Depot at Estelline Robbed.

Friday night about eleven o'clock Deputy Sheriff J. E. King was called to Estelline by a wire stating that the depot at Estelline had been broken into and some articles taken. He immediately began making preparation to go and being unable to get a train at that time of night, proceeded to drive through by land, arriving there just as day was breaking Saturday morning. When he arrived, Geo. Henderson and the depot agent sitting up with a man who gave his name as Wood. The robbery occurred between seven and eight o'clock Friday night while the operator was gone up town to get his supper. The big sliding doors on the side of the building had been prized open. After entering, the burglars proceeded to open several packages of express, they found one containing a suit of clothes from one of the mail order tailoring houses. They appropriated this to their own use. They also took a suit of clothes out of a grip belonging to one of the waiting passengers, who was not there just at that time. They went out to the sand hills near the stock yards and there proceeded to dress up, returning to the depot in time to catch the southbound passenger train. During the meantime the robbery had been discovered and when this man Wood and another fellow showed up to board the train, they were at once suspected as the guilty parties by their actions. They were detained from boarding the train and just as the train was leaving the station they both made a dash to get away. Mr. Henderson followed in hot pursuit. Wood was captured and carried back to the depot where watch was kept over him until Deputy Sheriff King arrived. Wood was brought to Memphis and lodged in jail.

The other man that was with Wood made good his escape. His name is supposed to be Tom Page, but Wood says that he thinks his name is Tom Nicholson.

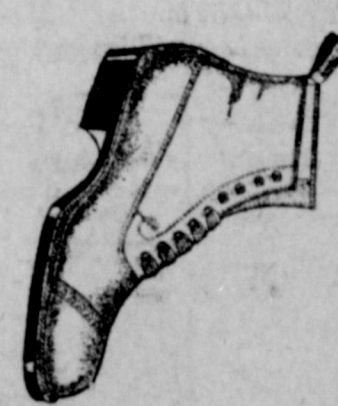
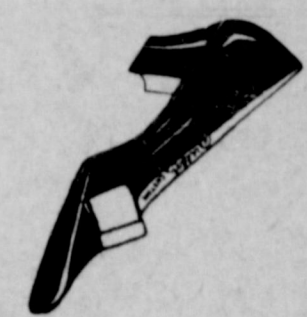

A Man's Strength.

Inasmuch as a man's muscles
develop with use, it would appear
logical that the older he gets the
stronger he should become, but
such is not the case. Experi-
ments made with thousands of
men show that muscles of the
average man have a period of in-
crease and decline, whether he
uses them much or little.
The average youth of seven-
teen has a lifting power of 250
pounds. By his twentieth year
his power has increased to such
degree that he should be able
to exert a lifting power of 320
pounds, while his maximum
power is reached in his thirtieth
year, thirty-first year, 365 pounds
being recorded. At the ex-
piration of his thirty-first year
his power begins to decline, very
gradually at first, falling but
eight pounds by the time he is
forty. From forty to fifty the
decrease of power is somewhat
more rapid, having dropped to
270 pounds at the latter age, the
average lifting power of the man
fifty, therefore, being slightly
greater than that of a man of
twenty. After fifty the decrease
strength is usually rapid, but
the rate of decrease varies so
surprisingly in individuals that
it has been impossible to obtain
accurate data as to average
strength after that age.—Ex.

PRESTIGE LOST: WEAPON GONE.

Cannon Still Speaker, but Shorn of Power of Membership in Committee of Rules.

Washington, March 19.—Joseph Guernsey Cannon of Danville, Ill., is still Speaker of the House of Representatives, but he lost today the ancient prestige and weapon of that office when the allied Republican insurgents and Democrats took from him not only the chairmanship of, but even membership in, the all-powerful Committee on Rules, the chief asset in his stock of power.

Amid scenes of the wildest disorder, for the like of which one must go back to the exciting days just prior to the Civil War, perhaps even those times might not duplicate it; the veteran Speaker, almost 74 years old, stood erect and defiant, his head "blooded but unbowed." And at the end, when a big Texas Democrat accepted the Speaker's daring challenge and introduced a resolution to fling him out of the Speakership, the Republicans, with few exceptions, rallied with almost unbroken party front and gave him a vote which almost offset the "repudiation of Cannonism."

This is what happened: By a vote of 191 to 155, the Republican insurgents voting solidly with the Democrats, the House adopted the resolution of Representative Norris (Rep.) of Nebraska requiring a reorganization of the rules committee, in creating its membership from five to ten and declaring the Speaker ineligible to membership thereon.

By the curiously identical vote of 191 to 155—but with a decidedly different personnel of alignment—the House defeated a resolution by Representative Burfelson of Texas declaring the Speakership vacant and ordering an immediate election of a successor of Mr. Cannon.

A crowd of Memphis young people attended prayer meeting in Giles last Sunday night. We cordially invited them back again.

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
