The Schleicher County Hospital District board of trustees met Monday evening and, among other items of business, reviewed the status of the hospital's application for Medicare recertification.

Present for the meeting were board members Ricky Fuessel, Delia Pina, Judy Christian, Randy Mankin, Tom Enochs, Brian Edmiston and Lanis Mikeska. They were joined by Hospital Administrator Jim Roddie, who was attending his last meeting prior leaving his post on Wednesday. Also at the

meeting were Asst. Administrator Beverly Minor, hospital Director of Nursing (DON) Berta Nicholson and nursing home DON Donna Aguilar.

Board president Ricky Fuessel called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and the board immediately entered into an executive session to discuss personnel and review attorney's correspondence.

The board was joined briefly in the executive session by Mary Hallmark, a vice president with

County considers changing meals for elderly program

Sue Fielder, representing the Concho Valley Council of Government's Area Agency on Aging met with Schleicher County Commissioners Monday. Present for the meeting were County Judge Johnny Griffin and commissioners Johnny Mayo, Jr., Steve Minor and Ross Whitten. Commissioner Kerry Joy was absent.

Fielder was on hand to discuss the county's Meals for Friends program and the possibility of county moving meal preparation into the county jail. Judge Griffin invited Fielder to attend the meeting and explore the possibility withdrawing from the Kimble County program, which currently prepares the meals for Schleicher County. Also on hand were Sheriff David Doran and Jail Administrator Kathy Faull.

Fielder, whose department would give the final OK to any restructuring of the local program listened as Griffin and Doran outlined their proposal.

Under the plan, Schleicher County would:

- withdraw from the Kimble County Meals for Friends program;
- keep the \$23,000+ that is now being sent to Kimble County each

year;

- take over day-to-day operation of the meals program;
- prepare 40+ meals per day, 5 days per week in the jail's kitchen;
- distribute the meals through the Schleicher County Sr. Citizens Center; and
- receive a subsidy from the CVCOG based on the number of meals provided and expenses generated by the program.

Central to the success of the plan is obtaining an inmate from the Texas Dept. of Corrections (TDC) who has been trained as a cook. Sheriff Doran said he would ask Dist. Judge Barbara Walther to assign such an inmate to his jail. Doran noted that if the judge was willing to issue a bench warrant, it might be possible to have an inmate transferred here in the near future.

Fielder told the men that she would have no objections to the meals being prepared at the jail, since the jail kitchen is already subject to inspections by the Dept. of Health. She said that the program would be monitored by her agency to ensure it was providing an adequate menu and using only USDA

Callison wins State title at Sr. Olympics in Temple

Eldorado is home to a State Champion this week after John Callison claimed a Gold Medal in the Scott and White Texas Senior Games in Temple. Callison won the Basketball Around the World Shooting contest in the 70 - 75 age division.

Callison was one of 1,822 participants competing in five age divisions. He narrowly missed winning the Basketball Free Throw Shooting contest and received the second place Silver Medal in that event.

The 72 year old Eldoradoan will next travel to Orlando, Florida to take part in the National Senior Games in October, 1999.

"The national games are held every two years," Callison told the Success. All athletes who received a gold, silver or bronze medal in Temple are qualified to compete at the national level.

Callison credits his success to keeping fit and regular practice. He is currently training at San Angelo Community Hospital's gym several times a week.

The games in Temple were held in the Wilson Park Recreational

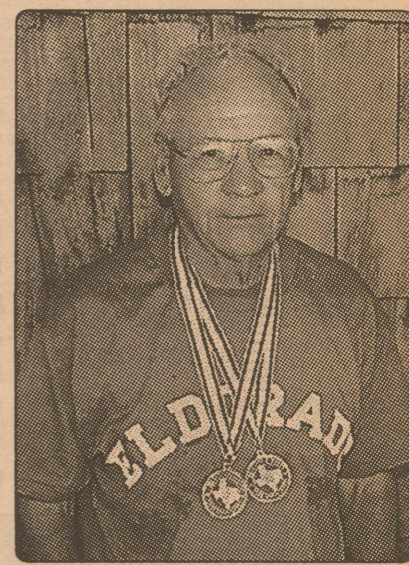

Katherine 'Kate' Sykes

BALLINGER - Katherine P. "Kate" Sykes of Ballinger went to be with the Lord on Friday, Sept. 18, 1998. At the time of death, she was being attended at Ballinger Memorial Hospital.

