## 'Food' Re-Defined For Food Stamp Plan Participants

Now Means Agricultural Commodities for Internal Consumption, Says Stowe

The term "food" was re-defined this week by the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation as far as those participating in the food stamp plan in Hall County are concerned, it was announced by Leslie H. Stowe, local representative of the plan.

"The term 'food' means any agricultural commodity or products thereof sold in retail food stores for internal consumption," Mr. Stowe said, "but shall not include foods sold for consumption on the premises, such as sandwiches, ice cream cones, and the like, and shall not include wines, liquors, beers, or other alcoholic beverages or tobacco in any form."

Heretofore, orange stamps could be used to buy certain non-edible products, but, under the new ruling, the orange stamps are to be used for items sold for internal consumption only. This eliminates soap, starch, matches, and any other items exchanged heretofore for the orange stamps, Mr. Stowe explained.

Any merchant in Hall County violating this new ruling will be subject to fines and imprisonment as provided by the U. S. criminal code, Mr. Stowe said.

## Tree Planting on Shelterbelts Not Over, Says Gilbert

Forestry Service Man Denies Rumor That Work Of Crews Completed Here

That the work of planting trees by shelterbelt crews of Hall County is about over has been denied by Jim Gilbert, local supervisor of the Prairie States Forestry Service.

Rumors have been circulating, Gilbert said, to the effect that the planting in Hall County is almost over, but much more is yet to be done.

A surplus of trees in the heel-end in Memphis may cause people to further believe this is true, he said, but many of the trees now stored here are to be sent to Turkey, Shamrock, and other cities in the Panhandle to be planted.

The trees planted by the forestry service are done so purely for the benefit of farm forestry work, Gilbert said, and are not to be used merely for ornamental purposes.

Gilbert added that the trees are government property until actually planted in shelterbelts, and that no one who is not so authorized can remove the seedlings from the beds.

## 2 Fined \$100 Each In County Court

Two cases, held in County Court this week, were ended with the same results, the defendants in each case being assessed \$100 and costs.

Mrs. Era Christy, charged with the possession of illicit beverages without a tax, was fined \$100 and costs; and Elgin Bell, charged with the possession and sale of wine, was given the same fine.

## Receipts on Social Security Must Be Given by Employers

Notation on Check Not Sufficient; Wording on Receipt Left to Employer

Employers covered by the old-age survivors insurance law are now required by law to give their employees receipts for the money taken out of their wages for old-age and survivors insurance taxes, according to an announcement by Dewey Reed, manager of the Social Security Board field office at Amarillo. This new requirement of the Social Security Act, he explained, went into effect January 1 of this year.

Mr. Reed pointed out that formerly the employer was only required to furnish the employee with a notation which would permit him to check the accuracy of the tax deduction. "This," he said, "could even be included on a pay check which would, of course, eventually be returned to the employer. But now the law specifically stipulates that the employer must furnish a statement 'suitable for retention by the employee.'"

He added that the law provides a \$5 penalty for each willful violation of this provision. Certain specified information must be included on the receipt but the wording is left to the employer. In addition to the amount of tax deducted, the receipt must show the name of the employee, the name of the employer, the period of time covered by the receipt, and the total amount of wages paid to the employee during this period.

Employers are required to furnish such receipts at least once a year and may furnish them often—every quarter, or every month, or every payday, as they see fit. The receipt must be given to the employee within two months after the end of the period which it covers, and, in any case, when the employee leaves the job.


