Says Farmers Entitled to Prosperity. Too Many Idle Men in Cities

Austin, Texas.-Governor Ferguson is not in accord with the move ment to reduce the price of foodstuffs. He said if food prices should be reduced it would be at the expense of the farmer and that he was not willing that the farmer should lose any of his well-earned prosperity. He declared that the farmer is just now coming inle Used To Beautify to his own; that a few years ago when the farmer was getting 6c a pound for cotton no meetings were held in the cities to boost the price of cotton.

One of the reasons why prices are high, the Governor said, is that too large a percentage of the people have drifted to the cities. The farmers' family must eat. The question is whether he will feed them from a spring garden, the home dairy and the home poultry yard, or whether he will feed them from the grocery store. The further question is. whether he may not raise food for market at a greater profit than cotton. City folks can and will patch their clothes if cotton remains high during the spring, and they can thereby reduce the price of cotton next fall. But they must eat, and they cannot cut down their rations.


