SWAT THE FLY

"The fly is a serious health menace to every family that harbors it", stated Dr. H. O. Sappington, state health officer, who urges citizens of the state to use every means possible in exterminating this filthy, disease carrying insect.

"The finding of sanitary science have conclusively proven that the fly is an enemy to mankind. A creature of filth, he crawls from one loathsome object to another, covering his hairy legs with disease germs, which if given an opportunity, transfers to exposed food on table or sideboard, and the baby's face, hands and milk bottle.

Some of the diseases, the germs of which he most commonly spread, are typhoid fever, dysentery, and infantile diarrhea. Being a prolific breeder, one fly can propagate millions of the species during a single season.

The principal effort to control this dangerous insect must be made at the source of supply, its breeding place. Absolute cleanliness and the removal or destruction of anything in which flies may breed are essential.

"Dwelling houses should be screened with 16-mesh wire, and all screens should fit tightly and be kept in a state of good repair. Swat every fly that makes appearance on the inside of a screened home, and where necessary resort to the use of fly traps and fly paper.

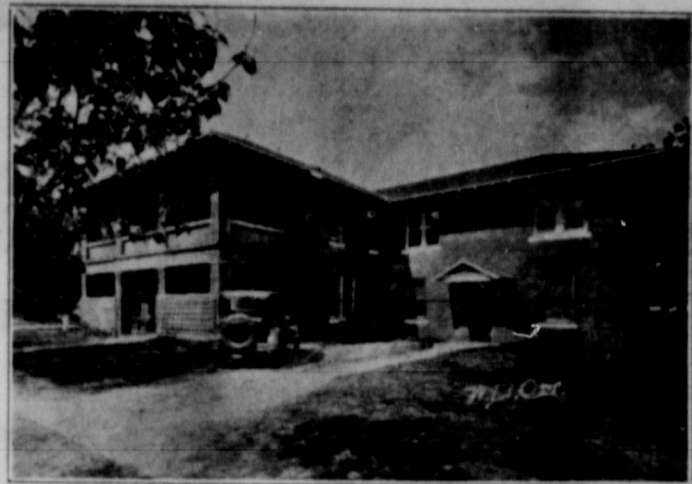
For these offices the secretary of state hands the returns over to the house of representatives which canvasses the returns and declares the results.

Not Hard for Experts to Detect Fake Gems

Jewel forgers have become so clever that a special gem-testing institute has been established in Vienna, says Popular Mechanics Magazine, and similar studies are being carried on in this country to detect imitations.

Imitation diamonds are numerous and it is possible to make real ones in the laboratory, but the cost of the process is about \$200,000 a carat, while natural ones can be purchased at from \$100 to \$200 a carat. Rubies can be made by laboratory methods in about six hours, and some of them are so nearly like the real stones that other tests than with the eyes are necessary to distinguish them.

While the synthetic emerald has brilliance and realistic color, it usually can be told from a genuine one with little difficulty. They are often built up in three parts, which are fastened by invisible cement. The top and the bottom part may be glass crystals cut in many facets with a thin shaving of a real emerald between them to give the color. Others may have a slight cavity between the two crystals which is filled with a green liquid. Both imitations are easily detected by submerging the stone in a certain kind of oil and holding it up to the light.

Loin Cloths Common to Tropical Dweller

Practically every primitive tribe dwelling in the tropics that has been studied by scientific observers has been found to wear some form of bodily covering of the loin region either in the form of paints of various colors, tattoo marks, strands of beads of various materials, beaten bast or bark cloth, or of woven fibers which leave cotton or other vegetable or animal fibers. The inhabitants of the Nicobar islands and of Central East Africa are apparently of all tribes the most free from loin coverings of all sorts. Reasons given for the wearing of loin coverings vary. Native modesty is usually present in some form, even apart from any influence that may be attributed to the whites; tribal and ceremonial painting or tattooing is often a causative factor and may supplement a woven girdle worn for entirely different purposes, namely, for the insertion of the hilt of a knife and as a place of attachment for burdens; most primitive peoples are burden carriers. Protection against insect pests is often attempted through the agency of breech cloths. Tradition and native styles usually dictate the use of certain forms of loin covering even to the minutest detail.

Mystery of Instinct Puzzle to Scientists

How successive generations of ants learn to milk the aphides is a mystery that cannot be explained on any theory of heredity, for the ants which do the milking are workers, sexless insects which leave no offspring. It is, therefore, quite impossible that they should transmit their training to offspring which they do not have.

The "milk" which the aphides give up to the ants as contentedly as a cow gives her milk, is the juice of plants sucked up by the aphides and transformed in their bodies to a sirup of invert sugar or glucose. This is the so-called "honey-dew" often found in vast quantities on plants. Some species of ants merely lick this up, but others stroke the aphides to persuade them to "give down." Just as a hired man of the farm induces the cow.

In return for this service the ants fight the enemies of the aphides, carry them to safety in times of danger, take care of their eggs, place the aphides where they will get the best of food, and shelter them in their nests in cold weather.

First Cross-Word Puzzles

The development of the acrostic into the cross-word, or at least the development of the cross-word principle beyond the initial letters of each line, seems to have been the work of Venantius Honorius Clementianus Fortunatus, a Christian poet, who was born in north Italy about 535 A. D. He compiled verses in which both the first and last letters of each verse when read vertically added two verses to the poem. He also made verses in which the letters within the lines make sense if taken in a cruciform pattern. This, of course, called for spacing of the letters to enable them to be read horizontally and vertically—an essential feature of the cross-word. These poems were lost for many years and were first published in 1906 by Christopher Bower, who had discovered them in manuscript at St. Gall, Switzerland.

Presence of Mind

A recent ecclesiastical method of removing an evil spell from a churchyard seems to have been less simple than that of Archbishop Thomson in exorcising a ghost from a mansion where he once spent a night. He was lodged in the haunted chamber, and in the morning his hostess inquired anxiously if he had seen anything. "Oh, yes," replied the archbishop, "I awakened to find an old pinched-looking man in the room. I jumped up and asked if he lived in the house. He nodded assent. Was he a parishioner? I asked. Again he nodded. Then, said I, I should like to ask your help for our new school building fund. At that he vanished, and disturbed me no more."

Sweet Pea an Importation

The sweet pea is a native of the island of Sicily and was first mentioned in 1666 by an Italian monk, who sent seeds to England and Holland. The seeds of sweet peas became an article of commerce as early as 1724. Sweet peas have been grown for more than a century in America, and all of the varieties known in Europe were grown here. There was a wave of popularity for the sweet pea in America between 1885 and 1900, while the tide, which received its great impetus through the introduction of the waved, or Spencer type, was just beginning to rise at the sweet-pea celebration in London in 1900.

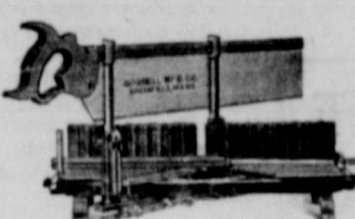

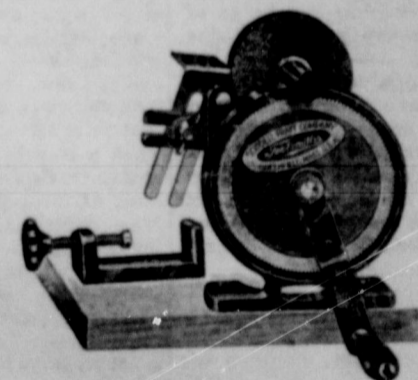
