**THE RED HOUSE ON ROMAN STREET**, by Roman Doubleday, is a queer interesting and enjoyable story. The author tells in a singular but a most interesting way the story of a village physician and his family with the numerous mysteries connected, which causes the village people to become suspicious and fearful of them. **Two Texas Counties Freed From Quarantine for Scabies.**

Washington, D. C.—The Secretary of Agriculture has issued an order releasing, on November 17, from Federal quarantine for cattle scabies (also called "cattle mange") the Counties of Howard and Borden in the State of Texas. The release of these two counties is the first visible effect of the

actively in the enforcement of this order, and since September 1 approximately sixty State and Federal employees have been engaged in the inspection and supervision of the dipping of cattle in the Panhandle country of Texas. The Panhandle Cattle Raisers' Association is also cooperating with the State officials. It is expected as a result of this general dipping of cattle that within a short time additional areas in Texas will be released from quarantine for cattle scabies.

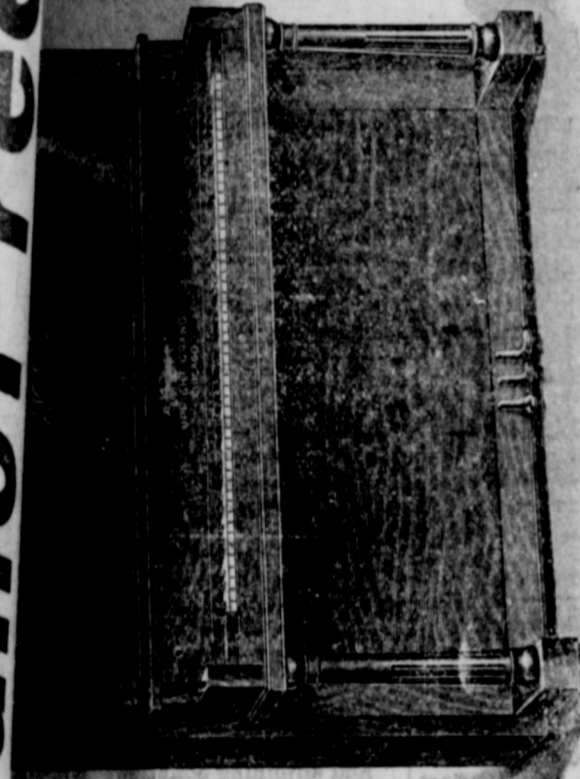

**THE UNJUST STANDARD.**  
A daily paper tells us a story of which many more just like it could be truthfully told. This happened in a poor rooming house in Brooklyn the other day. A tired woman committed suicide. Twelve years ago she lived in a beautiful home in luxury. Scandal touched her, there was a secret divorce, and upon the small annuity she sought to live. In twelve years she earned among the humble folks near her new abode, by kindly ministrations, the title "The Angel." It was a real title of nobility. Children loved her and came to her for sympathy in their little troubles. Stray animals found in her a steady protector. She went about doing good. But finally her spirit broke, though not until, if expiation for sin is ever won by works of mercy, she had won it manifold. There is no record that the man in the case repented or suffered. Society did not cast him out. It may be that there are times when memory stings his conscience, but his order of living was not altered. He probably did not know of "The Angel" until for when she changed her residence she also changed her name. That is humanity's unjust record of punishments. Can it ever be modified?

**CHILDREN AT THE TABLE.**  
Table manners do not happen. They are the result which is unconscious. The deft handling of fork and spoon, the nicetaking of food, the courtesies of the table which are distinctive marks of refinement, do not come to children by chance. 'Honest' John H. Faces His Critics.

Hon. John H. Stephens, congressman from this district, made a speech at the LaGrande Monday afternoon to an audience that was rather large for the time given to notify the people that he would address them.

Mr. Stephens was in the city at the invitation of the Chamber of Commerce for the purpose of discussing some matters concerning the city. After arriving he was requested by his friends to make a speech and he consented.

He was introduced to the audience by Judge Hathaway, in a few well chosen remarks. Mr. Stephens at once entered into a discussion of his career in congress, giving an accounting of his stewardship. He first took up the matter of the opening of the Western part of Oklahoma to settlement, showing the work had been started by him and by his work was accomplished. He called his hearers attention to the fact that when he was elected to congress the Western part of Oklahoma was the hiding place of the bandits of the Southwest, that the state of Texas was preyed upon by these men and that it was almost impossible for the peace officers to do anything for our people. But since the settlement of that land Northwest Texas had grown as never before and as it could not so long as that country was controlled by the cattlemen.

Mr. Stephens also revealed his acts as congressman with several other measures that were of benefit to the states of Texas. He mentioned that he was responsible for the law which permits Texas people to benefit from the reclamation service of the Federal government, although the government had not a foot of land in the state. This law is responsible for the building of the large dam above El Paso, the water from which will irrigate many thousand acres of valley lands along the Rio Grande river, and tributary to El Paso. He also introduced the bill which leveled the boundary line between Texas and New Mexico, gaining for Texas many thousand acres of land.

He also gave a description of his work upon the great Indian committee, one of the most important committees of congress. It was responsible for the division of the land of the Indian territory among the Indians, selling the remainder to white people. His work has assisted in giving the Indians many thousand dollars from the grafters who infested the territory in the days past. He also gave a short account of his work on an investigation committee that visited the Western portion of

the United States the past summer.

Touching upon the Mexican question, he stated that he was against intervention in Mexico, but that he differed with President Wilson as to the policy to be used. He said that he believed that this country should look upon the rebels there as entitled to arms and ammunition from this country, and with that idea in view he would permit them to ship arms across the border. This would permit the Mexicans to fight out the matter between themselves. He said that he believed the president was in the right in not recognizing the Huerta government, as it was founded upon murder and treachery. Mr. Stephens also stated that he believed before many years the Northern States of Mexico would secede and form a government of their own, and that later the people of that government would ask for annexation with the United States. If so he would be in favor of meeting them half way.

Mr. Stephens said that he was willing to stand upon his record in congress. He said the office did not belong to him but to the people, and if the people wanted some other man to represent them well and good. He was willing that the people should pass upon his record and he believed that they would endorse the same. He was trying to do his work as he saw it, working all the time for the interest of the whole country as well as his district. That while he had different ideas from some of the leaders of democracy, but when the party in caucus had spoken he was willing to follow and stand with a united party before the enemy.

Mr. Stephens made a good impression with the people who heard him and after his address was congratulated by many. No doubt he made friends by his talk and that he will continue to make friends in Childress county.
