Eleven FFA members from Eldorado will join other 4-H and FFA members from throughout Texas for showing competition at the upcoming Houston Livestock Show, February 19th through March 6th at the Astrohall.

These FFA and 4-H exhibitors compete in one of two divisions of the Houston Livestock Show - the junior show division. The other division, the open show, attracts its exhibitors from the world's largest agricultural industry, who are primarily professional breeders and ranchers. Entries in both the open and junior shows combine with horse show entries to make the Houston Livestock Show the world's largest.

The 1994 Houston Livestock and Rodeo begins with horseshow competition, Wednesday, Feb. 16, followed by other livestock competition beginning Saturday, Feb. 19. The first rodeo performance will be held at 7 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 19. All events conclude March 6.

Saturday matinee performances begin at 11 a.m. All Sunday performances will be held at 4 p.m., while all evening performances begin at 7.

Ticket prices are \$10 and include admission to the horse show (excluding National Cutting Horse Association sponsored events), the livestock show, the carnival and rodeo. 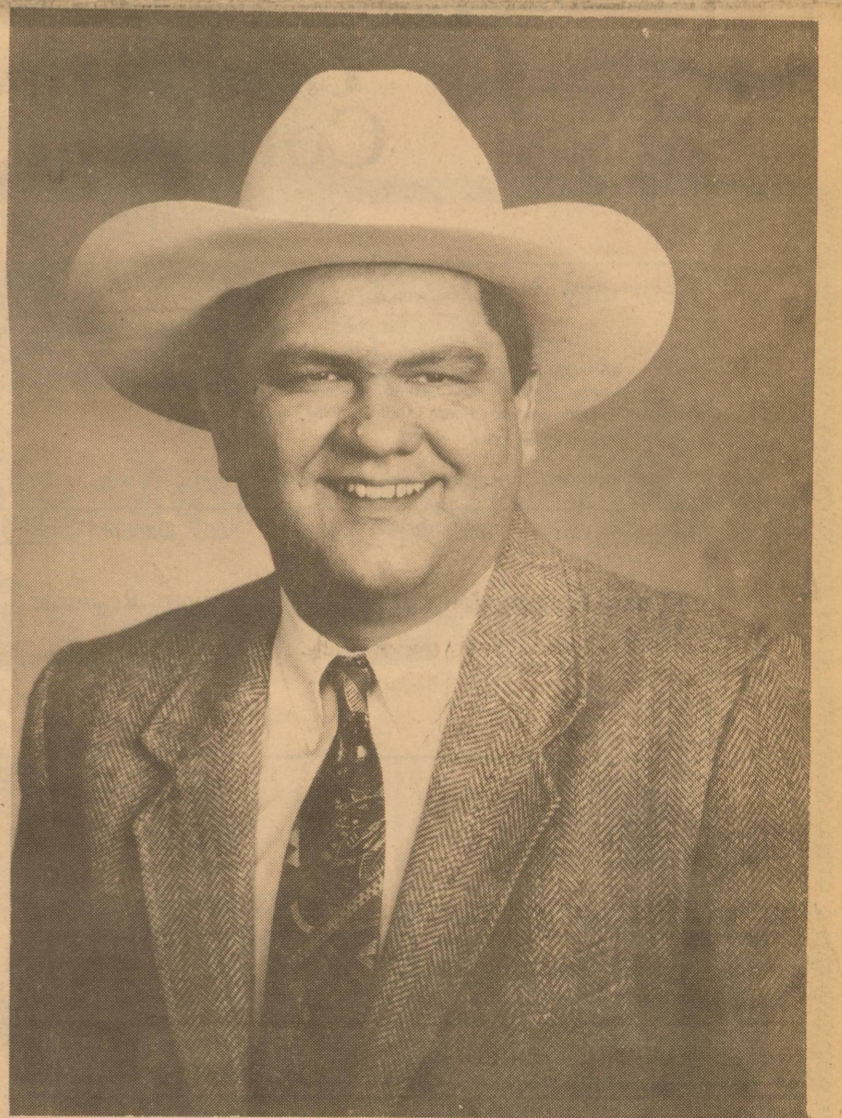

Brelsford Announces For State Representative, District 73

Llano County rancher, John Petsch Brelsford, has filed to run in the Republican Primary for state representative. "I believe I can do a good job representing the Texas Hill Country." Brelsford is a fourth generation Hill Country resident whose grandfather, Alfred Petsch, served in the Texas Legislature. "I grew up listening to my grandfather talk about what an honor it was to do public service and I hope to carry on that tradition."

Candidate Brelsford points to the rising juvenile crime rate as one of the state's biggest problems. As the father of two sons, Jefferson and Joseph, and the husband of a Llano I.S.D. school teacher, Julie, he says, "I know how important it is to have good schools in our communities. Although the good people of District 73 have maintained high standards, it is not true throughout the state. In places

like Houston and San Antonio, there are areas where the community standards and the morality have completely broke down. I believe this is a result of failed social policies. The results have cost the taxpayers of each state dearly. We need to totally rethink our approach to these problems instead of continuing to fund programs that don't work or make matters worse."

Brelsford graduated from the University Of Texas with a degree in Business Administration. Since that time, he has worked in a family cattle business. He and his family are active in the church and the community. He is a member of the administrative council of the Methodist Church, a little league coach, and a member of several farm and ranch organizations. He is past Llano County Republican Chairman and has been active in several state and local races.

An invitation was extended to everyone to attend the District 7 FCE meeting on Tuesday, March 15th at the Community Center in Brady, Texas.

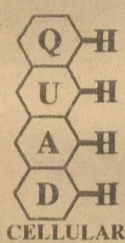
