



THE balance wheel, in modern watches, makes one revolution each time the watch ticks. The watch ticks 5 times each second, 300 times in one minute, 18,000 times in one hour, 432,000 times in one day, and 157,680,000 times in one year.

A VARIATION OF 1000 PART

In the vibrations of the hair spring, which controls the balance wheel, will make a difference of 15 minutes per day, if the variation is only 10000 part it will make a difference of 90 seconds in twentyfour hours: and 30000 part brings it down to one second per day-which is about the average rate of modern watches.

If the watch owner will stop to think a moment, he will see that it is necessary to give the watch fairly good treatment in order to get good time out of it.



County Attorney. "Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas;

Sec. 1. That Art. 375, Title XI, ant. Chapter 2, of the Penal Code of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows, to-wit:

Art. 375. If any person shall establish a raffle for, or dispose by raffle of any estate, real or personal, exceeding Five Hundred Dollars in value, he shall be fined not less than \$100.00 nor more than One Thousand Dollars; or if any person shall establish a raffle for, or shall dispose by raffie of any estate, real or personal, of the value of Five Hundred Dollars, or less, he shall be fined not less than Five Doll rs. nor more than Two Hundred Dollars. 
