"Pulling Party" Cleared Many Bitterweed From Town Section; Enjoyed Barbecue

"Bitterweed is like the 'itch,'" said H. T. Finley, speaking to the crowd who assembled to pull bitterweed last Thursday. He pointed out that "it is something that you catch from your neighbors, something you don't want other people to know you have, and something you want to get rid of."

Aroused by the encroachment of bitterweed along the roads and on the Eldorado townsite several Schleicher County landowners, assisted by E. B. Keng, Soil Conservation Service representative, organized a "bitterweed pulling" meeting to pull the weed from the town section. Some 50 farmers, ranchers, business men, and Boy Scouts turned out to pull approximately 1,500 pounds of bitterweed. This weed pulling was in excess perhaps to what had already been pulled by men employed this, as well as past years by the Commissioners' Court in an effort to avoid spread of the poisonous weed to clean territory.

Around 100 persons gathered on the courthouse lawn in the evening to eat barbecue and listen to short talks on bitterweed by H. T. Finley and Mr. Keng.

Town Centers Some 800 Sections
In rough figures the town of Eldorado is located in the approximate center of some 800 sections of land which are still free from the poisonous weed. "Since Eldorado is on 'top of the Divide' and because the roads lead in all directions into clean territory, it is extremely important that bitterweed be controlled on the town section and on the roads," Keng pointed out. When we realize that the presence of bitterweed lowers the land value from five to ten dollars per acre the problem becomes of interest to every citizen of the county.

Mr. Finley, in discussing the effects of bitterweed infestation, referred to a ranch with which he was familiar and compared returns before and after bitter weed became established.

"Before bitter weed spread over this ranch," Mr. Finley stated, "the ewes sheared around 9 3/4 pounds of wool and the lambs averaged 73 pounds off the grass in the fall. After bitterweed infestation covered the ranch the wool clip dropped below six pounds and the lambs averaged 54 pounds. The percent of the lamb crop also dropped correspondingly. In addition, the ewes now have to be kept in a trap on full feed during the winter months."

W. T. Whitten, who acted as chairman of the meeting, urged landowners to become aware of the seriousness of the bitterweed menace and to continue to fight its spread to new areas.

Weeds were gathered in sacks last week by the "pulling party" and were destroyed by fire by the group.

Judge John F. Sutton, Judge Of 51st. Judicial District Court Seeks Re-election On Records

Judge John F. Sutton, who for many years has presided over the 51st District Court, authorizes this paper to carry his formal announcement as a candidate to succeed himself. His candidacy is submitted to the voters of Tom Green, Irion, Schleicher, Coke and Sterling Counties with the request that his official record be examined to determine whether his decisions have been correct, his conduct of the business of the court fair, and for the best interest of the people as a whole. Judge Sutton refers those who have only recently moved into the District to the hundreds of men who have served as jurors. "Jurors know," says Judge Sutton, "Whether a trial Judge discharges his duties with that courage, fairness and efficiency so essential to an economical disposition of the business of the court. It is important to the people generally and essential to the welfare of the Government that a District Judge be well trained and experienced in the construction and application of both civil and criminal law."

Judge Sutton, a native son of this immediate section of West Texas, was 54 years of age Friday, May 26th and he and Mrs. Sutton have resided in San Angelo twenty-three years. He was educated in the University of Texas and begun the practice of law in 1916.

Sgt. Raymond R. Reynolds Is County's Third War II Casualty

A telegram from the War Department Sunday afternoon at 6 P. M., informed Mrs. M. M. Reynolds of the Rudd community, that her son, Sgt. Raymond R. Reynolds died on May 13, of wounds received in action. When last heard from on May 7, Sgt. Reynolds was in Corsica and had recently been awarded the Good Conduct Medal, the Middle-East Campaign Ribbon and two Stars.

Sgt. Reynolds entered the service in July, 1942, taking his training in the Technical Ground Force at St. Petersburg and Clearwater, Fla., Daniel Field, Ga., and Columbia and Waltersboro, S. C. He went overseas in Feb., 1943.

Sgt. Reynolds was a Welder in the Ground Crew of the U. S. Army Air Corps. He attended the Eldorado Schools and before entering the service, took a Diesel engineering course in San Angelo. He also assisted his mother and sister, Miss Lottie Reynolds, in the operation of their Schleicher County ranch. Other survivors be-

Son of Eldorado Couple Wearing New M-Sgt. Stripes; Is Flight Chief In Italy

15TH ARMY AIR FORCE—(Somewhere in Italy)—Frank M. Bradley, Jr., of Eldorado, Texas, a member of a crack P-38 Lightning fighter squadron of the 15th AAF in Italy, has been promoted to the rank of Master Sergeant.

As a flight chief in his squadron Sgt. Bradley has rendered efficient service in supervising the maintenance of its fighter planes. Arriving overseas with his squadron on Feb. 7, 1943, he saw service as a member of an advanced echelon in the Middle Eastern desert where the P-38 pilots blasted seventeen Nazi aircraft from the skies in one day without loss to themselves.

