this food to preserve it for distributhis food to preserve it
tion to hungry people."

The place is called Breedlove Dehydrated Foods, named for the family that donated land for the facility. It is the only non-profit dehydration plant in the world. Most of the food being processed now is going overseas to places like North Korea, Turkey, Romania, Kosovo, Bosnia, Ukraine and Mozambique. "We dehydrate primarily potatoes, onions and carrots, then blend the products we dehydrate with other products we purchase and make a dehydrated vegetable blend. The costof it is three point four cents per serving."
The plant turns out five flavors of the same product. Dehydration is probably the oldest method of food preservation
"Literally, it's just taking the water out of the vegetables. We have a unit that does that with heat. Like potatoes, we take out approximately eighty-five percent of the weight of the raw potato. That way, we have a light-weight product that can be re-hydrated back to ninetyfive to ninety-eight percent of the original product. It keeps its nutri-
ents and the food value it had to

Right now Breedlove is operating at 15 to 20 percent of capacmillion pounds of raw product per week. Several religious and service organizations (Baptist, Methodists, hunger relief agencies and Rotarians are some of the biggest cus-
tomers) buy the dehydrated food and deliver it to hungry people around the world
"They just add the packages of dehydrated food to boiling water and let it simmer for about twenty-
five or thirty minutes and it's ready five or thirty minutes and it's ready
to eat. They can spice it as they like and add other ingredients."
Food doesn't only come from South Plains farmers. Companies like Frito-Lay and Campbell's Soup also donate huge amounts of vegetables. Campbell Soup recently gave Breedlove a million pounds of
carrots. The dehydrated food can last up to two years and requires no refrigeration A two pound package contains 50 servings. A three ounce package has 4 servings.
A Rotary brochure says almost one in five persons on earth is affected by hunger, robbing its victims of health, hope and dignity.
That organization hopes to work with Breedlove to make the world with Breedlove to make the world hunger-free by the year 2015 . Lubbock is a good place for the plant. It's one of the most agriculturally productive areas of the
US. If the southern high plains of Texas was an independent nation, it would rank in the top ten agricultural producing nations in the world.
