

WHAT ONE MAN CAN'T DO -AN ORGANIZATION CAN

WHEN AN ARCHITECT draws up the plans for a house, he leaves, using a slang expression, "no plank unturned."

In other words, the architect figures out every detail of the structure, whatever it may be, in advance. He is familiar with every corner, every nail, every small detail of the work to be done.

Here in Memphis, we have an organization somewhat similar to the staff of an expert architect. This organization is made up of experts, men who know what they are going to do in advance, men who know what they are doing when they do their work, men who know what has been completed when their assigned task is done.

This organization is the local Soil Conservation Service office, composed of men who plan their work in advance down to the smallest detail, go to the scene of "construction" and see that the work is done according to well-laid plans (even helping do the work themselves), then finally make a complete check-up on the work done after the project has been complet-

Work done by these soil experts is varied in nature, but all of it reverts back to the same resultinestimable value to the landowners who cooperate in the soil conserving projects.

As an example of the amount of money saved by just one phase of the soil conservation office's work is that of terracing. The estimated cost (the cheapest estimate that can be made, according to authorities) of terracing an acre is \$1. Now under the contracts made, the government through the soil conservation of the puts up about half of this amount—thereby saving the landowners 50 cents on each acre. And terracing of about 50,000 acres in this area has been planned. Figure out the saving for yourself.

But under the program of the local soil conservation office comes numerous other projects, all of which benefit the landowner.

For example, 100 dams, or stock tanks; have been planned for this area-and 80 of them completed when the last official report was made in October.

In contour ridge and furrow work, more than 23,000 acres have been planned, and more than 19,000 acres of that work was completed through October

For contour cultivation work, more than 47,000 acres have been planned, and more than 36,000 acres completed. Forty thousand acres have been planned for the cover crop program, and through October 30; weeks ago, pointed out the value of the camp to Mem-000 of these acres had received this expert treatment phis.

A total of 49,000 acres are under the cropping system plan of the soil experts, a plan whereby the crops are planted according to well-laid details. Strip cropping, where crops are alternately planted in rows to avoid wearing out of land, has been planned for more than 46,000 acres, and 36,000 of these have been completed.