Services were held Monday, Sept. 21, at First Baptist Church in Ballinger with the Rev. Ferris Akins and the Rev. Dr. Henry Chisholm officiating. Burial will follow in Evergreen Cemetery. Arrangements are by Rains-Seale Funeral Home.

She was born Sept. 6, 1896, in Westfork, Ark., a small town very close to Fayetteville, Ark. Her parents were Thomas Penson Reed and Florence Privett Reed. Mrs. Sykes was 2 years old when the family moved from Arkansas to Fairlee, Texas. This small town is located in East Texas close to Commerce, Texas. The family stayed here for about two years and then moved to a community between Goldthwaite and San Saba, Texas, in Mills County that is still known as Big Valley. The family farm was located approximately 1 1/2 miles west of Big Valley Church, across Prescott Creek. Mrs. Sykes attended school in Big Valley and then attended high school in Goldthwaite, Texas.

Otto C. Sykes and Katherine "Kate" Reed were married in May 1918. At that time, O.C. was a sergeant in the Headquarters Company, 345th Field Artillery, 90th Division, U.S. Army. World War I was in progress, and O.C. served overseas in France and Germany. Upon his return to the United

States, he received his discharge on June 23, 1919.

O.C. and Kate first lived in Goldthwaite for about one year and then moved west of Knickerbocker, Texas, where he was appointed to be superintendent of schools. The next move was to Maverick, where he taught about two semesters, then moved to Ballinger early in 1923. Mr. Sykes died in May 1955.

Mrs. Kate Sykes, always a homemaker, had been a member of First Baptist Church in Ballinger for 75 years. For many years she was an active member of the Ballinger Garden Club and a member of the Texas A&M Mothers Club.

Survivors include Billy C. Sykes and wife, Mary, of Ballinger and Bobby R. Sykes and wife, Pat, of Eldorado. Grandchildren are Ted Sykes of Houston, Tom and Deborah Sykes of Ballinger, Alison Sykes of Houston, Robert and Lisa Sykes of Midland and Steve and Ann Sykes of Amarillo. Great-grandchildren are Tanner and Leslie Ann Sykes of Ballinger, Reed, Nathan and Grant Sykes of Midland and Clinton, Clayton and Stephanie Ann Sykes of Amarillo.

Pallbearers were grandsons, Ted Carlton Sykes, Tom McCain Sykes, Robert Reed Sykes and Steve Clinton Sykes, and great-grandsons, Tanner McCain Sykes, Clayton Reed Sykes, Clinton Rudd Sykes and William Reed Sykes.

