Sixty-One General Laws Go Into Operation Begin-

ning Today.

The following sixty-one laws passed panies. by the thirty-first legislature went into effect Friday night at 12 o'clock. LIST OF LAW.

The general laws that becone effective at midnight are the following:

The anti-race track betting bill.
