SWINE REQUIRES SOME GRAIN

Expert at University Farm Gives Resuits of Three Tests of Feeding Corn to Hogs.

Can you afford to feed grain to your hogs this summer?

R. C. Ashby, in charge of swine at University farm, St. Paul, says you cannot afford to grow them without grain. He gives the results of three tests of feeding corn to hogs on rape pasture to prove his claim.

Six 50-pound pigs were put in each of three lots, about a quarter of an and heir, was acre in size, on rape pasture. The pigs in the first lot were fed a half ration -2 per cent of corn; that is, two pounds of corn for every one hundred pounds of live weight. Those in the second lot were fed three pounds of corn for every one hundred pounds of pig: that is 3 per cent. The pigs in the third lot were fed a full ration, 4 per cent of corn. The pigs were on good rape pasture eleven weeks-from July 10 to September 26. Their gains were counted as worth 7 cents a pound and corn was charged at 55 cents a



# IDEAL METAL FOR MOTORS

Secret of Material Which Has Made SHEEP REQUIRE DRY SHELTER ers Has Been Discovered.

The United States government has learned that the success of the German airplanes is largely attributable to what is known as kaiser zinn metal, which is used for the motors. piece of this metal was picked up by a British soldier who brought down a German taube. It interested him so much that he subjected it to a scientific test and discovered that it consisted of the following: Copper, 1.58 parts; tin, 92.98 parts, and antimony,

This alloy, which is somewhat akin to Britannia metal, was discovered by the Germans about 50 years ago. They first used it as a substitute for silver in the making of all kinds of articles for the dining table, never dreaming that some day it would prove so serviceable in military affairs. It is as light as aluminum, has great tensile strength and unusual resisting power. In Ordinary Climate House for Animals May Be Constructed of One Thickness of Boards.

Contrary to general opinion, sheep as well as any other class of farm animals require clean, dry shelter. It is especially important that the feet and fleece be kept dry. If their quarters are dry and clean the sheep will stand very cold weather without discomfort or disease. There must be ample ventilation, for sheep, if closely crowded, sweat badly and quickly use up the oxygen in the air, but there must be no drafts as sheep are easily subject to colds.

In the ordinary climate the sheep barn may be constructed of one thickness of matched boards. It should be large enough to house the entire flock without crowding. Windows enough to permits lots of sunshine to enter and clean, dry bedding under foot are necessities. The lambing pens should be of warmer construction than the general shed.

# Barberries in Molasses.

This is a very old-time recipe and berries are seldom so preserved now. Molasses has been so thoroughly refined and the process has so changed its color and flavor that the old-fashioned recipes do not yield the old-fashioned returns. For the benefit of those desiring the recipe it is as follows: Four quarts of berries, two quarts of molasses. Pick the barberries free from the stems and remove imperfect fruit. Place the molasses on the fire in preserving kettle and when it is boiling put in the berries and boil them until they are full and clear. Place in jars and seal. Care should be taken that the preserve is stirred often or the molasses will burn.

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

# NITRATE OF LITTLE VALUE

So Far That Found in Western States Cannot Be Worked to Finan-cial Advantage.

In connection with the search for potash and nitrates in the United States the government receives many reports of supposed valuable discoveries. A letter recently received by the United States geological survey of the interior department describes a cave in one of the Southern states which was worked by the Confederacy during the Civil war for potassium nitrate. This cave is said to contain at least 1,000,000 tons of nitrous earth, which, however, contains only 1 or 2 per cent of nitrate. The survey now states that it seems very doubtful whether such material can be profitably used as a source of nitrate salts. The minimum grade of caliche now worked in the Chilean fields contains 12 per cent of sodium nitrate, and though there has been much criticism of the crudeness of the methods employed there, the work is done by very cheap Indian labor, and it is doubtful whether leaner material could be worked to advantage here, where the price of labor is so much higher. Several hundred thousand dollars has recently been expended in one of the Western states in testing the proposition to utilize low-grade nitrate. The results have been negative.

## FATHER OF MODERN LIBERTY

Simon De Montfort Credited With Idea Which Led to the Present Popular Representation.

The commons of England were called to sit in parliament for the first time in 1265, a little more than 650 years ago, and 50 years after King John had been forced by the barons to sign the Magna Charts.

The man responsible for this popular representation was Simon de Montfort, earl of Leicester, who was killed in the battle of Evesham on August 4. 1265, only a few months after he had gained a place in history as the father of the English house of commons. Un der his leadership the barons had waged a successful war on King Henry, and had taken the monarch and his son, afterward Edward I, prisoners of war. The vast majority of boys in graded and high schools study their geography out of books. The bluejacket studies geography aboard ship and compares the "book learning" with the real thing as he circumnavigates the globe. The school boy at home gets his history out of the books, but the bluejacket may add to his book knowledge a glimpse of the inside of Westminster Abbey, or a sight of the Coliseum at Rome, as he is given leave while on his vessel's cruises around the world. He has the fourfold opportunity of serving his country, learning a trade, improving his mind in study, and travel."