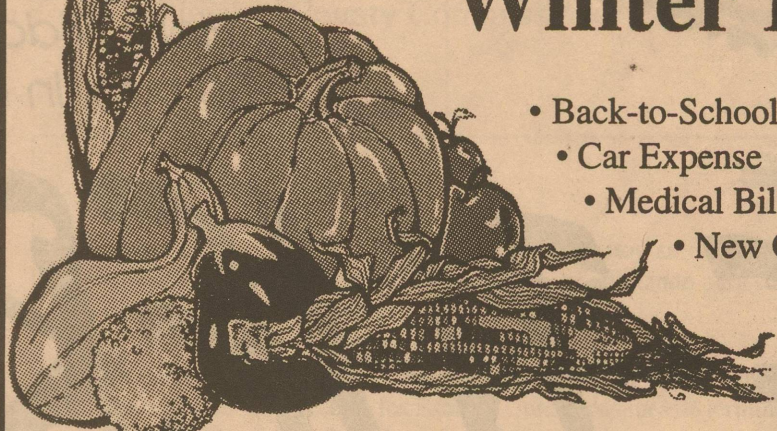

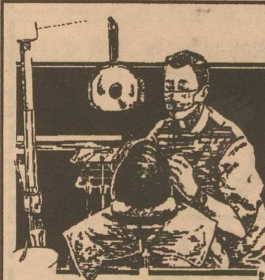

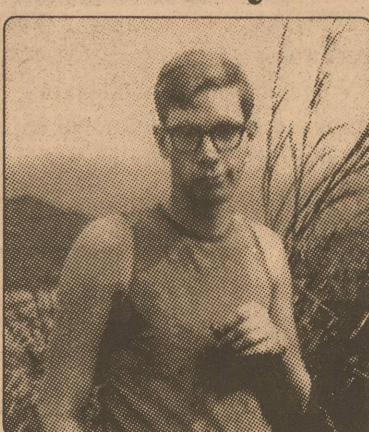

UIL Legislative Council to meet

The 1998 UIL Legislative Council Meetings are scheduled for October 18-19 at the Omni South Park Hotel in Austin. Sunday, October 18 is slated for oral and written presentations while Monday, October 19 will be committee discussions and issue voting.

Several items were presented in June at the Athletic Committee Meeting that will once again be discussed at the Legislative Council Meeting next month. Two proposals were passed and forwarded to the October meeting; an amendment in baseball that one of the games in a two out of three series be played Monday through Thursday provided there is no loss of school time, and an amendment to use mixed doubles match to break a 9-9 tie in team tennis.

The Athletic Committee recommended two issues be placed on a fall survey to schools with results discussed at the meeting. One deals with lengthening the softball season by two weeks and the other is dividing swimming and diving into two conferences (5A and 4A and under).

approved foodstuff.

Griffin told the commissioners the revenue from CVCOG would come very close to paying for the entire program. "With client donations and fundraisers the program might be self-sufficient," Griffin stated.

In that case, the \$23,000 now being sent to Kimble County would be freed up for other purposes. Sheriff Doran said he had an idea where that money could be spent.

"We're doing lots of community service projects with inmate work details," Doran told the commissioners. "If I could hire an extra jailer to help supervise the details, we could do a lot more."

Doran said that some of the county's routine maintenance which is now being handled by contractors or paid staff could be performed by inmates. One area Doran cited was at the cemetery. He also mentioned mowing and maintaining the county's parks and rodeo grounds.

Judge Griffin told the commissioners that there were other benefits to moving the program into the jail's kitchen. He noted that Sr. Citizen Center Director Cindy Stuckey currently spends ten hours per week driving to Menard, picking up meals and hauling them back to Eldorado. "Cindy could put that time to better use," Griffin said. "There are all sorts of activities that

she could arrange if she only had more time."

Another concern about the current state of the program was the lack of local control. "We never know when the folks in Junction are going to ask for more money. At least this way we can exercise some control over the program," Griffin explained.

Sheriff Doran said he would contact Judge Walther and ask for her help. He said he had a commitment from Schleicher County ISD to help with continuing education for any inmate/cook that TDC might send. Also, Doran noted he was arranging for drug and alcohol counseling which must be made available to TDC inmates.

In other business the commissioners approved the minutes of meetings on Sept. 14 & Sept. 21. They also voted unanimously to ask the CVCOG to forward funding for the local 9-1-1 program directly to Ray Ballew at the Schleicher County Appraisal District. Judge Griffin noted Ballew was handling the 9-1-1 addressing chores and the direct payment would save the county some bookkeeping.

Next, the commissioners heard a request from the Schleicher County Rodeo Association that the county pay half of an \$800 bill for soil which was hauled into the rodeo arena prior to the Eldorado Open Rodeo in August. The com-

missioners finally agreed to the request but not before commissioner Johnny Mayo, Jr. questioned it as an "unauthorized expenditure."

The court then reviewed correspondence from the Schleicher County Chamber of Commerce. A letter from chamber president James-Kosub asked the commissioners to consider economic development skills when deciding on hiring a new county agent to replace Mike Harbour. It was reported that a representative from the Texas A&M Agricultural Extension Service is expected to attend the next commissioners meeting on Oct. 12th.

The men then authorized County Treasurer Karen Henderson to transfer \$125,000 from the county's contingency fund to help pay for a paving project which was completed recently. They also finalized the appointment of election judges for the upcoming general election by appointing Walt Griggs as the election judge in precinct 2, Peggy Mittel as the early voting election judge, Alma Corbell as the early voting alternate judge and Lynette Doran as the early voting clerk.

