## **PAVING BONDS AUTHORIZED BY** OVERWHELMING MAJORITY VOTE

Total Vote of 486 With 472 For, and 14 Against -Nearly 34 to 1. Many Women Vote.

The proposition for paving the business section submitting the authorization of a \$65,000 bond issue by the City of Memphis was voted on here Tuesday resulting in an overwhelming majority vote for the bond issue.

The heaviest vote in the history of the city was cast, 486 votes being polled, with 472 for and 14 against.

The almost unanimous vote is gratifying and proves the wisdom of the undertaking. It is thought that the work may be begun within the next thirty

The area to be paved will include the public square and the entire business section, about thirteen blocks.

REDUCE POULTRY FEED BILL

Utilization of Table Scrape and Kitch-en Waste is Most Wise and Economical Plan.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

If the chicken flock is to prove an economic success, it must be fed cheaply. All table scraps and kitchen waste Scraps of meat or leftover vegetables

which cannot be utilized in any other way make excellent feed. Many other waste products, such as beet tops, turnip tops, carrot tops, potate farings, onion tops, watermelon and cantaloupe rinds, the outside leaves of cabbages, waste lettuce leaves, and bread and cake crumbs are relished by the hens and can be used to good advantage.

In saving the scraps and waste it is well to separate the portions adapted for feeding to the flock and place these in a receptacle or pail of their own.

Decomposed waste material or moldy bread or cake should never be saved to feed to the hens, as it is harmful to them and may cause serious bowel trouble. Sloppy materials, such as dishwater, should not be thrown into their pail. It is also useless to put in such things as banana peels or the skins of oranges, as these have little or no food value.

Any sour milk which is not utilized in the house should be given to the chickens. This should be fed separate ly, however, either by allowing the hens to drink it or by allowing it to clabber on the back of the stove and feeding it in that condition. When the family's table waste is not sufficient for feeding the flock, it is usually pos-sible to get some of the neighbors who keep no hens to save material suitable for feeding. Many people are glad to do this if a small pail in which to put

the waste is furnished. Table scraps and kitchen waste are best prepared for feeding by running them through an ordinary household food chopper or meat grinder. After the material has been put through the grinder it is usually a rather moist nass, and it is well to mix with it some corn meal, bran or other ground grain until the whole mass assumes a crumbly condition. The usual method is to feed the table scraps at noon or night, or at both times, as may be desired, in a trough or on a board. All should be fed that the hens will eat up clean, and

If any of the material is left after one half or three-quarters of an hour, it should be removed. If allowed to re-main it may spoil and be very bad for




