

At press time it is unclear exactly how many days the Resource Center will be open each week and which agencies will continue to use it. It is also unclear who will take care of scheduling and other day-to-day duties which were once performed by Mrs. Kellogg. It is believed, however, that the Texas Department of Public Safety will continue to offer Driver's License services at the Center for the time being. The Success will publish agency schedules and meeting places as they become available. Already, the Community Action Council has announced it will be moving its meeting place to the Memorial Building (see notice on page 3)
