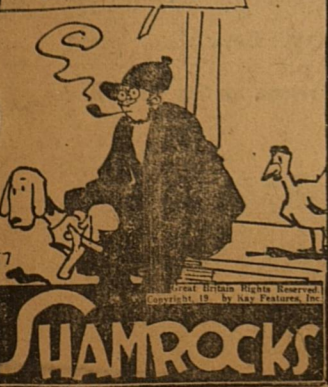
Now we are going to have to conduct a survey in order to determine if all that box of cigars have been handed out. But we are sure that we will get one before two more Lions' club meetings.

Just as sure as we find that box of cigars we are going to attempt to prove our theory that the best place to find a helping hand is at the end of our right arm.

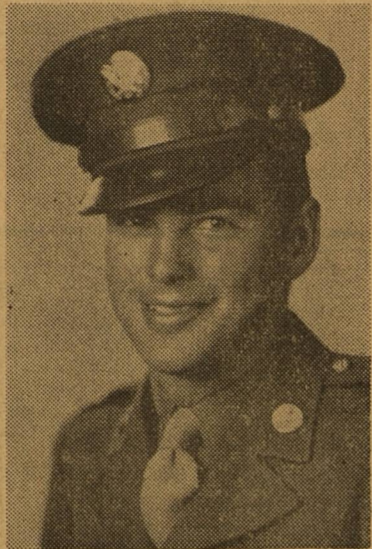

Mr. and Mrs. F. A. (Bill) Edmiston have received their first letter from their son, T/Sgt. Delbert E. Edmiston, who is a prisoner of the German Government. The letter was dated Dec. 25, and was received here Friday, April 28.

Sergeant Edmiston, an aerial gunner on a Flying Fortress, went down over Germany on Dec. 20, and this is the first word received from him since he was taken a prisoner of war. He stated that he was in good health and advised his parents not to write until he could inform them of his permanent address.

Sergeant and Mrs. Edmiston are the parents of a baby girl born April 26 in a San Angelo hospital. She weighed 7 pounds and has been named Genell Sue. Mrs. Edmiston and the baby are residing in Mertzon where they are making their home with Mrs. Edmiston's parents.

## Heavy Rains And Accompanying Hail Fell Saturday, Sunday

Light rain fell in Eldorado and vicinity early Saturday morning and was accompanied by a light hail. Soon after daylight Sunday rains again began falling that were interspersed with hail flurries most of the morning and at noon Eldorado and some surrounding areas received a heavy hail that was accompanied by something of a water spout, that filled bar ditches, gutters and nearby lakes to overflowing.

The precipitation came following several weeks of drought and high winds that had crusted the ground and retarding crop and vegetation growth to a great extent.

Reports are that the rainfall amounted from 1 7/8 inches to more than 5 1/2 inches.

## New Bus Schedule Now In Effect Here

Beginning Monday of this week an extra bus was added to the O. S. T. bus line operating between Del Rio and San Angelo. The additional bus, however, will only be operated between Sonora and San Angelo, with the regular bus schedule of heretofore being maintained between the Border City and San Angelo.

The new service was effected following a request by the Eldorado Lions' Club to Virge Bowen, operator of the line, who in turn presented the matter to the Railroad Commission where it was approved in order to afford better connections along the line with buses to other points both in Sonora and San Angelo.

The newly added bus will leave Eldorado at 7:40 a. m. and arrive in San Angelo at 9:15 a. m. Then at night it will again leave San Angelo at 10:35 p. m. and arrive in Eldorado at 11:50 p. m.

