Additional Parity Checks Hike Total To Over \$48,000

A total of 156 parity checks, aggregating \$12,992.96, was received by the office of the county agent Monday, Millard P. Brown, Hall County ACA secretary, said this week.

The shipment brought the number of checks received to 454, totaling \$48,212.94.

Approximately 2,000 checks are to be received, Brown has explained, and will bring about \$160,000 to Hall County farmers and landowners. The second group of government pay-ments will be the conservation checks, which are expected to be slightly larger in amount than the parity payments.



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



Average length of the newborn baby is 20 or 21 inches, and the infant will tip the scales at 7 to 71/2 pounds. During the first month, baby won't cry too much, because sleep consumes all except an hour or two of its day. During the second month, the average baby sleeps from 20 to 22 hours daily.

Two lower teeth usually appear between the fifth and eighth months, and four upper front teeth usually appear between the seventh and tenth months. For the first year, the baby will grow a total of 91/2 inches, and usually triples birth weight. Average weight gain after the first eight months is a pound a month.

BY the end of the year, the infant plays with simple toys -preferably those that make a noise. Baby enjoys tearing and crumpling paper and likes to pull hair. It can now hold and drink from a cup, handle a spoon, and may be walking.

Permanent eye color is usually established by the end of the year. The infant responds to approval, can wave bye-bye, and can say single words. After that his learning rate accelerates.
