As the road was somewhat rough, the bucket was bounced up and down, and in order to steady it Dr. Snow put his hand behind him and bucket, thrusting his fingers through the newspaper cover cure. Suddenly be felt the monster's grip on his fingers. Startled and somewhat alarmed, he carefully pried the jaws of the reptile open and released himself. The wounds were such as any ordinary bite would have made, and he suffered no more inconvenience than might have been expected.

There are many stories current in Arizona and Sonora as to deaths that have occurred from Glla monsters' bites, but it is hard to get at the facts Careful experiments made with ani mals show that when the reptile bites and turns over, so that the polson flows down the tooth grooves into the wound, the bitten creatures die in a hort time. 
