this connection are defined. I have un lertaken to ascertain the nature of the charges affecting the standing of the members of the faculty indicated, and have been unable to discover anything more definite than rumors, for which no sponsors could be found. I therefore, on September 5, wrote to Governor Ferguson the attached letter. which, together with his reply of September 9 and my answer to him of

September 16, are made a part of this report for your information.

"The delay in sending my letter of September 16 to Governor Ferguson was due to the fact that I was absent from the city of Austin in El Paso on a visit to the School of Mines. The date of my return to Austin and of the receipt of the Governor's letter vas September 16.

'Since, as indicated in Gvernor Ferguson't letter, he has thought best for me to deal directly with the Board of regular meeting for such action as Regents in this matter, I conferred with you, as Chairman of the Board of Regents, and requested that you comply with the constitutional requirements and secure a meeting of that body at the earliest possible date. in order that the situation might reeieve the consideration which its gravi ty demands.

"I regret that I have no more specific report to make than is indicated herein, and I desire only to say that I shall be ready, of course, to co-operate with the Board to the fullest extent of ability to ascertain, not only the grounds which affect the status of the nembers of the faculty involved, but also the correctness of such charges as may be discovered by you, and to carry out any insructions which your action may impose upon me

"President." Vinson's Lteer to the Governor

"Austin, September 5, 1916 Honorable James E. Ferguson, Gov ernor of Texas, Austin, Texas.

"Dear Governor Ferguson: The next meeting of the Board of Regents niversity of Texas will be held n the fourth Tuesday of October, next being the twenty-fourth. I have been adeavoring for sometime past to get together the matters which must be laid before the Board at that time. including the complete itemized budget for the biennium next following the meeting of the Legislature. Some ime during the month of June, in a onversation which I had with you in our office, you indicated to me that there were certain charges which you desired to make with reference to certain members of the present faculty of the University. In order that I may have some basis on which to work in

this matter, I am taking this

mber 11, 1912, in Article 11. Section 1, dealing with officers of administra-tion of the University, I find the folowing statements with reference to the duties of the President of the University

": 'All other officers, teachers, and employees thall be responsible to and under the direction of the President. He shall be prepared to give the Board information regarding the competence and loyalty of officers, teachers, and employees; shall hold all of them to the full discharge of their duties; and if. in his judgment, the necessity arise, shall initiate steps for a charge of any of them.

"Acting under the obligation imposed upon me by the office which I have accepted, knowing from my previous conversation with you, and as it is indicated in your letter of Septen.ber 9, that certan members of the faculty were objectionable to you, I consider ed it my duty to ascertain the grounds of your objection in order that I might be able to learn the facts and to lay these facts, together with such recom mendations as they might warrant. before the Board of Regents at its next might seem wise to not have then, nor have I now, any desire or intention to interfere in the least with any plans which you had or may have, in your mind with reference to this institution; and I must also disclaim any intention of forcing an issue, and am at stand on what grounds you base your statement that such is my intention As I have already stated to you it conversation. I accepted the presi dency of the University of Texas with out having sought the office in any way; and the primary condition of such acceptance on my part was the distinct understanding that I had no obligations to individuals to discharge in the administration of the office and I was then prepared to administer the duties of this office for the best interests of the University, and of the University alone, and to do so without fear or favor. I still maintain the position set out in the above state ment, am today as free of obligation as'upon the date of my election, and am ready and willing, so far as my ability and my information may per mit, to perform the duties of this office as outlined above, and to co-op erate with you in the fullest possible manner in any way which may to the best interests of this institution and of the State of Texas. there are members of the present fac ulty of the University of Texas who for any reason whatever are either incompetent or unworthy to fill the positions which they now occupy, and you have in your possession information which bears upon this matter, the obligations imposed upon me by the Rules and Regulatons of the Board of Regents require that I should se cure it if possible.

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

Dr. Robert E. Vinson. resident State University, Austin, Texas, "Dear Sir: Your favor of Septemper 5 is received.

"In the first place, I emphatically deny that I ever indicated or intimated that I wanted to make any charges against anybody, and I told you then and there the names of the members of the faculty whom I thought objectionable, and I have not changed my mind.