The commissioners okayed a contract with Tom Green County which will allow local juveniles to be housed in that county's juvenile facility. The contract establishes a rate of \$75 per day for each day a Schleicher County youth is kept in the unit.

Before adjourning, the commissioners heard a request from Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church for use of the county's tractor and shredder. A brief debate then developed over the amount to charge for the work. The men finally voted to set the rate for a tractor and shredder at \$30 per hour. Commissioners Mayo and Minor voted in favor of the measure while Ross Whitten voted in opposition.

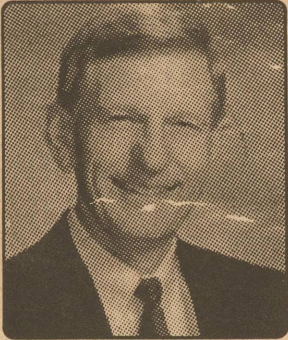

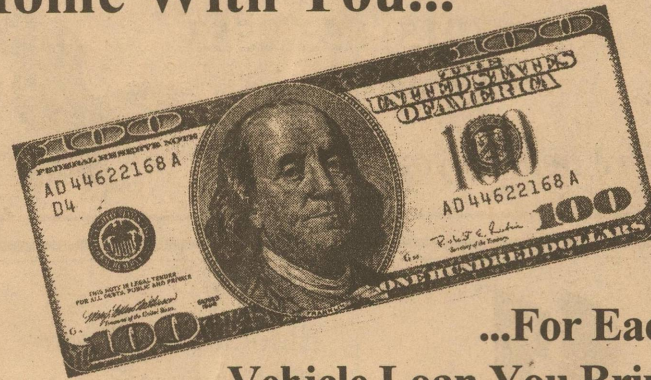

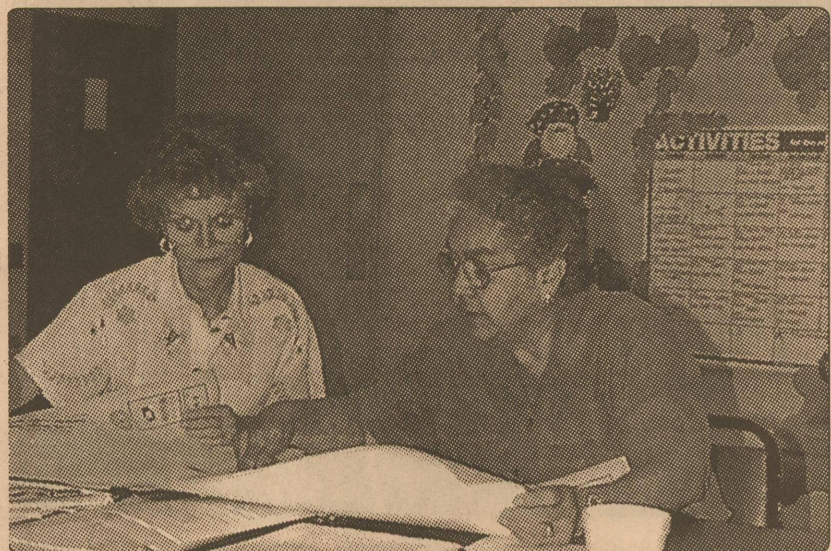

Shannon hospital in San Angelo.

When the group emerged into open session, Randy Mankin offered a motion to drop any further legal action concerning a piece of laboratory equipment referred to as "the Beckman". Mankin's motion was seconded by Brian Edmiston and passed unanimously.

The trustees then approved minutes of previous meetings and took up discussion of the Medicare recertification. It was explained that the hospital's application for Medicare recertification had been amended when it was learned that the original application only applied to six of the hospital's sixteen beds. That amendment would require the hospital to be surveyed again by government inspectors.

Administrator Roddie told the board that he had included six beds in the original application because the other beds were now included in the hospital's "boarder program". Roddie said he feared the boarder program would only complicate things if the additional ten beds were included in the application.

Trustee Brian Edmiston told the board that when he contacted Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) officials to inquire about the status of the hospital's application he learned that all beds, including the ten currently used in the boarder program, must be included in the Medicare recertification application.

The board was told that staff was working to bring record keeping in the boarder program up to the standards required by Medicare.

