### RAILROAD OFFICIALS INTERVIEWED

Relative to railroad matters, in an interview with your editor, Mr. Lemon of Kansas City, representing a syndicate which has to do with the financing of the construction work of the new line westward out of Memphis, said: "I have been here a week and came to Memphis with the view of straightening out several little detail matters in connection with the right of way in order that construction work on the line need not be further delayed. We are ready to begin work at once just as soon as deeds to right of way are procured, and we are soliciting the Railroad Bonus Committee to give their co-operation to this end.

"Memphis is a fine town. It is the best little city between Wichita Falls and Amarillo. It certainly has the natural advantages surrounding it which properly exploited will make it a rival city to Amarillo and do not think Memphis will even have any difficulty to surpass it. Memphis has the advantage of climate and rainfall. It has an abundance of fine pure water, an important thing in the matter of health as well as the upbuilding of the commercial and manufacturing interests of the community. This pure water is a feature lacking in many of surrounding cities and towns. With your sewerage system installed, Memphis will have made another advanced step in its civic progress. Your new churches and schools would be considered a credit to any city of several times the population Memphis now possesses.

"With another line of railroad and Memphis a division point, an influx of people would be sure to come and benefit the business interests of your city advanced to an incalculable degree. We want your people to be boosters for Memphis. All of us will do our part in boosting your town and have the people of the country who do not know it now, learn of the town of Memphis which is located in Tennessee.

"We would like to see the railroad addition to the Memphis website laid out with wide boulevards, nicely gravelled and laid with good cement sidewalks. This addition can be made to be a beautiful residence district and a delightful one in which to live.

"We want to see the advantages of this town well exploited by a thorough advertising campaign and will gladly contribute to a fund for that purpose. A live commercial club will be a big help to Memphis. One with a hustling manager who has

had experience in building up communities. We have seen places which had nothing compared to the natural and other advantages possessed by Memphis, which have been made big live towns simply through the activities of the local commercial clubs. These things will not come however unless we go right after them, hammer and tongs."

### Friday Not a Day of Ill Omen.

From time immemorial Friday has been frowned upon as a day of ill omen. And though this prejudice is less prevalent now than it was of yore, when superstition had general sway, yet there are many, even in this matter-of-fact age of ours, who would hesitate on a day so inauspicious to begin an undertaking of momentous import. How many brave mariners, whose hearts unmoved could meet the wildest fury of their ocean home, would blanch to even bend their sails on Friday. But to show with how little reason this feeling is indulged in, let us note the following facts in our own history as a nation, and how little we Americans have to dread the fatal day.

On Friday, August 3, 1492, Christopher Columbus sailed on his great voyage of discovery. On Friday, October 12, 1492, he first discovered land.

On Friday, 4th of January, 1493, he sailed on his return to Spain, which, if he had not reached in safety, the happy result would never have been known which led to the settlement of this vast continent.

On Friday, March 15, 1493, he arrived at Palos in safety.

On Friday, November 22, 1493, he arrived at Hispaniola, on his second voyage to America.

On Friday, March 5, 1485, Henry VII, of England, gave to John Cabot his commission, which led to the discovery of America. This was the first American State paper in England.

On Friday, September 17, 1565, Melendez founded St. Augustine, the oldest settlement in the United States by more than forty years.

On Friday, November 10, 1620, the Mayflower, with the Pilgrims made the harbor of Princetown, and on the same day signed that august compact, the forerunner of our present Constitution.

On Friday, December 22, 1620, the Pilgrims made their final landing at Plymouth Rock.

On Friday, February 22, 1732, George Washington the father of American freedom, was born.

On Friday, June 16, 1755, Bunker Hill was seized and fortified.

On Friday, October 7, 1777, the surrender of Saratoga was made, which had such power and influence in inducing France to declare for our cause.

On Friday, September 22, 1780, the treason of Arnold was laid bare, which saved us from destruction.

On Friday, October 19, 1781, the surrender of Yorktown, the crowning glory of American arms, occurred.

