THREE KILLED IN **QUANAH WRECK**

Dead Were Residents of Quanah; Memphis Man Driving Truck Uninjured

Three Quanah men were killed Tuesday morning when their car collided with a heavily-loaded gasoline truck driven by Delmo Mitchell of Memphis at the intersection of Highway 287 and the by-pass into Quanah, just west of the Quanah city limits.

Killed were J. C. Clements, 62, railroad machinist and driver of the car; S. B. Wells, 73, Quanah farmer; and J. Mark Drake, 75 retired cement worker.

Mitchell was uninjured, although slightly less than 2,000 gallons of gasoline were spilled over the highway. A total of 660 gallons failed to spill from the tank on the truck of the Continental Oil Company, it was reported Wednes





Donley Road Work Bids to Be Taken

A Texas Highway Department County extending for 2.7 miles on state route 18 and U. S. route 287 in and near Clarendon is included in the list of new work for which bids are scheduled to be received at the highway department in Austin at the August road letting August 28 and 29.

PURBING OF THE installment plan buying to the large scale it has reached will put an end to the easy way of purchasing certain high-priced items at a "dollar down and a dollar a week.

The new regulations go into effect September 1, and will affect 24 types of consumer items, the Federal Reserve Board order states.

The order was made to conserve materials for defense purposes, and to prevent inflation. Straight credit by retailers was not curbed, although, generally speaking, it will be illegal for any store or others engaged in the business of giving credit to lend money or give credit without a down payment or to permit the payment of the balance to extend more than 18 months.

Automobile buying will probably be restricted more than any type, since a one-third minimum down payment will be required, and the purchaser will be allowed only 18 months to pay. Previously, down payments could be somewhat smaller, and payments could be made over a 24-month period. This ruling applies both to new and used cars, airplanes, power driven boats, outboard motors, and motorcycles.