He wears three bronze battle stars on his Europe-Africa-Middle East campaign ribbon, indicative of participation in the Tunisian, Sicilian and Italian campaigns. Sgt. Bradley has also earned the Good Conduct ribbon, emblematic of commendable behavior and consistent efficiency in the line of duty.

In addition to Frank, two other brothers are serving with the Armed Forces. They are: Staff Sergeant Robert K. Bradley, with a service squadron in Italy; Tom

D. Bradley is an Electrician's Mate 3rd Class, on duty aboard an aircraft carrier, somewhere in the Pacific. One of his sisters, Mrs. L. Ballew, lives in Eldorado, as do his parents, while another sister, Mrs. Robert F. Frost makes her home at 580 Lake Park, Oakland, Calif.

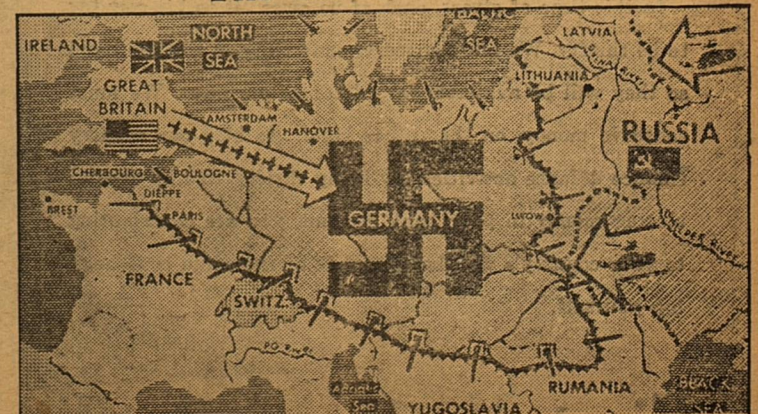
BROTHER OF MRS. C. E. CORBELL DIES AT BALLINGER

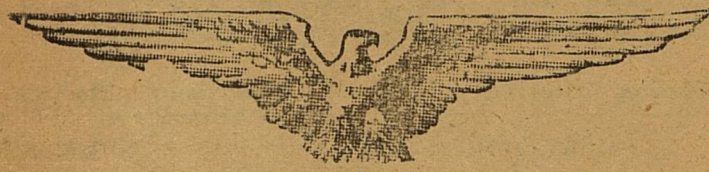

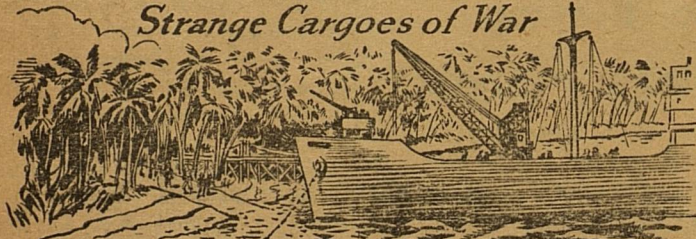

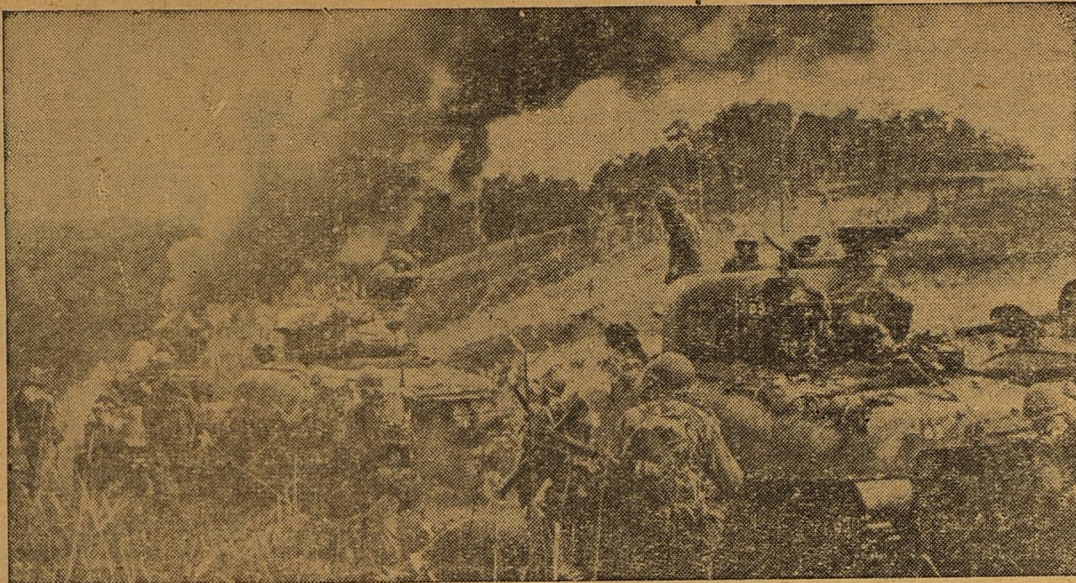

the Court and court officials in the handling of the business of the court.

