

'VE been doing a lot of experimenting this winter and with the help of a family of most critical testers, I've come to the conclusion that my beef roasts have been more tender and flavorsome when NOT seared, which contradicts expert advice to keep the oven very hot for twenty minutes to seal in the juices. Searing really never did keep in the juices. yet made it almost impossible to cook the roast uniformly. I've gotten my best results when I put the roast into an oven preheated to 325 degrees F. and alle differty minutes to the pound.
We like beef best if it's salted


