God's Mercy a Weapon Against

The International Uniform Sun-day School Lesson for April 14 Text: Hosea 6:1-7; 14:4-9.

MOS, prophet of truth and proponent of social justice, denounced the materialistic and grasping generation of his day and warned that the Judgments of God would come against those who exploited the weak and trampled upon the poor.

Such prophets are necessary, but there is another aspect of truth. It concerns the mercy of God, who is full of kindness and forgiveness toward those who seek His ways and turn from evil. The prophet who emphasizes this side of truth is more likely to have in his utterances the note of appeal, the invitation to man to seek this God of love and righteousness and find the fullness of His mercy.

A MOS, of course, stressed this side as well. The whole purpose of his arraignment of the society of his day was to turn men from their evil ways and to build up a true society. But in Hosea, it is this note of appeal that is uppermost. His message is God's forgiving love. It concerns the God whose righteousness rebukes sin, but whose love restores and heals. Like Amos, Hosea represents

this God as desiring goodness and not sacrifice. The knowledge of Him is more than burnt offerings. 



Farmers Have Learned a Lot About Coaxing Crops Out of Parched Land

A MERICA'S ghost lands of the middle west-the Dust Bowl —are becoming less deserted as families pour back to the farms. Once given up as dead. the soil in Kansas and Oklahoma, in the heart of the 1933-37 Dust Bowl, is beginning to sprout crops again. In some sections of the Bowl, residents are actually enjoying a comparative land boom. Shortages of farms for new tenants have been reported. New life has been pumped into an area that appeared destined to become the nation's graveyard of abandoned hopes.

RECENT windstorms in the middle west swirled dust around the Dust Bowl, but they didn't do as much damage as they would have if farmers hadn't been "put wise." Rain would come 'n mighty handy on the plains, but even the shortage of water isn't going to cause the hardship it once did. Farmers have learned a lot about getting along on a rain supply that a few years ago wouldn't have sprouted a radish.


