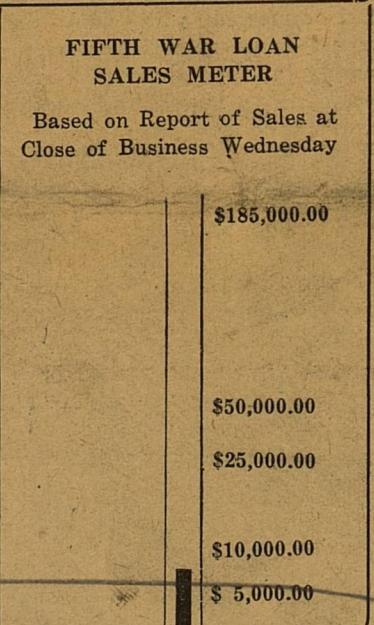

1. Call Miss Baker the day before you wish to use the center and make reservation for time and amount you wish to can. Do not gather vegetables until you have made reservations.
2. Bring jars or cans clean or ready to scald upon arrival.
3. Food will be excepted between 8 and 3: P.m.
4. Bring salt for vegetables.
5. Food will be left in the center for at least 48 hours to insure
6. The center will not be held responsible for accidents or spoilage.
7. Bring only young tender products to can.
8. A toll of 1/5 of food canned will be left at the center to remain in the school cafeteria.

**Farmers May Secure Trucks Through A.C.A.**

The treasury procurement office of this region, with headquarters at 601 Neil P. Anderson Buldg., Fort Worth, announced this week that several hundred Army trucks are available and can be released to farmers.

Procedure for securing these trucks is for farmers to make application for one of these trucks through the local ACA Committee and a letter showing: first, need for the truck, and second, a recommendation that the truck be released to the farmer through a dealer by the Treasury Procurement office.

Each of these trucks has a ceiling price, and too, farmers may specify in their application the kind and type of truck wanted. However, it was pointed out that no assurance could be made that the specified kind would be available. Immediate action by those who are in need and eligible for these trucks is necessary since the supply of trucks will be exhausted rapidly the communication from B. F. Vance stated.

**Lieut. Wallis Cozzens Reported Missing Over Belgium**

Lt. Wallis O. Cozzens, 22, son of Mrs. Mattie Cozzens has been reported "missing in action" over Belgium May 28.

Bombardier on a Liberator, he had been in England since March and when last heard from had completed ten successful missions over enemy territory.

The message from the War Department which was received about 5 o'clock P. M. Tuesday read as follows:

"The Secretary of War desires me to express his deep regret that your son, second Lt. Wallis O. Cozzens has been reported missing in action since May 28 over Belgium. If further details or other information are received you will be promptly notified."

**Among The Derricks**

Cardinal's No. 1 Koy which has been closely watched since its starting as a second well in the Schleicher County Page Pool was showing good signs until salt water broke into it, evidently through perforation below 5,555-75 feet caused by acid injected into the section. The well at one time was reported to have made more than 100 barrels of oil hourly.

The well ran only 15 feet lower than Cooper Gas company's No. 2-A Bert Page, the largest gas well in the field, rating 100 million cubic feet daily; only 98 feet lower than Cooper No. 1-D-39 Page, the nearest gas well and 185 feet higher than Cooper No. 1-C Page, the latter well having produced over 52,000 barrels of oil in three years.

The No. 1 Koy rotary was dismantled earlier in the week and a spudder will be placed on the site with swabbing equipment to try and make it an oil producer.

Another Test Started It was announced Thursday that slush pits and other preparations are being prepared by the Cardinal to drill another well on Section 48 of the Koy ranch. When rig will be set up was not announced, but indications are that it will be in operation soon.

**Brother of Ernest Sutherland Dies In Auto Mishap**

This community was shocked and saddened early Thursday morning when word was received here of the death of Lt. Fred W. Sutherland, 23, late Wednesday night in a car wreck, one mile south of Randlett, Oklahoma.

The lieutenant and two other officers, Lts. Powell and Benton, were enroute to their base at Fort Sill, Okla., after witnessing the graduation exercises held here in which Fred's brother W. C. Jr., was a graduate. It is understood that the car turned over when it hit a soft shoulder. The other two occupants of the car suffered only slight injuries.

Fred is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Sutherland of Archer City. He is a graduate of the local high school and attended A&M college. The young officer was an excellent student, a football and track star during his high school days. He was a senior at A&M at the time of his entry into the service in May 1943, and was a Liaison pilot for a field artillery unit.