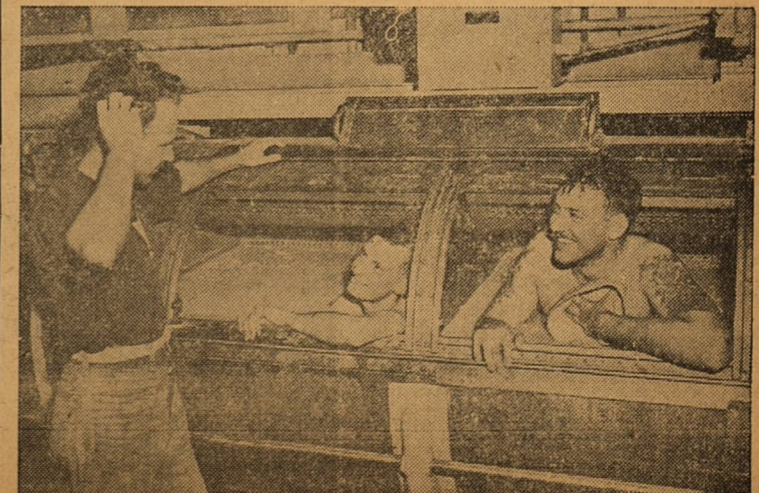

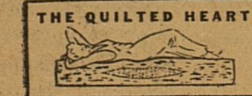

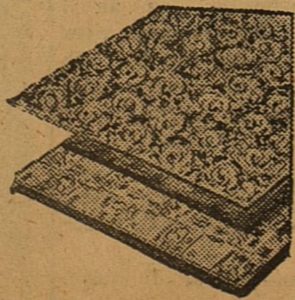

**Best Bet For Babies!**



Baby can share in his first birthday cake when it is made of Spanish Cream and garnished with orange jelly rabbits!

Desserts made with plain unflavored gelatine are a treat for tykes and they contain only the most wholesome foods, such as milk, eggs, and fruit juices. Gelatine itself is a valuable supplementary protein food, and its quality of digestibility makes it an important food for infants.

Tiny tots will be happy with the simplest of desserts which can be prepared in a jiffy. Here are two suggestions for your baby—if he or she has reached the ripe age of eight or nine months!

**Spanish Cream**

- 1 envelope plain unflavored gelatine
- 2 cups milk
- 3 eggs
- 1/4 cup light corn syrup (or 1/2 cup sugar)
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Soften gelatine in 1/4 cup of the cold milk. Beat egg yolks, add remaining milk, corn syrup, and salt. Cook in double boiler until of custard consistency, stirring constantly. Add softened gelatine and stir until dissolved. Remove from heat, and fold in vanilla and stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into one large mold (or individual molds) that has been rinsed out in cold water first, and chill. (This will separate and form a jelly on the bottom with fluffy custard on top. If you do not wish this separation, allow custard to cool until it begins to thicken before folding in egg whites). Unfold when firm, and serve with desired garnish.

Note: Double the recipe to make birthday cake.

**Orange Jelly**

- 1 envelope plain unflavored gelatine
- 1/2 cup cold water
- 1 cup hot water
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- Orange pulp, if desired

Soften gelatine in cold water. Add sugar, salt, and hot water and stir until gelatine is dissolved. Add orange juice, mix thoroughly, and pour into a mold that has been rinsed out in cold water first. Chill until firm, unmold, and serve.

Note: For birthday cake decorations, mold orange jelly about one-half inch deep in flat container. Cut with cookie cutter.

Part of the children's school work has included the study and use of money and to aid in teaching them further, they were given paper money with which to pay

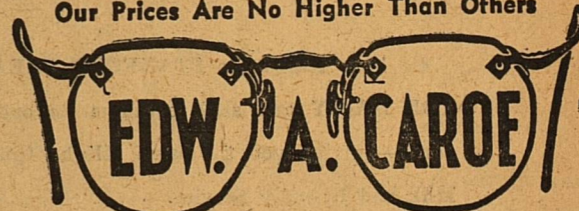
for their refreshments of animal cookies, nuts and red lemonade.

