized a knife and begun hacking away at his face. Several times he has been caught climbing into the kitchen stove and once only the intervention of an aunt kept him from leaping into a bonfire in the street. His eyes were badly bruised on one occasion in an attempt to gouge them out with a teaspoon.

A series of X-ray photographs of the lad's skull are being taken in an effort to ascertain whether any abnormal growth is responsible for his mental condition.

### CALENDAR CHANGE PROPOSED

**London Board of Trade Urges Plan Making same Dates Fall on Same Weeks Each Year.**  
London, March 30.—The British Government is taking immediate steps to ascertain the views of the commercial community of the Kingdom on the question of revising the calendar so that a given date shall always fall on the same day of the week. Inquiries are to be set afoot by the Board of Trade, which is supported in the matter by the Foreign Office and the Home Office.  
The proposals of the calendar reformers are that the first day in the year will be a bank holiday, called New Year's Day, but it is not to be a day of the week or of the month or the quarter. This leaves for the rest of the year 364 days, which divide exactly into four equal quarters of ninety-one days each, and into fifty-two weeks of seven days each. Each quarter is to contain exactly thirteen weeks, divided into two months of thirty days each and one of thirty-one days. Starting in 1912, Easter Sunday and all movable feasts, feasts and dates dependent upon it will be fixed so as to fall in every year on the same day and the same month, as well as on the same day of the week.  
To provide for leap year, a bank holiday and to be called Leap Year Day, in leap year will be inserted between June 31 and July 1. It will not be a day of the week, or of the month or of