In other business, the trustees authorized maintenance supervisor Buddy Otto to seek bids from consulting firms concerning asbestos abatement in three areas of the hospital. The three areas include: 1) the entrance to the Physical Therapy Dept.; 2) the X-Ray Dept.; and 3) one of the hospital's two Emergency Rooms.

The board then okayed the purchase of a new ice dispenser for the kitchen. It was estimated the dispenser would cost \$2,475.00. Approval was also given for the purchase of a heavy duty washing machine for the facility.

Nursing home DON Donna Aguilar then discussed the nursing home's Quality Assurance (QA) report. The board went over specific items on the report with her before voting unanimously to approve the report.

Next, hospital DON Berta Nicholson presented her QA report. It, too, was reviewed and approved unanimously by the trustees.

Before adjourning, the board reviewed new blueprints for the upcoming nursing home expansion and looked over the district's financial reports. It was noted that the patient census in the hospital had increased substantially since Dr. Brian Kingston opened his practice here in July.

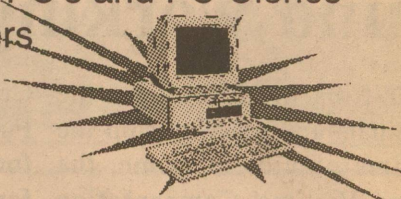

Texas Crime Victims' Compensation Fund working well after two decades

Shifting the focus from the criminals and placing it on the victims of violent crime, the Crime Victims' Compensation Fund administered by the Office of the Attorney General can provide victims and their families financial assistance for certain out of pocket expenses not paid for by insurance, workers' compensation or some other available resource.

"Homicide, sexual assault, kidnapping, aggravated robbery, arson and other violent crimes can leave a victim and their family emotionally and financially devastated," Morales said. "The

Crime Victims' Compensation Fund is an important safety net for them. The Fund can help pay for doctor bills, counseling fees, funeral costs and certain other related expenses attributed to the crime."

With the belief that criminals should be held responsible for their actions, the Fund is sustained through fines paid by convicted criminals. There are no tax dollars involved in the administration of the Fund. With the exception of gifts, grants and donations, criminals bear the entire cost of the program. They pay by way of fines assessed by state and federal courts for felonies and misdemeanors, through restitution and from parolee supervision fees.

The Crime Victims' Compensation Fund has existed nearly 20 years. It was created in 1979 when the Texas Legislature passed the Crime Victims' Compensation Act. From 1980 to 1997, eligible victims of violent crime have been awarded more than \$284 million from the Fund.

The Fund was first administered by the Industrial Accident Board, later known as the Workers' Compensation Commission. The Office of the Attorney General was assigned full responsibility of the Fund in 1991. By 1997, victims had received in excess of \$160.3 million from the Crime Victim's Compensation Fund.

Awards on any one claim occurring after September 1, 1997, cannot exceed \$50,000. However, in the event of a catastrophic injury, an additional \$50,000 is available. Claims on any one claim occurring prior to September 1, 1997, are set at \$25,000 respectively. Examples of what the Fund can help pay for are:

- medical bills associated with injuries
- counseling costs of for a victim and their immediate family
- burial and funeral expenses
- lost wages and loss of support payments
- costs associated with crime scene cleanup
- travel expenses for those seeking medical treatment, counseling or to participate in the criminal justice process

Although the Crime Victims' Compensation Act was passed in 1979, it was not until 1985 that the Crime Victims' Bill of Rights was added to the Code of Criminal Procedure. Included in this legislative action was the requirement that victims be informed about the Crime Victims' Compensation program.

"This September marks the thirteenth anniversary of victims' rights in Texas. By giving victims the right to be informed, present and heard throughout the criminal justice process, we gave them a voice in the system," Morales said.

Focus on the Family

Sex-Ed Classes Should Be Segregated

QUESTION: Our local school board is currently trying to decide whether or not boys and girls should be segregated for courses on sexuality and "family life." What are your feelings with regard to coed sex education programs?

