MEMPHIS BAND TAKES PRIZE AT AMARILLO

Again the Memphis Chamber of Commerce Band is winner, showing beyond a doubt that it is the leading band of West Texas and the Panhandle.

In the contest last Sunday at the Amarillo Tri-State Fair in the five-year Class A, and it was a hotly contested event, Memphis Band won first prize over the Clovis, New Mexico, band. The score for Memphis was 87 points and the score for Clovis was 84—showing that it was a hard fought contest. The capital prize was \$400.

The Memphis band was under the direction of Paul James, and the Clovis band under Veldi Croft. The big number that was played by the Memphis band was "Zampa", a standard overture, played by all the high-class professional bands. It is very difficult and only the well-balanced bands can play it.

The contest was judged by Merle Evans, leader of the Ringling Circus Band. Evans is said to be the loudest cornet player in the world, and receives a salary of 12,000 a year for directing the Ringling band.

Clarinet work in "Zampa" is so heavy it requires great skill to play it. It is said that the Memphis band made a better showing in this part of the number than did Clovis, as well as the drum solos and extra ending with drum beats.

All the bands, seven in number, and with more than 300 in it, played a massed concert unday afternoon before an audience of four thousand people. This concert was led by Evans of Ringling circus.

Clarendon Band won in the one year class.

Memphis and Hall County people are proud of the Memphis C. of C. Band—the old Medal Band—being the first to win the gold medal offered by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. It is certainly some band and has a leader who keeps it going.

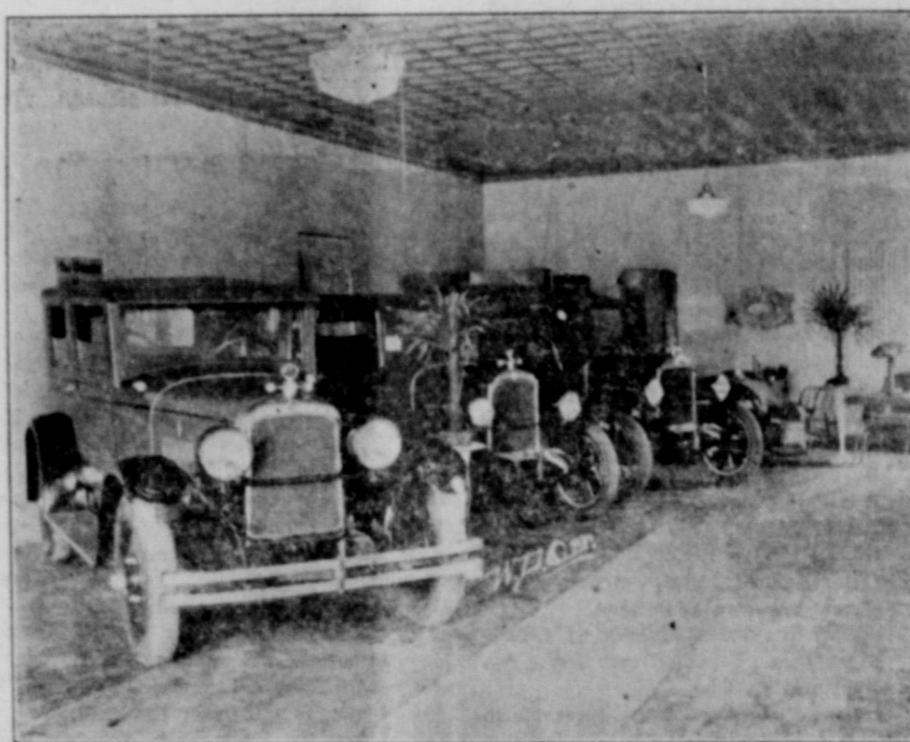
