Senate Approves Early Payment of **37 Cotton Bounty**

Amendment to Agricultural Appropriation Bill by Senator Connally Adopted

Early payment of the 1937 cetton bounty of two cents per ound has been approved by the senate in adopting the amendment l of Senator Tom Connally of Texas to the agricultural appro-priation bill. When the bill is finally enacted into law the department will start immediate preparations to make payment upon proper proof of compliance, Senator Connally has been ad-

The benefit payments to cotton farmers are made possible by the Connally-Jones amendment to the agricultural adjustment act of 1935. This amendment, which was sponsored in the Senate by Senator Connally, provided that a percentage of the revenue from eustoms duties should be used by the Secretary of Agriculture to pay bounties to farmers and otherwise aid in the increase of

agricultural exports.

Last August Senator Connally offered a resolution in the Sen ate making provision for benefit payments to cotton farmers on heir 1937 crop under the terms of the Connally-Jones plan. was finally put into effect but provided that payments should go only to farmers who cooperated in the 1938 program. The Comp. troller General ruled that such payments could not be made until the end of the 1938 crop year and officials of the Department of Agriculture said it would be December before farmers would get their checks. Senator Connally then introduced his amendment providing that the payments should be made just as soon as a farmer shows he is complying with the 1938 program. Approx mately \$130,000,000 will go to farmers as benefit payments under the provisions of this