On Friday, June 7, 1776, the motion in Congress was made by John Adams, second by Richard Henry Lee, that the United Colonies were, and of right ought to be, free and independent.

Thus by numerous examples we see that, however it may be with other nations, Americans need never dread to begin on Friday any undertaking, no matter how momentous it may be.

## NEW INTERURBAN ENTERPRISE.

Proposed to Build from Greenville to Wolfe City and Later to Other Points.

Greenville, Tex., March 10.—Mayor Joseph F. Nichols, one of the promoters of Greenville and Wolfe City interurban, was in Austin yesterday and secured a charter for the Eastern Texas Traction Company, with the following citizens of Hunt County as incorporators: J. H. Blocker, H. E. Vaughan, H. C. Tittsworth, J. Riley Green and J. H. Myrick of Wolf City; J. B. Murphy, W. M. McBride, Glen A. Coulson, S. B. Perkins, L. N. Byrd, R. N. White and Joseph F. Nichols of Greenville.

The purpose of the corporation is to build an interurban between Greenville and Wolfe City at an early date, and later to extend to other cities. The charter authorizes the extension of the line to Bonham, Denison, Honey Grove, Paris, Cooper, Clarksville, Dallas, Plano, Chisholm and Forney. It is the intention to have the general office and place of business in Greenville.

## POINDEXTER.

Declares He Will Not Ask Pros to Vote for Johnson—Anti-Saloon League Matter.

Decatur, Tex., March 12.—Judge Poindexter addressed this afternoon at the court house probably the largest crowd ever assembled there for a political meeting. He discussed at some length in his opening remarks the necessity for reforming courts and court procedures as appertaining to Texas, and said that mob law found its genesis in the dilatory practices generally followed.

He was strong in condemning the present penal system and declared the penitentiaries must be divorced from politics, and good management substituted.

Judge Poindexter then addressed himself to the issue of prohibition. He was perhaps more severe and caustic than he has been elsewhere, said he had been guilty of advising people to vote for Johnson in the event they found it impossible to endorse his views, but since the caper at Dallas, meaning the recent session of the Anti Saloon League's executive committee, which, he claimed, was visited by Johnson in an effort to have the league endorse Johnson's candidacy, he had receded from his efforts in behalf of Johnson and would not be guilty again.

Crude Thoughts From The Editorial Pen

### Chief Of Police, L. D. Welch, Dead.

With the passing on last Sunday morning at about half-past five o'clock of Chief of Police L. D. Welch, Alexander City lost one of her very best citizens, the Masonic Fraternity one of its noblest craftsmen, and the Baptist church and Sunday School one of their most dependable members, and his family a true, devoted, thoughtful and tender husband and father. In his funeral oration Pastor Arnold S. Smith said a striking thing: "Bro. Welch may not have been an enthusiastic christian, but he was a constant and dependable one; one that will be missed." That is the kind of a man and christian that counts for something. Chief Welch had not been real well perhaps for several days, but looked well, and went about his usual duties. He and the editor were engaged in pleasant conversation as we waited our turn in the barber shop on Saturday night. We saw him alive the last time as he reclined in the chair as we walked out at near 10 o'clock. He went home, retired as usual, and at about 4 a. m. Sunday aroused his family, notified them that he was seriously ill. Fitz Hooton was called and perhaps other near neighbors, Dr. Harlan was hastily summoned, but Mr. Welch was beyond the reach of medical skill. He was suffering from a typical case of Angina Pectoris, or Neuralgia of the heart. Mr. Welch was conscious to the very last. Just as the last attack came on he remarked: "If nothing can be done to relieve me, this will be my last call." He fell back on the bed, and was gone. How we shall all miss him. How the frail little wife will miss her devoted, strong husband's tender, thoughtful care! How the three sweet little children will miss their papa! They are not old enough to understand it all. How the first sentence in the Pastor's prayer at the church seemed to us the right utterance: "O, God, we are before Thee helpless, but in Thy hands." How comforting the assurance in an hour like this. The funeral occurred from the First Baptist church, at 1 p. m. Monday. All business houses were closed, and notwithstanding the inclement weather a large concourse of people attended. The service was simple and in keeping with the sound judgment and good taste of Pastor Arnold S. Smith. The floral designs were beautiful. Notable among them was a beautiful white cross presented by the Baraca Class, of which he was assistant teacher, and an anchor of carnations presented by the Mayor and Council of Alexander City.

