"The eleven families under the F. S. A. plan in this county may well be called pioneers in this industry," U. D. Kindrick, county supervisor of the F. S. A., told the group at the annual meeting of the F. O. Borrowers of the Farm Security Administration for Schleicher county, Thursday, March 9 at the Baptist church.

Continuing, Mr. Kindrick stated that "plans for the industry have succeeded and they are unique in the fact that small farmers now are operating such units and that the production of the vital war products fall on these farmers. Labor curtails production of the larger producers at present, and therefore the small farms must shoulder the burdens of vital war crops."

The supervisor urged the production of large quantities of black-eyed peas and pinto beans, Marvin Jones, Food Price Administrator, has asked for an increase in these goals. These crops pay good prices and are easy to raise, Mr. Kindrick said. Recropping for the coming year was also advised.

In his address the supervisor reviewed last year's work in this county, stating that although the farmers had faced the disadvantages of a dry year, that altogether conditions were good and these families had met their payments according to plan.

Following a basket lunch served by the ladies of the group, E. B. Keng, representing the Soil Conservation program, and also the Triple A, gave an interesting discussion on the conservation of soil and stressed the fact that terracing of land is the backbone of (See "Farm Group" Last Page)

Culberson Deal of San Angelo, in an address to Eldorado Lions' this week pointed out that it is not only the duty, but the privilege of every citizen to contribute to the Red Cross drive. "It is not the old 'Roll Call drive of a dollar' that we have been used to heretofore, but a war fund drive," he said.

Also appearing at the club besides Deal were A. L. McMurtery and J. B. Schilling also of San Angelo, and both officials of the Tom Green County Chapter. "Many county chairmen have said they would hold their drives open until everyone had an opportunity to contribute," said Mr. McMurtery following a similar statement by Mrs. R. J. Page, Schleicher county chairman.

Mrs. Page, together with two of her workers were present at the noon luncheon of the club, and gave reports of their work since the drive actually started here on Monday of this week.

Race Track; Livestock Show Grounds Is Newest Proposal

Much has been said of late in regard to things needed for Eldorado. Another thing called to the attention of this publication as a worthwhile project is acreage to be secured for a livestock show ground and race track. A group of local men this week voiced this proposal, and it is sound reasoning that if their proposal can be perfected it will mean a lot to the community and county both from the angle of encouraging better show stock and entertainment, and also bring financial gain in time to come.

It was intimated that approximately 30 acres of ground would be needed in order to lay out a one-half mile track and grade it, and erect livestock stalls, house concession stands and afford ample parking room.

Considering the large amount of fine livestock, including horses, cattle, sheep and goats, together with poultry that is bred and raised in Schleicher county, and the interest constantly shown here, it would be invaluable to these breeders and producers to have a show ground. Few people are to be found who do not enjoy good horse races and seeing fine livestock.

Naturally, no one would want to consider putting too much money into a project like this during wartime, as it is needed elsewhere, but limited structures could be erected for the duration; in fact several have requested the privilege of erecting their own stalls to care for their stock.

With the present prospect for a good feed crop this year, no doubt there will be many 4-H Club projects started. When livestock of these clubs are finished, why not Schleicher county have a stock show, and advertise it to the country and bring buyers and admirers of good stock here? Producers and breeders would find a ready market for their better grade of stuff not found through any other channel.



practicing in the cultivation of land. Mr. Keng stated that "land is only as permanent as conditions make it," and it must be taken care of. "This county will produce better crops on less rainfall than any I have ever seen," Keng said. In his address, he explained the Triple A program and its advantages in that advice is given on how much the farmer's land can earn through fertility and contour seeding of small grain.

Mr. Keng explained that the drilling of wells under this program, is limited this year due to the lack of money for small farmers. Terracing and pear eradication are limited, Keng explained.

Thomas Buckingham of San Angelo, of the Purina Feed company, gave a discussion of means and methods of raising poultry, stating that due to the shortage of feed this past year, poultry raising had suffered to some extent. Feed will again be short this year, he went on to state, but there are plenty of poultry feeds in this section and may be mixed at home, he pointed out.

Mr. Buckingham conducted a simple quiz on poultry methods and presented those making highest score with a Purina knife. Following, he entertained with a short film called "Chicks to Dollars."

The meeting was closed with a general discussion and summary of the years' work, with Mrs. Isabelle Holliday and L. E. Oliver, San Angelo, assistant supervisor, in charge.