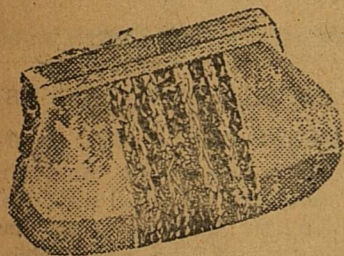

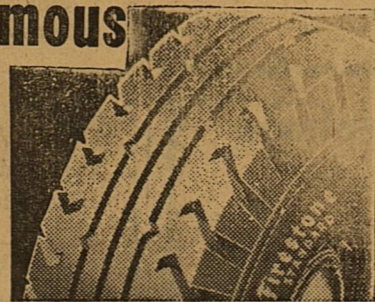

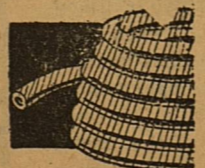

**Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District News**

REPORTED BY DISTRICT SUPERVISORS

**Soil News**

Approximately 40 pounds of bitterweed plants were pulled from the roadway between Eldorado and the Aaron Steward ranch on the Ozona road, E. B. King, Soil Conservation Service Representative, reported today.

Practically every landowner and tenant having land adjacent to the road assisted in pulling the weeds, in an effort to prevent the destructive weed from spreading into clean territory.

Landowners who do not have bit

ter weed at present should make a thorough search along all roads adjacent to their lands. This should be done immediately, as the bitterweed is in full bloom at present and can be easily found.

Bitterweed seeds are scattered along roads by automobiles, trucks and livestock coming from bitterweed areas, particularly during wet times. If these seeds are allowed to make mature plants, thousands of new seed will be formed and the process of eradicating will become much more difficult.

**ANSWERS for Victory Gardeners**



**What Is the Greatest Enemy to the Nation's Food Supply?**

It has been estimated that in this country alone insects use up and destroy every year the equivalent of the labor of one million men. Only by constantly fighting the battle against insects with insecticide sprays and dusts are we able to come off even partially victorious against our small enemies.

**What About Dusts to Control Insects?**

When lead arsenate is put into water and then sprayed on vegetables, the water is the carrier which permits the lead arsenate to be sprayed over the leaves evenly. The water then evaporates, leaving the poison behind it so that the insect will get a mouthful no matter where he settles to eat a meal off the plant. Water is a good carrier while spraying an upright growing plant like a potato or a tomato vine, or even such plants as beans, especially if they are the climbing variety which have been carefully put up on poles, so that you can get at them; but real difficulties develop when an insect attack comes on low growing plants. An attack of melon aphid can be a real problem for the gardener, especially if he has a large patch. He will be only too happy to turn to a dusting program.

**How Do I Make Dust For My Garden?**

Nicotine dust can be made easily, even by an inexperienced "hand" if the underlying principle is understood. Most insects found in the Victory Garden can be controlled with such a dust if lead or calcium arsenate in dry form is mixed with it. All that is required for an effective dust is to incorporate into dry hydrated lime dust a small amount of Black Leaf 40,

being careful to mix it in an airtight container so that no nicotine fumes are lost. Needless to say, the mixing job must be thorough.

**How Strong Should the Dust Be?**

For a good all around dust the amount of Black Leaf 40 should be 5% of the weight of the lime. If only a little dust is needed, 10 pounds of lime may be put in a tin can with a tight cover and 8 ounces of Black Leaf 40 added. A dozen small stones the size of golf balls should also be thrown in and the whole turned end over end for fifteen minutes.

**How Do I Apply Dust?**

A dusting gun is of course the best way to distribute the dust but if such is not available good results can be obtained by means of a baking powder can with holes punched in the bottom. The dust is shaken out on the plants with care taken to cover the under side as well as top of the leaves. Nicotine dust should be applied on warm days when the fumes are most effectively released. The air should be still—if the wind is blowing the fumes are blown away. Dust should be applied promptly when insects are first seen, and before infestation becomes heavy.

**Can I Buy Dust Ready-Made?**

In many localities packages of dust are put up commercially by local concerns which mix the lime and Black Leaf 40 and offer it fresh to the trade.

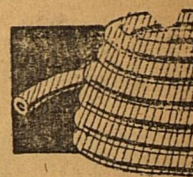
