



Satisfactory Progress on Altus-Roswell

Houston, Texas., May 15.-That atisfactory progress is being made rom east to west straight across the great Panhandle of Texas is the inormation given out by the Houstonans interested in the building of the line, who say that before some of the North Texas people wake up to what is going on the railroad will have been completed. The line referred to is the Altus, Roswell & El Paso Railroad, projected to run from Altus, Ok., to Roswell, N. M., and ultimately into El Paso. This line has been impleted for some distance out of Altus, one big bridge has been completed and the contractors are at work on the only other bridge on the first stretch of the line between Memphis,

Tex., and Altus. Mr. Edward Kennedy, president of he road, who is in Houston today, was asked concerning the dispatches that have appeared in the press recenty regarding the letting of contracts for additional stretches of grading and other work. Mr. Kennedy confirmed the reports and gave further details

of what is going on. One of the latest developments is the selection of a location for the shops of the road. Repair, work is usually concentrated as much as possible at one point on a railroad and the location of railroad shops in a town or city invariably adds to the prestige and prosperity of that place. MEMPHIS, TEXAS has been selected as the location of the shops of the Altus, Roswell & El Paso by the men who are directing the destinies of that road, and as it is said to already be one of the best towns between Fort Worth and Amarillo the prospects for a legitimate boom for Memphis

are said to be bright. Mr. Kennedy states that while there s, of course, little necessity for shops right at present, there will be in the near future and the necessity will naturally increase as the road is extended. Nevertheless, the railroad builders have bound themselves by contract to employ altogether not less than 300 men at Memphis, in return for for which 200 acres of land have been secured by the company, upon which will be located the yards, shops,
