American Legion Notes

RESPECT SHOULD BE ACCORDED THE FLAG

There is on foot among organizations designed to promote patriotism, citizenship and statesmanship, a con_ certed effort to bring about more reverence for the United States flag and to curb the careless disregard for the correct flag usage.

Flag Not Drapery.

nately for draping windows and Description of Work to be Done. (\$5,000.00) five thousand dollars Description of Work to be Done. doors, arches and floats in parades and for gala occasions.

If it is desired to use the flag on the speaker's platform, in an auditorium or such place, the flag should be displayed above and behind the speaker. It should never be used to cover the speaker's desk or to drape in front of the platform.

There are two occasions where the flag may be used as a covering. One such occasion is for the unveiling of a statue or monument. The regulations recite that when the flag is used in unveiling it should not be allowed to touch the ground, but should be carried aloft to wave in the air, forming a distinctive part of the ceremony The other ocasion is when the flag is used to cover a coffin. Even on that occasion special rules apply which require that the flag be placed on the coffin so that the Union (star spangled blue) is at the head of the coffin and over the left shoulder of the body. When the coffin is lowered into the grave the flag must not touch the ground

Half-Mast Ceremony.

The flag should be displayed on the staff out of doors only from surise to sunset, according to strict flag usage. It should be displayed on national and State holidays and on special occasions. On occasions such as the death of Warren G. Harding and Woodrow Wilson the flag is flown at half-mast for a period of time designated by proper authority. There is a certain formality about bringing the flag to half-mast which should be observed. First, the flag should be hoisted to the peak and then lowered to half-mast. When the flag is to be lowered for the night it should be raised to the peak and then lowered. On Memorial Day, May 30, proper usage requires that the flag is displayed at half-mas from suarise until exactly noon, at which time it should be raised to the peak and remain there until sunsel

When the flag is displayed by itself an a staff the position (star-spangled blue) should be up ward and toward the staff. It is against all usage to display the flag upside down except as a distress signal. Often a ship in distress displays the flag, which flies on its highest staff, upside down.





Salute to Flag


The flag is often conspiciously displayed in church, and special regulations hold its use there, also. When displayed on a staff in church it should be to the right of the congregation as they face the clergyman. Any other flag used should be displayed to the left of the congregation.

The salute to the flag, which is be ing instilled as a reverent observance into the hearts of the American boys and girls, should be generally known and observed among grown-ups. It is a commonly mistaken idea that women and girls are not required to salute flag. If such were the case women with their aggregation of new rights and powers, would probably demand that a special observance be designated for them. However, it is not necessary, as flag usage outlines the woman's salute to the flag.

During the ceremony of hoisting and lowering the flag or when the flag is passing in parade or review, all persons present should face the flag, stand at attention and salute. For men in service uniform the occasion demands the right-hand salute. Men not in uniform should remove the hat with the right hand and place the hat over the heart, at the left shoulder. Women should salute by placing the right hand over the heart. The salute to the flag in moving column is given at the moment when the flag is passing.

Should Not Touch Ground.

The flag should not be allowed to touch the ground or to trail in water. It should not be hoisted in a careless manner that might result in its being torn. It should not be cut or knotted, nor should it be defacted with drawings or lettering. When the flag is in such a condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display it should not be carelessly cast aside or used in a way that might be