Those left to mourn his passing are his parents, five brothers, Cadet Tom H., of Yale university, New Haven, Conn.; Ernest of Eldorado; W. C. Jr. and Glenn of Archer City; three sisters, Mrs. John Robinson, Archer City; Miss Matye Sutherland, Washington, D. C.; and Miss Esther Sutherland of Los Angeles.

**Rationed Shoe Production Lowered**

J. E. Hill, chairman of the ration board has announced lowered production of rationed shoes, increased production of unrationed shoes, and the belief that many applicants could get along without extra shoes, have led to this policy.

Eligibility of applicants for supplemental coupons will be examined more carefully, Mr. Hill said. Since the production of unrationed shoes has increased 445.8 percent, it is felt that many women and children can use these shoes instead of scarce rationed footwear.

Counterfeit shoe coupons have appeared in some areas, but so far, none are known to have shown up here. A check will be made for counterfeit coupons, however, by the OPA.

**More Than Million Pounds '44 Wool Clip Received Here**

It was announced this week that more than 1,000,000 pounds of the 1944 clip of wool had been received here by the Eldorado Wool Company through the close of business Wednesday. Anticipation is that shearing will be completed within the next two weeks.

Appraisals made by the Commodity Credit Corporation up to the present time covers approximately 325,000 pounds with net appraisal prices to the producers ranging from around 42 to 55 cents per pound for this year's clip of wool, which yield definitely has far exceeded expectations from both the producers and the buyers.

Large and climatical conditions have greatly enhanced the quality of the 1944 wool crop, together with the quantity shorn over this entire section of the state.

**Two Local Women Complete Red Cross Home Service Courses**

Mrs. J. E. Hill, newly appointed county chairman of Red Cross work and Mrs. J. C. Crosby case worker, have completed a Red Cross Home Service course held in San Angelo recently with Mrs. Mae Shuey, home service specialist from St. Louis, Mo., as instructor.

The 50-hour course included 26 hours of classroom study, six hours of observation trips and 18 hours of field work.

Enrollees in the course will volunteer a minimum of 150 hours yearly to assist in home service programs which include assisting service men and ex-service men in meeting needs resultant of their induction into the armed forces.

Other functions of home service graduates include communication and assistance in transmitting information between servicemen and their families; interpretation of legislation affecting servicemen and their dependents; co-operation with the Army and Navy in acquiring medical treatment for dependents; making reports on home conditions in deciding questions of clemency and discharge for servicemen; gathering information relative to service claims for pensions and other government benefits and consultation in meeting family difficulties.

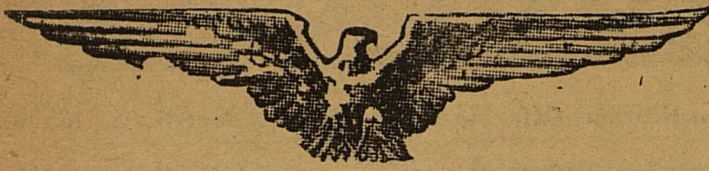

### Our WASHINGTON Letter

#### Let Us Resolve

President Roosevelt formulated the proper attitude for the American people in this pivotal hour in our history and in the history of the world in this paragraph in his prayer beamed to the world on the night following the first landing on the turbulent shores of Normandy:

"Lead them straight and true. Give strength to their arms, Stoutness to their hearts, Steadfastness in their faith."

The die is cast, and it calls for united action and support of the 135,000,000 people of America. As a great brotherhood of Americans, we are resolved that no power on earth can deter us from standing as a granite wall behind our heroic blood brothers and our gallant allies in this sublime adventure of liberation.

#### Mohair Price Outlook

It is generally known that the OPA is on the verge of setting a revised price ceiling on mohair. Vestel Askew, Secretary of the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, was in Washinton recently and conferred with OPA and others on the subject, and is preparing a brief in an effort to prove that a new ceiling schedule

is not necessary and in any event existing prices should not be lowered.

During the past week I have talked with Russell Burrus, who is in charge of the program in the OPA and with Judge Marvin Jones, Carl Farrington and Lawrence Myers in the Commodity Credit Corporation. I have tried to reason with them and show the tremendous increase in the cost of production of mohair caused by the increase in the cost of labor when it can be had as well as as increases in costs of shearing, feed and many other factors.