DR. DOBSON: I have severe reservations about highly explicit discussions occurring with both sexes present. To do so breaks down the natural barriers that help to preserve virginity and makes casual sexual experimentation much more likely to occur. It also strips kids — especially girls — of their modesty to have every detail of anatomy, physiology, intercourse and condom usage made explicit in coed situations. Those who have thereby become familiar and conversant about the most intimate subjects may later find themselves watching explicit sexual scenes in movies, rock videos and hot television programs. It doesn't take a rocket scientist to recognize the combined impact of these influences. Whereas it was a weighty decision to give up one's virginity in decades past, it is but a small step for those whose conditioning began in the school classroom. Familiarity "breeds," as we all know. I am also convinced that the incidence of date rape rises when the barriers that help a girl protect herself are removed.

In some cases, no doubt, school officials have pushed for mixed sex-ed classes out of a sense of obligation. Somehow, they feel this is what's expected of them — that parents and the

community at large want it. Let them know if you disagree! Tell your school board members about the educational advantages of separated classes. They may see your point if you present it to them from that angle.

QUESTION: I am 19 years old and I have struggled with a bad self-concept all my life. It seems that everyone I know has more to offer than I do. I envy the girls who are better looking than I am, more athletic or smarter. I just don't measure up to my own expectations. How can I deal with my own insecurities?

DR. DOBSON: Someone said, "Comparison is the root of all inferiority." It is true. When you look at another person's strengths and compare them to your own weaknesses, there is no way to come out feeling good about yourself. That is what you are doing when you pit yourself against the "best and brightest" around you.

This destructive game begins in elementary school when we begin to evaluate ourselves critically. Even at that young age, our self-image is shaped by how we stack up against our peers. It's not how tall we are that matters — it's who is tallest. It's not how fast we can run — it's who runs fastest. It's not how smart we are — it's who is smartest. It's not how pretty or handsome we are — it's who is most gorgeous.

Thus begins a pattern of self-doubt that often becomes all-consuming during adolescence. For some people it continues well into adult life. This is why millions

of women buy fashion magazines and then envy the beauty of the models. It's why we watch Miss America contests and why some men read about successful and powerful businessmen. When we do that, we're weighing ourselves against the most admired assets of others. It is an exercise that brings us nothing but pain, and yet we continue to engage in it.

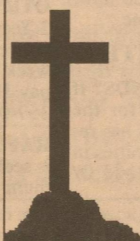
It appears that you are caught up in this destructive pattern. Perhaps a wise counselor or pastor can help you see that you are a worthy human being exactly the way you are and that you have been designed for a specific purpose. Mental and spiritual health begin with an acceptance of life as it is and a willingness to make the most of what has been given. When that is achieved, comparison with others is no longer an important issue.

Texas Rural Summit slated to meet in Abilene on Tuesday

Rural leaders will come together in Abilene on October 6 to discuss the economic future of rural Texas. State Representative Bob Turner, D-Voss, organized the summit with the assistance of the Texas Rural Development Council and the West Central Texas Council of

Governments in response to what he saw as a great time of change in the economy of rural communities.

"With the passage of the 1996 'Freedom to Farm Act' by the U.S. Congress, we are currently in the second year of a seven-year phase out in agricultural price subsidies. This will inevitably increase the decline we are already seeing in agriculture by finding new sources for economic growth within and outside of the agriculture industry."

Texas A&M University estimates the U.S. will lose 451,000 farmers by 2002. With the effects of the 1996 and 1998 droughts, couple with increased uncertainty in the commodity markets due to the phase out of Ag subsidies, those numbers are expected to increase in Texas.

Representative Turner and the other hosts began planning the summit earlier this year as it became apparent that many communities were not taking a proactive role in preparing themselves for the future. In August, they sent out invitations to community leaders in every rural county in Central and West Texas. The summit will focus on how these communities deal with the changes created by the 1996 Farm Bill, and utilizing new technologies, such as the Internet, to enhance economic development.

Turner believes rural Texas must capture more business available in the agriculture market by developing its potential for value-added agricultural production. "We have to ask ourselves why we export our beef to be processed up North, when we have 25% of the nation's beef cattle. Texas needs to develop its own value-added processing to those jobs can stay at home," stated Turner.

"Rural areas have many advantages for businesses. As executive director of the Coleman Economic Development Corporation, I work every day to bring economic development to my community based on those advantages," said Turner.

The speakers at the rural summit will include representatives of Governor Bush, state agencies, economic development firms, the banking industry, county and city government, federal agencies, and private businesses.
