"Newspaper advertising performs at least one definite, vital function which newspapers themselves fail to emphasize and which, unfortunately, too few consumers probably realize.

"The popular conception of newspaper advertising doubtless is that it represents a highly effective method of creating consumer interest; is a reasonably economical means of developing distribution and that, because of

resultant volume increases, unit costs of any given commodity are proportionately reduced—to both the manufacturer and the consumer.

"But of far greater importance is the influence which newspaper advertising wields in setting up standards of excellence and integrity. Standards which every advertiser must recognize and observe if there is a sincere desire to remain an important factor in any particular field.

"The task of making consumers see advertising, making them read it, understand it, believe it, are all primary functions of newspapers and the men and women who prepare and illustrate advertising. But the sixth point is the problem of the maker of the commodity. And the job of causing consumers to want the same product over and over again can only be accomplished by setting up standards that are consistently safeguarded.

"Newspaper advertising, by the intimacy and frequency of its contact with readers and potential consumers, must necessarily play an important part in a nation's thoughts, customs and habits. Used merely as a vehicle of exploitation it has tremendous power. But when also employed to represent a standard of integrity and excellence, and when these virtues are steadfastly and zealously observed, newspaper advertising becomes more than a transient merchandising method and rises to the fine heights of a code of honor for

## Rules for District Bedroom Contest to be Held in Tom Green County November 8 to 12

Schleicher County Council voted to enter Bedroom contest and urge all home demonstration club members to prepare for same.

1. Only regular members of Home Demonstration and 4-H Clubs will be eligible to enter the contest.

2. Only tufted bedspreads, woolen comforts and tufted pillow tops will be shown.

3. Only one entry from each class will be accepted from any individual, as one tacked comfort, one quilted comfort, one tufted spread, one tufted pillow top.

4. All entries must be in and checked into Tom Green County Exhibits Committee not later than 10:00 A. M., November 8th.

5. Judging will begin at 10:00 A. M., November 8th, after which all entries will be on display until November the 12th, 1:00 P. M.

6. The home demonstration agent and two bedroom demonstrators from each county exhibiting are requested to attend the judging demonstration. If space is limited these representatives will have precedence in attending the demonstration.

7. Exhibits Committee of each County Council is responsible for collecting, packing and transporting each exhibit.

8. Tom Green County Council Exhibits Committee is responsible for packing exhibit to return. Each County shall make duplicate list of articles to be sent to exhibit, one list will be sent to the chairman of Tom Green County Exhibits Committee, and one list to be filed with each County Exhibits Committee.

9. Labels of cloth must be sewed on the wrong side in one corner of each bedspread or article exhibited. These labels should carry the name of the owner, club, and county.

10. County Prizes: (It is suggested that each county council contribute \$1.00 to the first county prize.)

(1) The County having the greatest number of bedspreads and woolen comforts exhibited will receive first prize, the County having the second greatest number, second, etc.

(d) Class IV, Tufted Pillow Tops

First prize, \$2.00; second prize, Lunchroom cloth; third prize, one dozen napkins; fourth prize, Cookie jar; fifth prize, Flower container.

First prize, \$5.00; second prize, Bedspread; third prize, enough wall paper for one room; fourth prize, picture; fifth prize, Flower container.
