## **DUNBAR URGES RED RIVER DAM SURVEY REPORT**

Goes to Washington To Seek Action By War Department

T. J. Dunbar, secretary-treas urer of the Upper Red River Flood Control and Irrigation Authority, in Washington Monday urged war department officials to rush action on a flood control survey report for the proposed Red River Dam, which the local authority opes to have built in the cap rock area west of Memphis.

Only core drillings and water tests in the reservoir site 30 miles west of here are necessary before all field data is obtained, Dunbar said. He requested that the re-port be sent to Washington in time for consideration of the project by Congress during the present

The project would combine flood control, irrigation, wild-life conservation and recreation features. The proposed dam would be located in Briscoe County, ap proximately four and one-half miles west of the Hall County line and would supply water for irri gation purposes to farms in Bris coe, Hall, and Childress Counties

A formal application for a sur vey of the area was made to the War Department in May last year by the local authority. The preliminary survey was granted, and was completed by war department engineers early in October. C. L. Newsome, engineer in

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

## Farm Income Is Brightened by **AAA Estimates**

Conservation Payments III Exceed 36 Million Dollars in Texas Area

Prospects for Texas farm in-ome in 1939 are at least fourteen million dollars brighter now than on January 1, when the AAA estimated \$42,000,000 would be issued in "conservation payments" to farmers of this state who took part in the national acreage curtailment program of 1938. The AAA now estimates such

payments will exceed \$56,000,000 which is about \$22,000,000 more than the total of such grants in connection with the 1937 program. George Slaughter, chairman of the Texas Agricultural Conservation Committee of the AAA, said 1938 conservation payments will be divided about as follows:

For compliance with acreage allotments for cotton, \$33,000.000, general crops, \$11,000,000; pen-nuts, \$100,000; wheat, \$2,600,00; and rice, \$400,000.

For additional soil-building practices — \$4,000,000; range program, \$3,750,000; to increase small payments, \$3,000,000; to-tal, \$56,850,000.

Additional grants called "price adjustment payments" are slated for growers of cotton, wheat and rice, as soon as possible after plantings for the current season

have been checked.

Preliminary estimates indicate
that rates of "price adjustment" or "parity" payments for 1939 will be 1.6 to 1.8 cents a pound for cotton; 10 to 12 cents a bushel for wheat; and 12 to 13 cents a hundredweight for rice-payment in each case to be made on the normal yield of the acreage allotmen as established under the 1939 Agricultural Concervation Program
