## COMMISSIONERS ACT ON COURT HOUSE PROPOSITION; REPUDIATE AGREEMENT TO WAIT 30 DAYS

At a meeting of the commissioners' court yesterday morning the court acted upon the proposed court house trade, to exchange the old building and grounds for a new building, refusing to further consider the proposition and authorizing the paving of the additional forty feet on the square.

By this action the court repudiated the agreement entered into at the mass meeting last Monday week and, of course, withdrew the proposition to submit the matter to a vote of the tax-payers at the run-off primary.

Inquiry failed to elicit information as to the sudden change of front, though the direct question was asked the court by a Democrat representative.

It was learned, however, that a joint meeting of the commissioners and the city council was held at the city hall last Thursday at which the meeting of the court Wednesday was agreed upon.

The action was taken yesterday before noon, with only three commissioners present. Commissioner Vardy of Estelline, not arriving until afternoon, at which time he understood the meeting was to be held. Mr. Vardy expressed himself as being much opposed to the action taken, saying that he felt that the people should have been given an opportunity to pass upon the matter, as agreed. Judge McIntosh stated that there was no dissenting vote.

The additional paving on the square contracted for will amount to about \$15,000 making a total of around \$26,000 for the county to pay.

## DEMOCRATS HOLD COUNTY CONVENTION

The Hall County Democratic Convention was held at the court house, and called to order at two o'clock p. m. on the 29th day of July, 1922, by the county chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee. The following proceedings were had:

David Fitzgarrald, J. V. Leak, One Mortan, Sam Hamilton, Judge Presler, and J. M. Elliott.

A motion to adjourn was made and carried and the convention adjourned.

Only fifteen or twenty delegates were present; the smallest representation at a democratic convention in the county for many years.
