### STATE HIGHWAY LAW IS HELD TO BE VALID

Bullitin Issued By the Judge Declares Law Levying License Upon Autos Coustitutional. Police Power of State

Austin, July 17 .- The constitution ality of the law creating the state highway commission was upheld today by Judge George Calhoun in the Fifty-third district court in opinion rendered in the injunction case of P. S. Atlains against Curtis Han of the state highway commission or exemption except Judge Calhoun refused to grant an industrial grounds. injunction to plaintiff to restain the collection of the license tax. ### PORTO RICO GOES FOR PROHIBITION

Liquor Voted Out by Big Majority; San Juan Goes Dry by a Vote of Almost Two to One

San Juan, Porto Rico, July 17 .-Porto Rico voted for prohibition by a big majority at yesterday's election.

With four unimportant towns missing, the returns showed 99,775 votes for prohibition and 61,295 against.

Fifty-one muncipalities voted for the prohibitioon measure, as compared with twenty-one opposed to it. San Juan's vote for prohibition was 5,117 for and 2,255 against.



#### WAR'S CALL TO THE FARMER

Live Stock Breeder's Opportunity as Well as Duty Presented by Big Food Shortage.

The present food shortage, which threatens to become much more serious, is the live stock farmer's opportunity as well as the call to the patriotic duty.

In view of the grave situation, the division of animal forestry, University Farm, St. Paul, offers the following suggestions to the live stock farmers:

Keep all live stock off pastures till the grass has a good start, and the sod will withstand tramping and retain the moisture in the soil. Much more feed will be yielded and hay saved in the long run by this method. "A week too early to grass in the spring means three weeks less pasture in the fall."

Do not turn out steers about ready for market; they will shrink more than

they will gain, and other stock needs the pasture.

Raise all calves for which there is ample feed.

Save high-priced feed by providing hog pastures, and labor by self-feeders

and crops to be hogged-off. Rebreed sows that have farrowed early for fall litters wherever concen-

trates are available for feed. Substitute and supplement oats in the rations of farm and city workhorses by brewers' grains, oilmeal, molasses and alfalfa hay, thus releasing the oats for the horses in army serv-

Breed all suitable mares to the best stallion available.

Keep chickens on city lots. They utilize kitchen waste, require only light labor such as children, old folks, and convalescents can supply, and make quick and economic returns in

meat and eggs. Observe all rules of stable hygiene and sanitation to control animal dis-

#### SUMMER PASTURE FOR SWINE

Green Food Is Required for Best Development of Pigs-Alfalfa Is Relished by Animals.

RAISE RABBITS FOR MEAT

Production of Belgian Hares or Other Rabbits Possible in City Back Yards.

Rabbits, which have proved a valuable source of food in Europe during the present war, may well be raised more extensively in America by the way of reducing the drain on the orgists of the United States Department ing rabbits, the specialists point out, of cities and towns as well as on farms

by the department, breeds rapidly, matures quickly, and produces a palacost of production is less than that of The supply can be greatly increased within a few months without requir production of crops. Practical expermeat can be produced in unlimited quantities at a cost of about 6 cents a pound and by utilizing lawn cuttings and other vegetation that would other wise be wasted the cost can be made even lower.

The Belgian and Flemish giant rabbits are recommended for meat production, as the ordinary tame rabbit is smaller and develops more slowly. Stock of Belgian hares may be bought from breeders in nearly all the States at \$1 to \$3 each. They may occasionally be had from pet-stock dealers. Fancy pedigreed stock is not required for meat production

Rabbits are easily kept. They eat hay grass, lawn cuttings, and green should be allowed to breed when 8 oc 10 months old, and during the year should raise four litters of about six young each. Well fed, the young to six pounds live weight

The department has published a bulletin on raising rabbits which will to be conducted. be helpful to those who wish to engage in this pursuit.

A. E. L. Knight Tenders Use of Grounds to Government During the War

'The men whom you are calling into service are being concentrated in central military training camps, because it is found to be much more efficient to train them in that way than by es tablishing camps in every little town of our fair that there is just as much necessity for calling the great rank and file of food producers and food users into central food training camps for a short course in the more effic-ient methods of food production and food conservation. It could hardly be done now, for the Nation is working hard to care for the crop already planted, but if we could hold such a food training camp during the lull fully efficient instruction in food production and conservation could be

To Raise More Live Stock.

"To make this food training camp unusually instructive, an effort is being made to induce breeders of purebred live stock to exhibit in larger numbers of such type and breeds as will assist the Nation in meeting the demand for more meat, milk, butter, cheese, leather, wool and horse power. Manufacturers of farm machinery are being urged to exhibit all of their latest models and improvements, that farmers may learn how to produce a maximum crop at a minimum effort. All the territory tributary to our fair is being scoured to find superior speci-mens of the varieties of grain, vegetables, fruits, forage crops and corn best suited to our soil and climate, that encouragement may be given to the production of as much of these crops as possible.

(see par. XV below.) (b) Whether you file a claim of exemption or not, you must present your self for for physical examination on the day named in the notice.

From the day notice that you are called is mailed and posted you have seven days in which you may file a claim of exemption or discharge. The form for filing this claim is simple. If you wish to file such claim-

(a) Go to the board and get Form 110 for exemption or Form 121 for discharge. If the board has not the

(b) Fill out the proper form and file it with the board.

(c) Do this within seven days of the posting and mailing of notice to you to present yourself.

The following are the only grounds for exemption.

1. That you are an officer, legislative, executive, or judicial of United States, a State or Territory, or the District of Columbia.

2. That you are a regular or duly ordained minister of religion.

3. that you were on May 18, 1917, a student preparing for the ministry in any theological or divinity school.

4. That you are in the military of naval service of the United States. 5. That you are a subject of Germany, whether you have taken out

6. That you are a resident allen who has not taken out firist papers.

#### Ten Days after Filing Claim to File Proof

#### Adverse Decisions on Claim

If your claim is disallowed by the local board your name will be certified and sent by the local board to the dis trict board as one one who has been called for military service and not exempted or discharged. Within two days thereafter, if practicable, a list of those so certified to the district board will be given to the press with a request for publication, will be posted in the offices of the local board accessible to the public view, and notice will be mailed to the address on your registration card.

#### Claims for Discharge on Industrial Grounds.

Only the district board can receive laims for discharge on the ground that you are engaged in industry, including agriculture found to be necess ary to the maintenance of the military establishment, the effective operation of the military forces, or the maintenance of the national interest during the emergency.

Such claims must be filed with the district board on or before the fifth day after the mailing and posting of notice that you have been certified by the local board as one who has been