The service was concluded at the grave in the cemetery by the Masonic Fraternity, with their impressive burial ritual. If one may speak for all, in behalf of this entire community, we extend to the heartbroken widow and children and the devoted brothers and sisters in Texas our sincerest sympathy. We sorrow with you but thank God, "not as those who have no hope."

### THOUGHTS ON EASTER.

Over the whole world to-day rings the anthem of resurrection.

Beginning in the far orient it runs, with the dawn to the limits of every church bell, is up to heaven like a paean of hope and promise. The winter is past, and Nature has set man again the lesson, which since time began she has spread out before him in the earth, that book which may be read by the savage as well as civilized man. There is no death, there is no effort that sinks into the dim void and becomes naught, there is no cessation of soul influence. The summer comes and its glory passes, the harvest time of our lives wanes, the fields are brown and barren, and looking over them sadly we grieve that all of our hopes were not brought to fruition. When the frosts of age cover our heads we sometimes say with the great soul that voiced his agony in a dark hour: "Youth is a blunder, manhood struggle and old age regret."

Yet we have lived and loved, and that is within itself a boon. From the graves where were laid our crucified joy, our blameless offerings to untoward destiny, our loved and noble ideals, shall arise a glorified spirit to guide others down the rough way to the place where the "great light" shines. No path of sorrow in the vale of life is virgin to the naked feet of our shrinking souls. Wherever the water is deepest and the shadows fall darkest, there trod the martyrs of the ages and though they found the sepulcher at the end of the journey, being dead, they yet live and speak with undying utterance.

Christ is risen from the dead! Long ages passed when it seemed to the waiting nations that He was yet in the tomb, and in the sleep of death had forgotten the world. Toil, stripes and anguish were the portion of His people, for the poor are His. Wickedness wore the robe and crown and filled the earth with sighing. Even then there were brave hearts that looked up through the clouds and listened for the anthem of the resurrection. It was heard at last, and liberty of thought, faith and conscience was proclaimed. The cerments of error are cast off and lie in the open sepulcher, and with them are the broken shackles and rendered fetters.

### THE ORIGIN OF EASTER.

The origin of Easter as a spring festival is shrouded in the haze of his awakening of the earth from the sleep of winter was worshiped with pagan rites long before the primitive missionaries of the Christian church separated to establish their new religion throughout the world, as it was then known. Coincident with the date of this celebration was the Paschal feast of the Jews, so that all peoples and creeds recognized the occasion. Before the time of the Puritans in England and Calvin in Europe—two great influences regulating the religious thought of the times—the celebration of Easter had become an unlicensed carnival to which the people yielded themselves as a reaction after the preaching and example an element of austerity of Lent, but through their dignity was restored to the annual festival, and

in this spirit it has been continued to the present day.

In all countries is this celebration observed, and in none more so than in Russia, where the Greek church prevails. Social and religious events in that country are marked by rejoicing and the meetings of the people in the street—whether Czar or Moujik—are signaled by a kiss and the greeting "Christ is risen!" Particularly at Rome, Paris, Berlin, Jerusalem, St. Petersburg, Mexico is the festival celebrated with pomp and ceremony, but in all cities and places does the Easter festival demand the full glory of the Spring—the loveliest flowers, most sumptuous music, gorgeous sacerdotal vestments and the smiles and grace and joy of women and children in beautiful attire.

