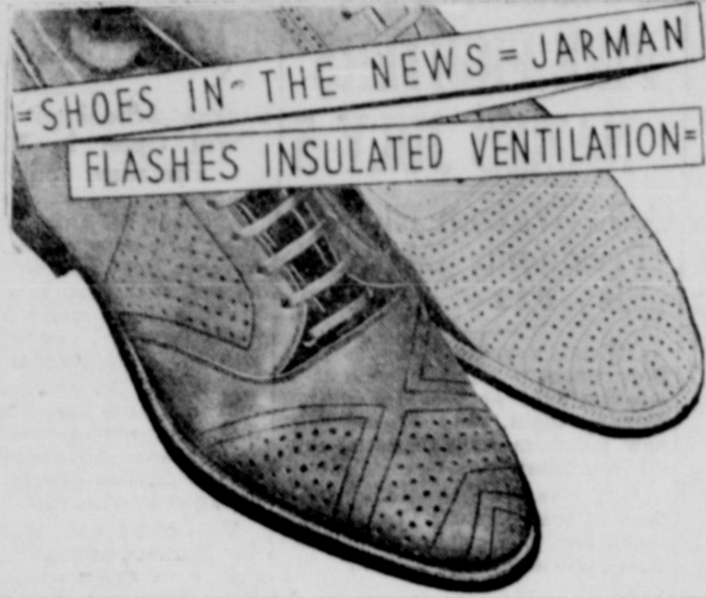

THOUSANDS of tourists are visiting Texas this summer. We see scores pass through Memphis every day, most of them headed toward Dallas and the Pan American Exposition. But wherever they are going, they like to see the points of interest along the way and like to see the beauty of the countryside.

Texas has a reputation of having picturesque scenery, wide prairies, rolling hills, beautiful flowers, cattle and other things that the average tourist is keenly interested in.

With this in mind, we are led to sponsor a movement that is on foot in some of the leading cities of the United States for removal of billboards and other unsightly eyesores which obstruct the scenic beauty in cities and along highways. ### Firemen's Training School To Be Held In College Station

AUSTIN.—Marvin Hall, Fire Insurance Commissioner, today urged Texas fire chiefs and city officials to cooperate in sending to the annual Firemen's Training School representatives from every fire department in the state of Texas. The school will be held at College Station from July 19 to 23.

In a letter addressed to 250 fire chiefs, all said: "From past experience you know that the good of this school training cannot be estimated in any monetary way. We want to urge that your city officials are informed on this subject, and that your department is represented this year."

"In addition to the benefits of specialized training involved, it will be possible for over 250 cities to receive three per cent lower fire insurance rates by sending their representatives to the school," Hall explained. "If a city is receiving credit for a recognized waterworks system and fire department, and the requirements of the Texas General Basis Schedules are complied with, there is a three per cent credit provided in the key rate for full attendance as a student and satisfactory completion of all subjects of the course."

Besides representatives of the Fire Insurance Department, there will be some twenty-five instructors at the school who are experts in the fields of fire fighting and fire prevention. Prof. H. R. Brayton of A. & M. College will be director of the school.

farms; 27 years ago there were 32,076,960, according to figures just released by the Federal Department of Agriculture. American population has grown 40 per cent since 1910, but the increase has been in villages, towns, and cities.

Planting cottonseed of improved varieties, careful seed-bed preparation, good season in the ground and careful cultural practices are contributing to a banner cotton year for Northwest Texas farmers this year. Planting on the contour, in addition to storing plenty of moisture, has saved hundreds of bushels of cottonseed. Seed planted in straight rows was subject to washing and the young plants were either washed out or covered up, which has necessitated much replanting.

According to Texas Department of Agriculture, weeds, plant disease and crop pests cost Texas farmers \$400,000,000 annually. There are 501,017 farms in Texas. Texas cotton yield has declined about 90 lint pounds per acre otherwise, the 1936 crop of 2,945,000 bales would have been 5,000,000 bales. This decline in yield is said to be largely due to farmers planting inferior and worn-out cottonseed.
