Expose of Nazis Shows Espionage to Be More Than Fanciful Bogey

T was something of a rude awakening, but the United States has finally realized that espionage activities are not entirely fictitious fare dished out for the benefit of thrill-seeking readers and movie fans.

When a New York City special grand jury suddenly and dra-matically announced indictment of 18 German agents, a large part of the American citizenry learned that their nation is pretty well mixed up in a web of foreign intrigue. . . .

BACK of the moral indictment of Germany is a story that reads like an adventure novel, a tale which had its beginning in Dundee, Scotland, and came to a climax in America.

Last January British secret service agents who arrested Mrs. Jessie Wallace Jordan in her Dundee beauty salon discovered that she served as a relay between three suspected Nazi spies in the United States and the home land.

In February the passport bu-reau in New York received a mysterious telephone call. In the name of a phony undersecretary of state, the caller ordered some blanks delivered to his hotel. Officials sent a dummy package, trailed it, and arrested Guenther Rumrich, deserter from the U.S. army.

Then a red-haired beauty operator on a German liner-Johanna Hoffman-was found with a letter offering \$1000 for information on U. S. aircraft carriers. At Mitchel Field, L. I., Erich Glaser, who had been watched for six months, was discovered carrying letters from Mrs. Jordan. The mass of information grew until 18 men and women, only four of whom remained on U. S. shores, were indicted.

The Nazi case has thrown a spotlight on spy activity. But according to Thomas M. Johnson, war correspondent and writer and authority on international espionage, it is only a pin-prick of light compared to a wider beam which could be focused on many other agents.

There are more foreign spies from more foreign countries in our land today, says Johnson, than ever before in peacetime