"I think for the future it will be better for us to remain in our respective jurisdictions, and no good purpose can be subserved by any further relation between us.

"I shall deal with the Bourd of Regents, and you can do likewise; and you can rest assured that I shall promptly and surely meet the issue which it is apparent from your letter that you intend to force upon me.

Vinson's Reply to Ferguson.

"Austin, September 16, 1916. Honorable James E. Fergusen, Gover

PRAIRIE DOG LAW EFFECTIVE THIS YEA

Commissioners' Give Timely warning **To Land Owners Regarding** Law Effective This Fall.

The Commissioners' Court of Hall County desires to call the attention of the public to the Prairie Dog Law which is copied in full as follows: "Be it enacted by the Legislature of

the State of Texas; "Section 1. That Prairie dogs are hereby declared to be a public nuisance and the owners of lands in any county in this state upon which prairie dogs exsist shall, within two years from the date this act takes effect, kill, or cause to be killed, all dogs on land so owned by them.

"Section 2. It is hereby made the duty of the Commissioners of any county in which prairie dogs exist, to investigate and determine whether owners of lands in their respective Commissioners' precincts have complied with the provisions of section one of this Act, and if any such land owners have failed or refused to destroy the pratrie dogs on their land, it shall be the duty of said Commissioner to immediately notify the sheriff of his county of such failure and the name and post office address of such owner, or his agent, that if he shall fail, within thirty days from

of section one of this Act, that the prairie dogs on said land.

Section 3. After the failure of any owner to comp. sions of section one of th. · have the terms of section two hereo. been performed, and said owner ha not, within the time provided for in be section two, destroyed said prairie dogs, it shall be the duty of said sheriff to immediately proceed to destroy the dogs on land of said owner. and to use the practical and economical methods in general use. And he an itemized bill of expense, under oath, to the first term of the Commissioners' Court of said County. which Court shall examine said ac count and if found correct and reasonable, shall allow and cause the same to be paid, and by its order duly en. tered assess said amount against said owner and enter same as a lein against his land. It being provided, however that the Commissioners' Court may compensate the sheriff by the sum of not exceeding five doltars (\$5.00) per day for each and every day the sheriff hall have performed actual service



Section 4. If the owner of any and against which said costs and exenses have been assessed by the Commissioners' Court shall fail to pay the same within thirty days after notice of such assessment, it shall be the duty of the County Attorney of such County to bring suit in any court of competent jurisdiction to enforce the payment of such costs and expenses; and the County Attorney shall in each suit brought by him for said purpose. be allowed a reasonable fee, to be fixed by the court trying the case, which fee shall be taxed as costs in the case, and upon rendition of any judgment for such costs and expenses, excution and order of sale shall issue and be executed as in cases of other judgments. "Section 5. All laws and parts of

laws in conflict with the provisions of this act are hereby repeated.

"Section 6. The fact that prairie dogs are very damaging to the lands of West Texas and the near approach of the end of the session create an energency justifying the suspension of the Constitutional Rule requiring aff bills to be read on three several days, the same is hereby suspended, and that this Act take effect from and after its passage, and it is so enacted."

By the provisions of the above Law, if the owners of land have failed or refused to kill the dogs by September 3rd., 1917, it becomes the duty of the Commissioners of the several precincts to notify the sheriff, who shall proreed to have the dogs killed, and charge up the expenses thereof against the land. Thereupon the Commissioners' Court shall by order duly entered assess said amount against said owner and enter the same as a lein against his land.

This notice is given as a final notice so that all may take warning and proceed to kill the dogs on their respective land and avoid additional sosts.



Each school board as it came into office has inherited this deficit, and each board has asked the banks to carry it from year to year in the hope that the valuations in the district would finally increase to where suffi cient tax would come in to finally

take it up . But we find in a district like ours the expenses of running the school increases faster than our current year, and with long runs in valuation increases.

The banks have always claimed that it was illegal for a school board to borrow money and that it was an em barrassment tot hem to carry such notes, and since the bank examiners have recently made more strict rul ings on these matters, the banks claim 38tf they cannot afford to advance 'the