### AN EASTER THOUGHT.

"For we know that, if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." Oh, what a day when body and soul meet again! They are very fond of each other. Did your body ever have a pain and your soul not re-echo it? Or, changing the question, did your soul ever have any trouble and your body not sympathize with it, growing wan and weak under the depressing influence? Or did your soul ever have a gladness but your body celebrated with it with kindled eye and cheek and elastic steps? Surely God never intended two such good friends to be very long separated. And so when the world's last Easter morning shall come the soul will descend, crying, "Where is my body?" and the body will ascend, saying "Where is my soul?" and the Lord of the resurrection will bring them together and it will be a perfect soul in a perfect body, introduced by a perfect Christ into a perfect heaven.

### THE EASTER EGG.

From all traditions, the egg has been associated with Easter from the beginning of its celebration. It is supposed to typify the revival of life out of death, or, in other words, the resurrection. Another beautiful suggestion of this idea is developed in the butterfly, and it would seem that nothing could be more appropriate for an Easter decoration than these lovely winged creatures whose mission in life, like that of a rare and gifted soul, of which it was anciently regarded as the emblem, seems only to diffuse joy and radiance and beauty wherever they go. Formerly the eggs were blessed by the priests and distributed among the parishioners the gilded one being reserved for royal personages. Sometimes they were painted and intended as gifts to sweethearts for which frequently the most celebrated artists did not disdain to contribute their art.

### FACTION IN CONFLICT

Threaten Disruption of Party if Administration Tries to Force Woodruff's Withdrawal.

Albany, N. Y., March 12.—The announcement today from Washington that the Federal leader had decided to take preliminary steps looking towards the ousting of Timothy L. Woodruff, chairman of the Republican State Committee, caused a distinct sensation in Albany. It has given a new twist to the remarkable situation, which is confronting the "Grand Old Party" in the State, and it changed the expression on the face of some of the war horses who yesterday were boasting of their defiance of the National Administration and the election of George H. Cobb as President Pro Tem of the Senate.

With the President and Senator Root taking an active part in the war which has broken out between the Federal and State organizations, State leaders are standing aside and holding their tongues temporarily, until they are certain how far the National leaders intend to go. Without permitting their names to be used some of the more powerful State managers who are part and parcel of the machine declare tonight that if the Washington Republicans force a meeting of the State Committee and demand the withdrawal of Mr. Woodruff they will precipitate a battle which would tear the historic organization to fragments and leave political corpses in every nook and corner of the State.



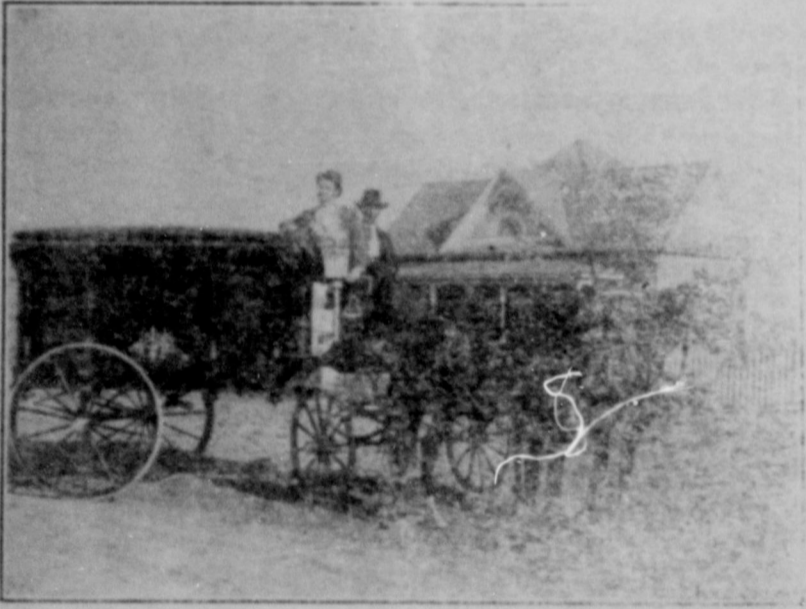