OPA wants to put the top price on grown hair at 58 cents, which would be a rollback on prices that have been paid during the past year. Such would be clearly unjustified. Mohair prices have been held down, in many instances below cost of production.

While it is too early to know what may happen, after talking with Jones, Farrington and Myers who must approve any schedule the OPA may set up I feel more encouraged.

#### Domestic Wool For Navy Uses

In a recent hearing on the wool stockpile situation, representatives of the Navy testified that of the 70,000,000 pounds per year of wool used by the Navy only about 10 percent is domestic and 90 percent foreign. The Army, on the other hand, uses mostly domestic wools.

While the Navy uses a finer quality wool, it is believed more domestic wools can be utilized.

With the help of Eugene Ackerman of the American Wool Council, I am attempting to show the Navy that more domestic wools can be used in meeting their specifications.

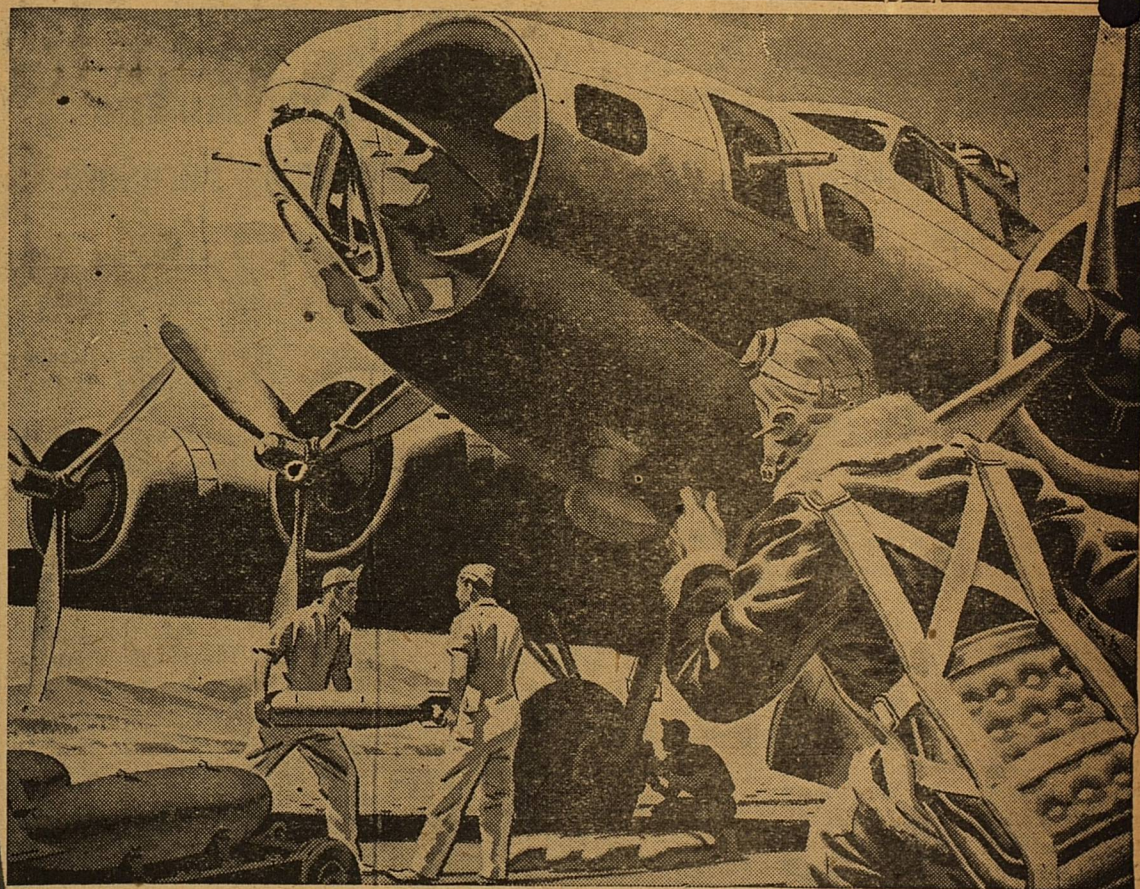

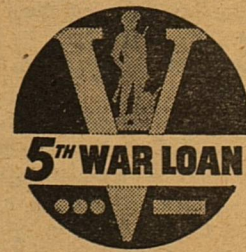
