SCOUTING MOVES FORWARD
L AST week the first Boy Scout troop in Hall county was organized. Today four troops are underway in Memphis, Estelline and Turkey, and another is o be organized here soon. Although only one, the American Legion troop here, has applied for a charter with the national organization, plans for the others are being formulated and boys are being interested This is a big step in the progress of the movement since it was started recently, but there is a grea amount of work yet to be done before the organization comes close to reaching every boy who would lik to belong to a troop if given an opportunity to do o and given proper encouragement
According to E. H. Whittington, disrtict chairman, there are 1,200 boys in the county of scout age, and approximately 212 become eligible for membership very year
The American Legion troop started with 11 members on the original application for charter. Although plan to list on their applications, they are not likely to be far above that figure, since they desire to ge the charter as quickly as possible. The troops will be built up later.
These figures indicate, although a commendable start has been made, the movement has a long way t go. There is no reason why there should not be a kinds of scout activities and inter-troop competition his summer.