"On three occasions the people of this District placed their stamp of approval upon my judicial record by giving me a very substantial majority over my honorable opponents. This majority has grown at each succeeding election, resulting in the last election in my receiving approximately three votes to each vote received by the opposition. For this I am grateful and such a majority has been a reminder of my official obligations to the people. Again I submit myself for reelection upon my official record and on that record solicit the vote and active support of every voter in the district, and in return offer you a continuation of the same character and kind of judicial service I have heretofore rendered, improved by that added efficiency that comes only from judicial experience.

"I shall not be able to see any considerable number of the voters and personally solicit their support. The work of the Court must be carried on and will consume much time, as it always has. Our people are busy and burdened down with the sorrows of war and the tremendous responsibilities that are ours until the war is won and peace restored. We are told D-DAR is near and we are urged by our Government to conserve automobiles, tires, gasoline and oil, that the military forces may maintain the necessary stock pile to carry on. I have fair tires and a reasonable gasoline allowance allotted by the Tom Green County Ration Board for the purpose of attending to the necessary court work in the five counties comprising this Judicial District. I shall keep faith with our military forces, our boys at the front and the cause for which we and our allied nations are fighting, by not diverting my gasoline allotment from essential court work to political campaign." 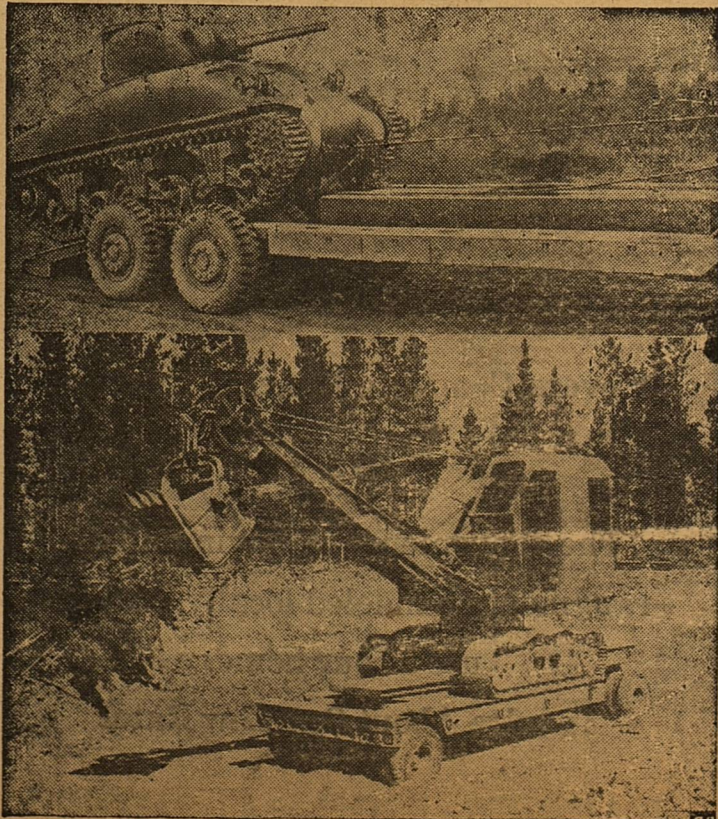

Miss Virginia Ryan, agent, gave a complete demonstration on "Repair of Canning Equipment, and discussed different types of containers and seals. In order to use all kinds of jars, they should be separated at the end of the season, using the one best suited for the product. Use standard jars for processing and others such as mayonnaise jars for products to be put up by water bath, Miss Ryan said. After two days, the ring may be removed for three reasons, namely, for further use; to test the seal and to keep the rings from rusting.

Sealers and cookers should be checked before the canning season. The sealer should be greased and well cleaned with a good cup-grease to prevent wear on caps. A powder known as "whiting"

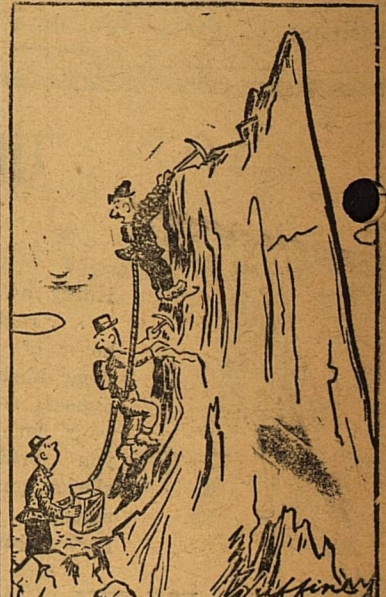
can be purchased at drugstores and used for cleaning cookers and also aluminum wear. For cleaning inside, fill with water and add one tablespoon of vinegar to a quart of water and bring to boil.
