### TAX BOARD TO **DELAY FIXING**

Not Be Set Until Next Month; Counties Slow

AUSTIN, July 20.—Slowness of counties in rendering estimates of taxable values likely will force the state automatic board to delay until August determination of the state ad valorem tax rate, George H. Sheppard comptroller and member of the board, said yesterday. The board will conduct a formal

meeting tomorrow, he said, in compliance with the statutes, and recess to a later date.

Sixteen of the 254 counties had failed to certify to the comptroller estimates of valuation, although they were due July 15. Estimates of values of oil and gas pipe lines, on which taxes will be levied for the first time this year, also will be available until after Aug. 1, according to H. P. Edwards, state tax commissioner. A preliminary estimate placed their value \$100,000,000.





### OUR BURGLARY RATE IS TOO HIGH

**QURGLARS** in Memphis are becoming so numerous that they are beginning to be classified as "not even news copy". From what information we can gather, it seems the people are beginning to accept the continual petty thievery and house-breaking as something they must contend with and many of them do not even notify the police.

It has been estimated that there is an average of from two to four robberies here every week. Most of them are extremely small cases—a filling station robbed of an inner-tube; a house broken into and a suit of clothes taken; a gasoline pump lock broken and five gallons of gasoline taken—small cases, but very irritating.

An average of two burglaries each week would make over 100 offenses within a year's time. Compare this with the record at Clarendon. A Clarendon officer here recently stated that city had only three burglary cases reported during the past year.

Why should the rate be so high here, if it is no more than that at Clarendon? Three burgalries in one year is an unusual record; so is two or three every week.

Something new in the way of handling such cases has been reported here. Several persons who were robbed have been reported dealing directly with the offenders rather than through the local police, paying in cash for the return of their stolen property. Such action will only tend to increase the epidemic of rob-

The situation is a difficult one to deal with, apparently. Police facilities will not allow a net of watchmen throughout the city each night. However, They also are frequently infected and changes in the walls of the the situation might be relieved by a careful check-up of questionable characters appearing on the streets whooping cough and measles. at late hours, apparently for no good purpose.

### ANTI-SEMITISM HIDES GRAVER ISSUE

In 1911, Beilis was living in a surburb of the Russian city of Kiev. The suburb had 10,000 inhabitants. of whom Beilis was the only Jew. Since anti-Semitism was almost as rampant in Russian then as it is in ent, such as inflammation of the or eliminated until the condition Germany now, Beilis was not popular.

One day the body of a 13-year-old-boy was found in digestion, asthmatic attacks and in fact all sorts of troubles. in a cave on the edge of the suburb. The lad had been murdered; his body was pierced by no fewer than 47 stab wounds. And Beilis was promptly arrested and Side Glances charged with murder.

Strictly speaking, there was no evidence against him. But that made no difference; the accusation and the trial were matters of passion, anyway. For Beilis was accused of having performed a "ritual murder." He had killed the boy, it was said, so he might use the blood to sprinkle on matzoths, the Passover bread.

It is hard for us, today, to understand how such a charge could be taken seriously—but it stirred all Russia. Citizens of Kiev shrieked for Beilis' blood.

The trial was not held until 1913, and the czar had to order out 1500 Cossacks and 1500 infantrymen to keep Beilis from being lynched. Once a bomb was thrown at the carriage that took him to court; another time, a mob tried to burn a street car in which he was being carried.

In the end, of course, Beilis was acquitted. Shortly afterward a woman member of a band of thieves confessed the murder. She was executed, and Beilis, after many tribulation, made his way to America, where he lived the rest of his life in peace.

Now all this would hardly be worth recalling today, except for the light that it throws on that strangest of human phenomena, anti-Semitism.

The anti-Semitism of Russia was an artificial growth, pumped by the government to distract the populace's attention from its real troubles. It betokened, as it always does, a society ready to crash from its own rottenness.

Looking back at it, we can remind ourselves that the man or the organization that raises the banner of anti-Semitism usually does it to keep people from noticing something of infinitely greater consequence.
