

Barnbill, Turkey contractor, who was awarded contracts for grading and drainage on 12 miles of the proposed route by the highway commission December 1. bill submitted a low bid of \$66,-916 for the job, members of the commission said in awarding the ontracts.

Fifteen or twenty men are already at work on the project, Drake said Wednesday, and the crew is making rapid The contracts call for the job to be completed in 150 working days after January 1.

The new road, which is being onstructed as a federal farm-tomarket project, extends from highway 83 north of Childress and short distance north of the intersection with highway 138 which runs east to Hollis, Okla., cross Childress County to a point near the Browder Ranch headquarters a short distance from he Hall County line.

SOIL CONSERVATION PAYS-Above are recent scenes from the G. W. Sexauer farm nine miles northwest of Memphis. Mr. Sexauer was one of the first to become interested in soil and water conservation when the Soil Conservation Service CCC camp was established here in 1935, and adopted a complete erosion control program for his 3,840-acre farm. The work has been very effective in improving the yield from cotton and feed crops, as well as in improving the value and appearance of the farm, Mr. Sexauer believes. The lower photo shows pickers gathering cotton which averaged one-third of a bale to the acre this fall when nearby straight-row fields produced only one-fourth to one-sixth of a bale.



As an official of the American Government, however, he should consider that any public expression he makes may be construed as an expression of the policy of that government.

Whatever public or governmental opinion of Hitler in this country may be, it has been the policy of the administration to maintain a strict "hands off" policy in regard to European politics. In that light, Mr. Ickes' expression of opinion appears to be indiscreet to say the least, and in the present chaotic state of world affairs it might well have amounted to a betrayal of the public trust.


Naturally the American government has refused to lose face by making an apology to Germany. None was due. Thoughtless expressions of personal opinion by government officials, however, can prove embarrassing and might easily be dangerous to the foreign policy of the United States. Wars have been fought for less cause.

Such expressions should be left to the Secretary of State . . . an office to which Mr. Ickes has not yet. been appointed.

#### The Call of Service

The International Uniform Text: John 1:40-42; Luke 5:1-11.

FOR the next few months the lessons here will concern the life of Peter and then turn to the life and works of Paul. Near the middle of the year the Old Testament will be taken up for a series of lessons and then the subjects will be drawn from the New Testament for the last quarter of the year.

Peter represents the most picturesque and dramatic figure among the apostles. John may have been a greater character. large and steady, in the domination of his life by a great ambition to be first, inspired by his mother, and in the richness and magnitude of the love to

which this ambition gave place. James, his brother, may have shared this forcefulness of a man able for any contingency in seeking his ambitious goal. But Peter-in some inspiring moment emphasizing a magnificent courage, at other times a braggart and a weakling, impassioned and ready for any service, protesting his devotion and his willingness to follow his Master everywhere only shortly to be in the depths of the most ignominious denial-is a figure much nearer to our ordinary human nature and more essentially in line with the contrasts in the drama of life.

IT was the glory and salvation of Peter that Jesus under-Jesus knew how sincere was the devotion that he professed, but He knew also how weak was the man at certain points and in certain moments.

It was in the light of this deep understanding that He said to Peter, "Simon, Simon, Satan hath desired to have thee that he may sift thee as wheat, but I have prayed for thee that thy faith fail not." And He added "When thou art converted strengthen thy brethren," for He realized what a man like this impulsive Peter, brought under the full power of the Gospei. could achieve.

The circumstances of the calling of Peter to discipleship are interesting and instructive. It was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, who heard the testimony of John the Baptist to Jesus, and it was Andrew who went and brought Peter to Jesus. We know comparatively little of Andrew, but the fact that he brought his greater brother to Jesus emphasizes the largeness of service that every man may render.

A man little known may accomplish mighty things if he brings some greater man to the right or stimulates him into ac-This incident has become the foundation of a very practical movement in the Brotherhood of Andrew and Philip, which has as its aim and purpose the bringing of men to Jesus in much the same way that Andrew brought Peter to Jesus long ago.

#### Advisory Board Asks Farm Hands Craffic Acci Be Included in Security

BY SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT

WASHINGTON. - Farm hands W and domestic labor should be brought under the National Social Security Act and the benefits of old age insurance, the Social Security Advisory Council has recommended in a 54-page official report.

The council recommended that some 6,000,000 farm hands and domestic laborers be included in the plan not later than Jan. 1, 1940, and that the tax be collected from the individuals by means of stamps sold to them which they would be required to keep in stamp books.

These recommendations were part of a broad general plan for extending the insurance plan to virtually every man, woman and child in the country.

Other new groups which the council advised bringing under the provisions of the act include 600,000 seamen and bank employes, as well as 2,000,000 employes of non-profit religious, charitable and educational institutions. The council also rec-ommended that a study be made of insuring self-employed persons and governmental employes now outside the act.


